



If you have any interest in bulletin boards, come to the meeting. It should be interesting.

MacSIG Off To The Races

The first official MacSIG meeting was held at the Southdale Branch of the Hennepin County Library (70th and York South) on July 9th. This meeting was a followup to the preliminary organizational meeting a month previous. From the head count at the July 9 meeting, there seems to be a lot of interest in the Macintosh computer from Apple. There were about 50 hardy souls that shared interesting tidbits about the Macintosh during the evening.

Mike Carlson did a great job in putting the program together on short notice, after the

scheduled speaker ended up a first—aid case and had to bow out from the assignment. The first order on the agenda was planning for the next two meetings. Due to a scheduling conflict at the library, second Mondays could not be accommodated for August and September. With bearly a whimper, open dates for August 20 and September 24 (both Mondays) were accepted by the MacSIG'ers. We have asked a certain hybridizer (reported on below), to bring his Apple—Mac combination to the meeting.

Right here on the Minnesota turf one is rumored to have mated Mac to the Apple Graphics Tablet. Now just what do you think will come out of that union? I can see it now... So much RFI that the navy's ELF network will be rendered useless. Subs at sea will get sketches of apples instead of NATO manuevers. (This hybridizer is reported to be Chuck Thiesfield.)

A plea was registered by a member from the northern environs to swing a meeting up into the Rosedale area. Within two beats of the Mac's 8MHZ clock, that lucky Mini'app'ler was appointed as a committee of one to search out that possibility for October's meeting and report to the MacSIG on what's available.

The MacSIG was again poled to introduce themselves and to expound briefly on their interest in the Macintosh. Once again, the diversity of the computer showed through, garnering responses from those yet to take the MacPlunge, to application hunters, to application writers. This time the flavor of those assembled seemed to lean toward the business potentials of the Macintosh, though there was certainly no single interest that held a majority reply.

Opening up the floor to general Macintosh questions, it was clear that those owning Macintoshes are still awaiting the flood of promised software. There were a flurry of questions about the release dates for a host of the program titles that have been making the press circuits. The crew from PBS helped to provide a few updates on schedules, but expressed a similar sense of frustration. One of many "authoritive" lists was posted, but all of these seem to be out of date by the time they can be assembled and distributed.

Mike had brought a few of the "for real" new programs along for demonstration to the group. To the titles now available, you can add the following:

THINKTANK: an "idea" processor, designed to help you organize outlines, open them for detail, rearrange for clarity and compress for viewing the whole concept.

MILLIONAIRE: a stock market simulation game where you buy and sell stocks over a 77 week period, attempting to maximize your holdings.

CLICKART: one of several available disks of artwork that you can move to your Paint or Write documents to pretty them up and add interest.

BLACKJACK: a casino game of skill and luck based on the card game of the same name. (This demo was sent to the MacSIG group directly for evaluation... The word is getting around.)

Brochures on several impending releases have been showing up at the dealers. Some of the more "serious" programs have been recently re-targeted for August. Apple says to look for MacPascal in July. There are still a lot of things that will just not give in to speedy release wishes, no matter how strong. Latest word on "Word" is fourth quarter, and that flower program will be '85, when the Mac gets a bigger brain (otherwise known as Fat Mac).

But things really haven't been dead in the water, even though there are disappointments in the schedule department. The printer folks are hard at work doing their best to allow Mac to show off on other brands than the captive ImageWriter. Utilities are available that let you take a Write file and send it out via selected printers. And a software company claims to have a "patch" disk that will hook any of several of the heavyweight "letter quality" bangers up as paperpunchers, for a license fee. Apple itself has said it would provide the driver to allow Mac to use the Apple daisy, too.

Networker Update

Fixing Bad Textfiles Created Using Networker Software 1.0 by Steve George

ortunately, relatively few copies of Networker Software version 1.0 are in circulation so the numbers of people this article will impact will also be limited. Hopefully! Because the "problem" is inconsistent and whether it affects those of you with 1.0 also depends upon which word processor you use for editing your captured textfiles.

But, the problem can cause severe headaches to those it plagues. Both the inconsistency and the problem are because the Text Buffer isn't properly initialized when the program is The first character in the Text Buffer can be ANYTHING. If there is a problem with the file, most likely though it's a 'rubout' character (\$7F or \$FF). Thus, when it happens to be an \$FF, Applewriter [says to itself... "Hmm, an \$FF, this must be the end of the text, I'll stop reading this file here." So what you have is a file you cannot access!

the legitimate delimiter end-of-text but Applewriter][(and others?) somehow decide that \$FF is ALSO an indicator for the end.

