MacOSX Tip #2 Seeing Firewire Devices

The Symption: Using OSX, your computer has problems seeing a 3rd party Firewire hard drive or Firewire CD-RW Drive. I have a Blue & White G3 and find that this problem pops up on a semi-regular basis, especially with my Caldrive Firewire CD-RW drive. Firewire drives in general have to be supported by OSX. Verify with the manufacturer before purchase. For Firewire hard drives, the drive does should automatically mount to the desktop when your computer is started. If not, there is a problem. For Firewire CD-RW drives, when starting a program like Toast (which is used to burn CDs), you may get a message "No-CD Recorder". Or it may scan for an exceeding long time looking for a drive.

A Solution:To verify whether you have a hardware problem or a software problem, open the Apple System Profiler (located in the Application Folder/Utility Folder) and see if the device is listed. If it is not listed, then your Mac is not seeing it. While this is not a solution, it does offer a clue. I've noticed that when the "No-CD Recorder" message is there, the device will not show up in the Apple Profiler. For a Firewire hard drive- Turn the drive off and unplug it's Firewire cable. Then turn it on, wait a few moments and reconnect the Firewire cable. If all is well, the device will mount on your desktop. 

Spam Cop Report

Submitted by Dave Peck

Thirty to fifty emails a day, most of it spam- Is this you? If it is I'd like to tell you about spamcop.net. For a charge of \$2.50 per month, you can set up a spamcop.net email account that is virtually spam free. You can also set up your existing email accounts to have your mail forwarded to the spamcop.net account for filtering. And if you want, the spamcop account can be set up to forward the filtered email to your primary ISP email account.

I currently have 4 email accounts. My mac.com address was very simple to set up mail forwarding. Simply click on the "mail forward" button and type in an email address. For my primary email account with charter.net, I set up a second "clean" email account

that I've not used online before. This is optional. It's easy to configure your email program to go to spamcop.net and fetch your mail there. But I preferred to have my mail forwarded from spamcop.net back to my new email address at Charter. I had to call Charter to have them set up email forwarding to the spamcop.net account.

When the mail gets filtered through your Spam Cop account, any mail that is set aside as spam is not automatically tossed. It is held at spamcop and until you look at it and give it the thumbs up or down. This prevents an important message from being tossed without you seeing it. You might think that it is the same amount of work whether you are tossing messages at home or going to spamcop.net to toss them. But I've

found that I'm more efficient at home and I look forward to my email more than I used to. And it's very fast to look at the long list of spam being held at spamcop.net and click one button to toss it all. When I was getting the spam at home, I had to click on each message and delete.

That's it. So far so good. So far I've found the service works as advertised. Coming home after 4 days away recently, I had over 150 messages to wade through. Now with spamcop, I'm getting less than 10 emails a day. And none of it is spam.





When the Most is the Least

Submitted by Jim Nye (Struggling Apple Novice)

Since I've gotten my iMac less than 2 years ago I've been plagued with the remote access cutting out at unexpected times. An inquiry to the Apple Tech people only resulted in them telling me that the problem was caused by a noisy telephone line.

Recently on talking to a knowledgeable Apple tech about another problem, I mentioned that my errant remote access cuts out unexpectantly all the time. He suggested I change the modem setting to a slower speed. His explanation was that the slower modem speed allows the modem to handle the line noise better than the faster setting. At his suggestion, I changed the modem setting (modem panel) from Apple 56K V90 to Apple 56K V34. Voila! Suddenly my modem problem disappeared and IÇm now getting a stable connection to the Internet.

It was also interesting to hear Richard Becker, moderator at a recent Apple

meeting, explain that the Apple modems have somewhat of a reputation for being more sensitive to telephone line noise than some of the PC's. Mr. Becker also related that he solved his line noise problem by going to a slower modem setting.

Since changing to a slower speed modem I've had no remote access problems, and rather surprising, my iMac runs faster.



Jobs and Gates: The Odd Couple Endures

Whether or not they renew their cooperation pact, the two bosses know that their companies' fortunes are intimately linked.

I'll never forget that giant floating head. It belonged to Bill Gates, whose face was projected on a large screen, just like the Wizard of Oz, at the 1997 MacWorld Expo in Boston. The virtual Gates beamed down upon Apple chief Steve Jobs as he announced that Microsoft had signed a five-year agreement to support the Mac in its struggle for survival. Microsoft would not only continue to develop Office and Internet Explorer for the Mac but also invest \$150 million in Apple.