So, here's whatcha do...

Enter and run this little program which will prompt you for the filename. If you enter CATALOG for the filename, you will also be asked which drive to catalog. The program makes certain assumptions about the file, but so far there have been no reported problems using it. Finally, a line of text will indicate whether there was a DOS error (check your manual for error numbers and re-run this program when the error has been remedied), whether the file was OK (previously updated or OK all along), or that it has been UPDATED

Let me know if you have any problems using this little program.

This will fix the previously-saved textfile, but what about preventing the problem altogether?

Now, to the meat of the solution: how to alter your version 1.0 so this "Updater" won't be necessary. First, boot a 'normal' DOS disk. Next, take your back-up Networker 1.0 disk and UNLOCK NETWORKER. Then BLOAD NETWORKER. Enter the Monitor (CALL -151). Type: 87FB:A9 <RETURN>. 00 0B Then **BSAVE** NETWORKER, A\$87FB, L\$E05. Lastly, LOCK NETWORKER.

This simple solution will force a space character into the start of the Text Buffer, thus fixing the problem of starting a textfile with a rubout character.



And so it was in Finland, Norway, Denmark, Belgium, France, and Spain. I noticed, almost in passing (a habit of virtue, you might say, which persisted in midst of my iniquity), that computers, generally, were more prominent the farther north I was and virtually disappeared from view as we moved south. Very few stores, and those hidden in humble quarters; very few ads of any kind; and the people whose savage customs I'd adopted so shamelessly were almost wholly ignorant of the new god and, in the south, not even apologetic about it.

In the end — it was now the last day in France, the last day in Europe — I chanced down a little alley I hadn't walked before. There, before me, a little store. Apple only. I stared. I pulled myself together. I marched in. I bent my head repentantly. I reached out. I touched the oh-so-familiar

keyboard again. A cool reception. Apple knew of my defection. The IIe keys clicked frigidly. I knew I'd have some explaining to do — and in French, no less.

But it all worked out after all, the reconciliation. A pleasant lady came to act as go-between. I mumbled my repentance in broken French and she, understandingly, turned on Apples to make sure that I was heard, booted up software (logiciel, in French), and soon the whisping and wasping and beeping and blinking of the beige machines got the message across. I'd been forgiven . . .

How distant Europe seems now after some weeks back. And how deep the mystery seems again at the Apple's core. How could I have been so faithless! Next time I go I'll carry a IIc just to be on the safe side.

ere is what I've culled from the mass of summer mail — aiming to please widely and to spare you the stuff that you probably get anyway . . .

Probe Your Unconscious Mind with Cope. Trouble making decisions? Terrified of flying? Do you need to lose a score or so of unwanted flab? Can't sleep nights? Your Apple and Cope to the rescue! Cope is software available from Cabononics, P.O. Box 10534, Rochester, NY 14610-0534. The developers, Ronald Levy and Sidney Rosen, both clinical psychiatrists, point out that the disk-based, interactive sessions are cheaper (most at \$69.95) than visiting a psychiatrist once. The concept is based on an observation by Levy that patients of his who'd used a computerized therapeutic program fell into a "hypnotic-like" state which, per claim, was helpful in tapping their inner knowledge. To order — or inquire — by telephone, call 1-800-448-3400.

Bank by Modem. Bank of America offers a service called HomeBanking. You need a modem to use the system; once you've logged on, you can carry out routine checking activities, transfer funds from account to account, and bills (600 participating stores, utilities, credit card companies, etc.). The service costs you far more than you'll save, of course (my comment), because for \$6 per month you can buy a lot of postage. But the appeal, here, is to be first on the leading edge of things — and paying bills by Apple may be a lot less painful (psychologically) than the oldfashioned way on the kitchen table. The number to call -1-800-652-1111.

Shopping List. For a mere \$34.95 you can buy "Grocery List," a program that gives you shopping options and you can prepare shopping lists in which the items will appear in aisle order. I presume (no, I'm dead sure, actually) that the aisle locations have to be entered by you when you first initialize the program — because no software house can know the aisle arrangement of all stores everywhere. (This is one of those programs I've thought of independently but never got around to writing — yes, including the aisle idea). Write to Computerized Management Systems, 1039 Cadiz Dr., Simi, CA 93065.