It was a paltry sum, considering Apple had billions in cash at the time. And Gates never had any intention of shutting down development for the Mac, since it has always been one of the software giant's most profitable markets. Nonetheless, the détente and its splashy announcement at one of Apple's biggest annual trade shows made for great theater. The press ate it up. Journalists switched from writing Apple's obituary to proclaiming its turnaround. And history has borne out those predictions.

UNSPOKEN SUPPORT. Now, this much-ballyhooed agreement is set to expire during the summer. Should Microsoft and Apple sign a new one? It's a question enlivening debate across the PC industry and the Mac community. But I say: Who cares? Adobe, Macromedia, and Quark haven't signed any multiyear deals lashing them to the Mac platform, yet no one doubts that they'll keep writing programs for it. So why should Microsoft, the largest Mac developer after Apple, need a pact to prove its commitment?

Nor does Apple need the publicity jolt. Five years ago, it was fighting for its life as its sales and market position plummeted. Today, the company is doing amazingly well especially considering the PC market's continuing weakness. Last week, Apple reported second-quarter profits of \$40 million, on revenue of \$1.5 billion, beating Wall Street estimates.

No longer do even ardent PC supporters write off Apple as irrelevant. A steady parade of new, eye-popping products, including the pocket-size iPod MP3 player and the flat-screen iMac, have refurbished Apple's image as a trendsetter. Thank goodness Jobs & Co. no longer needs the floating head of Bill Gates to generate favorable buzz about itself.

WATCH AND LEARN. Apple and Microsoft both know that, for better or worse, their fates are entwined. No one would take the Mac seriously if it couldn't run Office and Internet Explorer, which dominate the markets for productivity software and Web browsers, respectively. Even graphic designers, the most ardent of Mac aficionados, write their invoices using Microsoft Word. And the release of an OS X version of Office is driving acceptance of Apple's new operating system.

As for Microsoft, its need for Apple is varied and complex. For one, the Mac version of Office is among Microsoft's most profitable products. Office is even more dominant on the Mac platform than it is on PCs.

Plus, although he'd rather choke a monkey than admit it, Gates uses Apple as his shadow research and development team. Nearly every innovation pioneered by Apple has been eventually incorporated into Windows. Isn't imitation the highest form of flattery? Indeed, the Microsoft chairman has long professed his admiration of the Mac operating system's technical genius.

SMILES AND STABS. Gates also needs Apple for political cover. It's hard enough to argue with a straight face that Microsoft is no monopolist. Imagine trying to make that argument without Apple as the stylish alternative to Windows. It couldn't be done not even by the wily Gates. That's why he's always using Apple to illustrate why Microsoft has no stran-

glehold on the software industry.

Apple and Microsoft love to trumpet how well they get along at least in public. But both have also demonstrated a glee in stomping on each other's foot at every opportunity. Take Microsoft's offer to settle civil antitrust litigation by flooding schools with \$1 billion in free software and services. Schools, of course, are Apple's largest single market, and it heatedly objected to Microsoft's proposal.

And Apple rejected using one of Microsoft's sites as the default home page for new Macs. Instead, it chose Netscape.com, a unit of Microsoft archrival AOL Time Warner.

And so it goes, shaking hands one minute, trading punches the next. That's the way it has always been between Microsoft and Apple, Gates and Jobs. You won't find two stranger bedfellows in any industry.

More about Batteries

More about Batteries by Justin Granger Small Dog Electronics

Since I shared my suspicion that Liion batteries might still have a memory problem, I have learned a little bit more about rechargeable batteries. Thanks to a few subscribers setting me straight, I decided to do a little more research. Let me share what I've learned with you.

Li-ion batteries (Lithium-ion, as in the newer laptops) do not have a memory, but they do have a life span. Li-ion batteries are good for two to three years, regardless of how frequently they are used. Their capacity will hardly diminish until their life span is up, at which point it drops rapidly. Pound for pound, they can hold twice the charge of a Ni-Cad.

Ni-Cad batteries (Nickel Cadmium, used in rechargeable AA, C, and D cells, and very old laptops) probably

have the longest life span of any type of rechargeable, as long as they are always completely drained before recharging. They can last thousands of cycles, with only a slight steady decrease in capacity. Unfortunately, battery memory can render an ill-treated battery useless in weeks, and they hold far less power than new styles of battery.

Ni-MH batteries (Nickel-Metal Hydride, popular for laptops before the introduction of Li-ion) hold more per pound than the Ni-Cad batteries they were meant to replace. Unfortunately, they do not last very long. Their life span is limited by the number of charge-discharge cycles they are subjected to, and their capacity drops quite a bit after 300 cycles.

Lithium Polymer batteries (as seen in the iPod) are a newer type of Li-ion battery. Their charge-discharge characteristics are almost the same, but they have a gel inside instead of a liquid. This means that they are less likely to leak.

Here's a breakdown in capacity per weight, thanks to "What's New In Radio Communication" Feb/Mar 1999

Lead Acid (car batteries): 14 watts/lb

Ni-Cad (old laptops, regular cells): 16 watts/lb

Ni-MH (intermediate laptops): 21 watts/lb

Li-ion (modern laptops): 35 watts/lb

Storage: If you are going to store your Li-ion battery (i.e., not use it for a week) try to leave it discharged. The inverse is apparently true for a Ni-Cad or Ni-MH battery; they should be left charged.



In Memory Of Rodney O. Lain

June 17th, 2002

Rodney O. Lain: the loudestmouthed S.O.B. to ever set virtual pen to virtual paper. The man had the nerve to write things designed to piss me off, and worse yet, to make me think. I loved him for both of those things, and for many more reasons. Rodney O. Lain passed away this weekend, and I am a sad man. I first encountered Rodney when I was working on Mac OS News Around The Web, our once and future guide to outside news around the rest of the Internet. How could I miss him? Rodney wrote for just about every publication in the Mac Web! "How dare he?!," I thought. "Man, that guy's such a writingwhore!"

I read his work, however, and my reactionary outrage quickly turned into open admiration. Rodney was good. In fact, he was one of the best writers in the Mac Web. I admired his work, and after I met him at one of the MACWORLD shows, I admired him too. He was likable, charismatic, and charming, as well as being a good writer. I quickly decided I wanted him to write for The Mac Observer.

By this time, Rodney was writing for MacAddict's online arm under the name iBrotha, but he threw his hat onto our masthead anyway. When MacAddict decided to cut his column for financial reasons, he brought iBrotha to TMO, which absolutely delighted both Dave Hamilton and me. When Rodney later decided to limit his writing to only two sites, TMO and Low End Mac, we were even happier. You see, I was proud to publish Rodney's work. Every time I got a submission from him, I couldn't wait to read it. I delighted in his thoughtfulness, and I reveled in his ability to enrage the local yokels. I admired his turn of word, and I coveted the capacious memory that provided for a relevant quote or two to start off every opinion piece he wrote. I loved talking to him, and I enjoyed spending time with him during MACWORLD shows, though that didn't happen often enough. I looked forward to seeing his opinions and posts in our forums, and I suggested

to him a time or two that we should write a Mac book together, something both of us wanted to do. I also talked him out of quitting his writing in the Mac world on more than one occasion. It took me a while to understand, and for him to tell me. but Rodney was battling depression. I never knew how hard that battle was for him, however. That's been a recurring theme since news of his death broke over the weekend; the thing I have heard most from people who knew him in the virtual world was "I never knew." Rodney never let it show in his writing, and none of us could have known.

It's funny, his writing. Rodney often

deliberately wrote expressly to elicit flames from his readers, something many of whom failed to see. When I was researching all of the sites Rodney had written for, I stumbled across one Web site dedicated to dissecting, criticizing, and insulting both Rodney and his work. From the T.E.M.P. site, by one Montgomery Gabrys (including the incorrect punctuation): Rodney is a very scary person. Not because he's working part time at a CompUSA while holding a degree (or any retail location that sells Macs - did I mention he "used" to work at Best Buy before they stopped carrying them?) part-time just so Apple computers are presented in the best possible light with the general public, but because he lives breathes and eats Apple. His mission has progressed to the point of him "wanting to become a black Guy Kawasaski". Odd enough to want to pattern your life based on someone else's job title of "evangelist" - but it's even wierder when the person he's parodying is no longer doing that job in the first place and has gone on to do other and better things Feel free to check out the site for yourself; it's full of such diatribes and rants all about Rodney O. Lain. Amazing. One guy gets all up in arms about a Mac lover's obsession by obsessing over that Mac lover, and fails to see the irony. miniapples Bylaws

NAME OF ORGANIZATION The name of the organization is Minnesota Apple Computer Users' Group, Inc. hereafter called "mini'app'les." PURPOSE

The purpose of the organization is to promote the dissemination of information concerning the use of Apple Computers and products related thereto, and to share the knowledge of members at large concerning their talents and information pertaining to computers in general.