CPMUG. The CP/M Users Group, 1651 Third Avenue, New York, NY 10028 will send you a mplete CPMUG catalog showing the contents of se group's 100 volumes of software, available (among others) for appropriately equipped Apple computers. Cost is \$10. Diskette volumes cost \$18 each.

Bible Lesson. The apple played a role in man's fall. Now an offer to use the Apple in man's (and woman's) redemption. Computer-based instruction is available (three diskettes, each for \$29.95) which provides overviews of the Bible. More instruction packets are in preparation. The company's peculiarly modern name is C-4 Computer Company, P.O. Box 1408, Champaign, IL 61820. Turns out that the name stands for "Christ, Covenant, Community and Change."

A Different Drummer. Quoting the press release: "PVI annonces the introduction of Drum-Key, an electronic music interface board and software package for use with stereos, electric instrument amplifiers, and the user's Apple II series computers." PVI is Peripheral Visions Incorporated, Great Valley Parkway, Malvern, PA 19355 (215/647-3930). Drum-Key uses digital recordings of 28 actual drum and percussion instruments for highly realistic sound effects. Lots of features, including 100 rhythm patterns and 26 songs that come built-in. The price is \$139.

Handicapped. A conference on Computer Technology for the Handicapped will be held here September 13-16, 1984. This will be a large, national conference, including an exhibition. The target is the professional. Pre-registration fee is \$150; after September 1, \$175. Contact Closing The Gap at P.O. Box 68, Henderson, MN 56044 or call 612/248-3294.

Educational Software. Another source is SLIWA Enterprises Incorporated (Apple, IBM, TRS-80). Send for their catalog . . . 2360-J George Washington Highway, Yorktown, VA 23692 (804/898-8386). They specialize in software for high schools.

There was a lot more mail, of course, but I threw most of it away, with a sigh, to be sure, and the errant thought that printers are the people who benefit most from the micro-explosion. Never before have so many covered so much paper with ink selling pretty much the same old stuff.

Merge

A tutorial by Tom Alexander

he Merge portion of the RENUMBER program can save the programmer a lot of time and keystrokes. Last month the Renumber portion of the RENUMBER program was examined. This month our focus will be on Merge but Renumber will play a big part in the process of merging one program with another.

Because the line numbers of the file to be inserted in the main program must sequentially compatible with the line numbers of the main program, some changes to each file will most likely have to be made.

For instructional purposes let us assume that our main program's lines are numbered from 10 to 2000 in increments of 10. After completing the main program named MAIN, the programmer decides that a routine should be inserted between lines 990 and 1510. The programmer wrote the code for the same routine in a program named SAMPLE. This routine is in line numbers 700 to 1200 of that program. It will save time and effort if that portion of the -SAMPLE program could be merged with the MAIN Well, the Merge and Renumber program. portions of the RENUMBER program on the DOS 3.3 SYSTEM MASTER disk can do just that.

First, the routine in the SAMPLE program must be extracted from that program and saved to a new program we will call INSERT. Second, the MAIN program must be renumbered to provide the necessary space for INSERT. After it has been renumbered, MAIN is placed in the HOLD buffer. Then INSERT must be renumbered to conform with the space provided by the MAIN program. (Lines 1000 to 1500)

Third, merge the two files.

The procedure:

Step 1

- (1) Insert the data disk containing SAMPLE in drive one.
- (2) Turn the computer on or reboot the system.
- (3) Type: LOAD SAMPLE.
- (4) After SAMPLE is in memory, LIST the program to verify the line numbers to be extracted. Assume the lines are 700 to 1200.
- (5) Type: DEL 1, 699 Return
- (6) Type: DEL 1201, 2010 Return (7) Type: LIST Return. The LISTing should
- now be from 700 to 1200.
- (8) Type: SAVE INSERT Return.

That portion of SAMPLE to be merged with MAIN is now a free-standing program. A CATALOG of the disk will verify this. Before INSERT can be renumbered, it is a good idea to check the LISTing of the program to ascertain the total number of lines in it to determine where the MAIN program's second part should be numbered from. Assume this will be line 1510.

Step 2:

- (1) Remove the data disk from drive one and insert the DOS 3.3 SYSTEM MASTER disk.
- (2) Reboot the system.
- (3) When the blinking cursor appears on the monitor, Type: RUN RENUMBER. The first screen will give the correct syntax to use Press Return. for the program. second screen will appear with 'RENUMBER IS INSTALLED AND READY' at the top. The blinking cursor will appear on the left side.
- (4) Remove the SYSTEM MASTER disk from drive one and replace it with the data disk.
- (5) Type: LOAD MAIN. After a few moments the
- MAIN program will be in memory.

 (6) Type: & S 1000, E 2010, F 1510, I 10. The ampersand (&) will activate the RENUMBER program. The S means Start at line 1000, E means End the renumbering procedure at line 2010, F means the First new line number is 1510, I means Increment by 10.
- (7) Type: LIST. Check to see if MAIN is now numbered from 10 to 990 and then from 1510 to 2510.

The open space between lines 990 and 1510 is now ready to accept INSERT but that program must be renumbered.

- (8) Type: & H Return. After Return is pressed, PROGRAM ON HOLD, USE "& M" TO RECOVER will appear on the monitor. This will tell you that MAIN is in the HOLD buffer readied for merging.
- (9) Type: LOAD INSERT Return. After a few moments INSERT will be in the main memory.
- (10) Type: & S 700, E 1200, F 1000, I 10 -Return.
- (11) Type: LIST Return. Check to see if INSERT is now numbered from 1000 to 1500.

Step 3:

(12) Type: & M - Return. This will merge INSERT with MAIN.



News from Afar

or Current Rumors by Dan Buchler

ast month, I re-activated a column in this newsletter about rumors emanating from a strange place called Afar. The column is continued this month. I need input of rumors from all of you!

Mac things:

The double-sided drives, when they arrive, will double the already high capacity of the Mac drives from 400K bytes to 800K bytes. Unfortunately, those drives are still some time away, so don't go rushing out to your dealer loking for them. Several other PC manufacturers plan to announce or have just announced use of the same 3-1/2 inch Sony type diskettes, though they will probably only get 270K per side. Apple writes data in rings of 5 different packing densities.

A program, selling for \$99, by Dilithium Press, provides software for a Mac and an IBM PC, so that they may talk to each other.

The 512K byte Mac (informally known as Fat Mac) will become available only when Apple can get enough 256Kbit dynamic RAM (DRAM) integrated circuits to ensure they can meet their manufacturing demands. Four US IC maufacturers and three Japanese companies are making the 256K DRAMs. The Japanese have concentrated on an NMOS technology that uses more power than the CMOS technology used by the US manufacturers. The bottom line is when there will be enough. Apple are hoping this will happen by the end of the year.

One rumor suggests that Apple will have two Mac models; a 128k version, like the current version, which will sell for \$2000 (a price reduction of \$500), and a 512k version which will sell for \$3000. Anyway, some software developers are declining to squeeze their programs into 128k. They are electing to wait for the 512k version. The most notable example of this is Lotus with its Mac version of 1-2-3. The Mac version sounds more like the just released PC Symphony, which, though it does most things, also sets you back \$700. Symphony has been criticized by several reviewers as being too complex to use. If an analogy with Multiplan is valid, where the Mac version is supposedly much more user friendly than the PC version, then Mac Lotus should be a better product than Symphony! I wonder what the Mac version will cost?

Many articles have appeared in the national press bemoaning the absence of software for the Mac. Well, I seem to see about 2 new announcements each week, which isn't too bad.

I am confident, that by the time we get to Christmas, there will be alot of software. Anyway, all you need is a spreadsheet, word processor, database manager, graphics and a communication program — according to Lotus!

//c:

Apple has just released a new "Compatibility Listing Update", dated July, 1984, that contains 4 categories in 93 pages. The categories are:

- Works on //e only.
- Works on //e and //c.
- Works on //c with minor differences.
- New or revised software for the //c.

If you are buying a //c, be aware of this listing, for things may not be what they seem. Apparently the two biggest problems, are:

- 1) the //c has special characters instead of inverse video of regular characters, and,
- 2) copy protect schemes that depend on spiral track or half track recording won't work on the //c.



- (14) Type: SAVE NEWMAIN Return. This will save the
 new program named NEWMAIN
 which includes INSERT
 merged with MAIN. Of
 course, you can name the
 new program anything you
 want.
- (15) Type: CATALOG Return.
 The catalog should now show all four programs that were used to merge the two programs MAIN, SAMPLE, INSERT, and NEWMAIN.

There are a few steps to remember in the Renumber and Merge routines but with each attempt the programs become a little more clear. Like most computer applications it takes practice and more practice.