MEMBERSHIP

Members of mini'app'les are required to pay annual dues, which will be due on the anniversary of the month they joined. 1112 41. 1 .

The actual amount of dues will be set by the board. A application fee may be charged at the discretion of the board.

Annual dues must be received by anniversary date or membership shall be terminated.

Membership rights will be extended to the immediate household upon receipt of dues from the household. Each membership shall have the right to cast one vote.

Membership will not be denied because of race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

Members are expected to abide by these bylaws.

Benefits of membership shall include: A subscription to the mini'app'les newsletter.

Eligibility to purchase mini'app'les

These eight officers are the governing board of the mini'app'les and all mini'app'les business will be conducted by this board.

Except for the Past President, officers are elected for term of one year. The term runs from May 1 to April 30. The office of Past President will automatically be given to the retiring President. If a President is elected for sequential terms, the incumbent Past President will remain in office. If Past President resigns or relinquishes office, the President shall appoint a Director at Large to complete Past President term and duties. If an officer resigns or relinquishes

office, the President shall appoint a replacement in a timely manner subject to board approval.

If the President resigns or is unable to perform the duties of the office; the Vice President shall assume those

In the absence of the President and Vice President the officers may appoint an acting President.

Board members may be removed from office by a two-thirds majority vote of the board. A recall election shall be held within 60 days of presentation of an impeachment petition bearing the verified signatures of at least five percent of the membership.

The President, Vice President, or Secretary may call a general membership meeting. Membership shall be notified of time, place, and purpose of meeting through the mini'app'les newsletter or a special mailing. Election of Officers.

Nominations will be made by a nominating committee.

Further nominations from members will be accepted at a general membership meeting to be held in February.

The subsequent list of nominees with such statements as they may wish to make pursuant to their candidacy shall appear in the April newsletter. The election will be by means of a written ballot as published in the April newsletter. Ballots will be accepted at mini'app'les meetings or by mail. All ballots must be received by April 28th. A simple majority of those voting is necessary for election. Results of this election shall be published in the newsletter not more than 60 days following the election. Board members must be paid up members of the mini'app'les. If a board member's membership lapses, they have effectively resigned from the board of directors, and the board shall so notify them and make record in the minutes.

No member or membership may hold more than one board position or vote except as noted in bylaws.

LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES General Duties. The duties of the elected officers are in general to: Promote the purpose and membership of mini'app'les.

Administer the bylaws of the mini'app'les.

Assure the financial well-being of the mini'app'les.

Attend and report at each board meet-

Carry out decisions of the board in a timely manner.

Appoint staff and committees as necessary, subject to board approval. Communicate to the board the needs of appointed staff and membership in general.

Duties of the President. The President

Provide leadership and direction to the general membership and to the board of directors.

Prepare an agenda for each board meeting.

Chair mini'app'les board and general

membership meetings at which business is conducted.

Assign duties to board and staff members.

Establish goals to be reached during the term in office.

Duties of the Vice President. The Vice President will:

Assist the President with the duties of that office and in the absence of the president, assume the duties of that office.

Organize the program, facilities and equipment for general membership meetings including meetings for nominations or voting by membership. Coordinate participation in events, such as trade shows and seminars. Duties of the Treasurer. The Treasurer will:

Maintain the mini'app'les financial records and records of mini'app'les assets.

Prepare a written financial report to include income, disbursements, current account balances and assets, at each board meeting. This report will be included in the minutes.

Prepare an annual budget.

Be cognizant of and act upon requirements of the IRS and Minnesota State Department of Revenue in a timely and efficient manner.

Administer the collection of all monies due the mini'app'les.

Establish and maintain bank accounts in the name of the mini'app'les.

Deposit all monies in the mini'app'les bank account(s) in a timely and efficient manner.

Pay all bills and demands as authorized by the board.

Duties of the Secretary The Secretary will:

Record in a permanent form the minutes of all board and general membership meetings at which business is conducted.

Record the results of elections. Archive and maintain all mini'app'les records other than those kept by the Treasurer.

Keep a mini'app'les calendar.
Assist the President and Vice President in correspondence as required.
Duties of the Past President. The Past President will:

Provide continuity in the leadership of the mini'app'les.

Assist the President with the duties of that office.

Provide historical references for decision making process.

Duties of the Publications Director.

The Publications Director will:
Oversee publication of the newsletter.
Appoint with consent of the board:
Newsletter Editor and assistants
Advertising Coordinator
Marketing Director. The Marketing
Director will:

Oversee the maintenance and processing of membership records and materials

Promote membership.

Duties of the Interest Group Director.
The Interest Group Director will:
Oversee all matters related to the
development and maintenance of
Special Interest and Community
Interest groups

Encourage and assist in the formation of new interest groups

Act as spokesperson to the board for group representatives FINANCIAL

The mini'app'les will maintain an account(s) at a local financial institution. Such accounts shall bear interest as the law allows.

The Signatories on the account(s) shall be:

President

Vice President

Treasurer

One signature will be required to disburse funds from the account(s). The authorization of expenditures will be accomplished by the board approving an annual budget that covers the miniapp'les budget year. The budget year shall run from August 1 to July 31. Those expenditures not budgeted items, or budgeted items which exceed the budgeted amount by more than \$25.00 will require majority approval of the board.

Proper verification of expenditures will be required before the funds will be disbursed.

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the entire net assets remaining after payment of any or all liabilities and obligations of the corporation shall be disbursed in a manner agreeable to a majority of the board members at a specially convened open board meeting and consistent with IRS and State regulations. Notice of this meeting shall be made known to all mini'app'les members through the newsletter or a special mailing 30 days in advance of the meeting.

A Surety Bond shall be obtained, nam-

A Surety Bond shall be obtained, naming the above signatories as principals.

BOARD MEETINGS

The business of the mini app'les will

be conducted at board meetings, except for general membership meetings or voting by the general membership.

The Board of Directors shall meet at least every other month at a place and time designated by the miniapples president.

A quorum shall consist of 4 or more officers and no business shall be transacted if a quorum is not present. Notice of board meetings shall be published 30 days in advance of all regularly scheduled board meetings. In emergency situations, officers may agree to meet at any time, but all business transacted will be subject to reconsideration at the next regularly scheduled board meeting. Minutes of the emergency meetings shall be made publicly available in the next issue of the mini'app'les newsletter and/or at the request of any member. The board of directors may designate three or more of its members to constitute an executive committee. To the extent determined by the board, the executive committee has the authority of the board in the management of the business of mini'app'les. The executive committee shall act only in the interval between board meetings and at all times shall be subject to the control and direction of the board. Any activity shall be reported to board at next meeting. Minutes of the board meetings will be made available no later than 60 days following that meeting.

All meeting of the board will be open to the general membership of the mini'app'les.

All members are encouraged to bring issues to the board. This shall be done by submitting agenda items in writing to the president in advance of the board meeting.

Decisions will be made by a simple majority of the board members present, the President voting only in the case of a tie.

At least once per year, the board will examine these bylaws for needed changes following the procedure set forth in section H.

BYLAWS

Requests for changes in the bylaws will be made in the mini'app'les newsletter at least four months prior to the election of officers.

The board will act on this request and on other items pursuant to changes in the bylaws at a board meeting at least three months prior to the election of officers.

Changes to the bylaws suggested by the board will be published in the mini'app'les newsletter.

The ratification will be by means of a written ballot as published in the mini'app'les newsletter. Ballots will be accepted at mini'app'les meetings or by mail. All ballots must be received by the 28th of the month in which vote is taken. A two-thirds majority of those voting is necessary for ratification of the changes to bylaws.

Changes to these bylaws become effective the first day of month following publication of notice of ratification in the newsletter. Such notice shall appear not more than 60 days after the closing date for receiving ballots

In the event of meeting cancellation, the officers will make every effort to contact the local members through the media or other means as appropriate.

All Books and Records to be audited not less than once per year by a committee of members, not including officers, appointed by board.
All applicable Federal and Minnesota laws and statues apply and supersede where bylaws do not comply with said laws and statutes.

Digital Cameras and Old Powerbooks

Want to get one of those new digital cameras but don't have a place to store all the pictures you plan to take on that vacation to Duluth or the Mediterranean? Have an older PowerBook you'd like to use with that new digital camera but it doesn't have a USB or a FireWire connection? There are things you can do to combine that new camera and the old PowerBook.

There are two styles of adapters that permit you to easily transfer images from your digital camera to your old PowerBook. One of the adapters fits into the 3.5 inch floppy disk drive of your PowerBook: the second slides into the PCMCIA or PC slot.

The floppy drive adapter has electronic circuitry within it that transfers the data from the SmartMedia or CompactFlash storage media card as if the data had been stored on a 3.5 inch floppy. Your computer is fooled into thinking it is receiving data from a 3.5 inch floppy. Because the data transfer is handled like a floppy drive transfer, the data is transferred at a rate appropriate for floppy drives. The floppy adapter has a battery or two to provide power for the electronic circuitry.

The PC adapter's electronic circuit transfers the card data via the PowerBook's PC bus. The PC bus provides power to the adapter so no batteries are needed. Since the PC bus has a fairly high data transfer rate, it takes less time to move the data from the card to the PowerBook than it does through a floppy disk port. A Type II PC card adapter is a very convenient way to transfer pictures to your old PowerBook from a SmartMedia or CompactFlash card.

A PC adapter costs around \$40. There are adapters made by several manufacturers available from web-based retailers like MacMall. Local retailers also sell PC adapters. CompUSA sells an adapter made by Antec. At a place like CompUSA, you will need to buy the adapter from the IBM-compatible counter. The salesmen will tell you their adapter is not compatible with a Macintosh (that's what they told me), but that is not true. With the File Exchange control panel in place, your Mac can access the image data through the adapter with no problem. If you have any doubts, take your PowerBook and your storage media card with images to the store with you and verify the adapter works correctly (at CompUSA, they let me try the adapter before I bought it).

With the storage media card inserted into the adapter and the adapter inserted into one of the PC slots in the side of your PowerBook, a PC-formatted disk shows up on your desktop. On a 1400, the disk is named "untitled." Double-click on "untitled" to open it: inside the "untitled" folder is a folder named "DCIM." With our Olympus digital camera, when we double-click on "DCIM" we reveal a folder named "100OLYMP." Doubleclicking on "100OLYMP" reveals all the images stored by the digital camera. Select all the images (enter command-A) and drag them to the desktop or to a folder you have established previously. Your images are now ready for processing. You can use the Mac to delete the images from the storage media card; select the images to be deleted, drag them to the trash or use the contextual menu to send them to the trash, but be sure that you empty the trash before you eject the card. You can, if you prefer, use your camera to delete the images after you return the SmartMedia or CompactFlash to the camera.

Since each set of images you transfer may occupy as much as 128 megabytes (MB) of storage on your PowerBook, you need to have lots of space available on the PowerBook's hard drive. Our PowerBook had a 2.1 gigabyte (GB) hard drive that was more than 50% utilized by programs and data for those programs. It seemed like more space would be needed to store three or four weeks of vacation photos, so I bought a 10 GB drive from MCE Technologies on the internet; the hard drive came with clear installation instructions and an adapter for mounting the hard drive in the same location as the old drive. I transferred all important data to a desktop computer, installed the new

hard drive, formatted it, installed the operating system and applications, and moved the data back from the desktop machine. The upgraded 1400 works very well. If you buy a new hard drive but aren't confident enough to exchange the hard drive yourself and you don't want to pay a dealer to do the installation for you, the hardware gurus at the Vintage Mac/Apple Special Interest Group (SIG) may be willing to help make the exchange. Call the SIG leader (see the newsletter cover for the name and phone number) and indicate your interest in attending the SIG and obtaining their help. Before going to the meeting, make sure to copy all your data to another medium (another hard drive, a Zip disk, a CD, and so forth). If there is time and you bring your operating system and application installation CDs to the meeting, you may also be able to get your software re-installed.

If your "old" PowerBook is a G3 or G4 machine capable of running iPhoto, you can use that program to manipulate your images. If you aren't lucky enough to have a fairly new "old" PowerBook, Adobe's Photoshop Elements is an excellent application for working with your pictures. Even if you have iPhoto available, you might want to have Elements' processing power available to you. You can use Elements to lighten and darken, change contrast, crop, remove blemishes, and add special effects to your pictures; it performs many other operations as well. Photoshop Elements has a list price of \$99; it is available through the internet or at MicroCenter, CompUSA, or the Apple store.

Working with pictures requires a lot of processing power and happens more efficiently when lots of memory is available. If your PowerBook takes a long, long time to process a picture and you would like to speed things up, the first thing to try is to add some memory; the more memory you add, the fewer times the operating system must slow down the processing by using the hard drive for "virtual" memory. The hardware gurus at the Vintage Mac/Apple SIG can be consulted relative to how much memcontinued on page 11

If your PowerBook still does not have enough punch to modify pictures quickly enough back at the motel or condominium, you can install an accelerator. Accelerators replace the old PowerBook processor card with a newer, faster, more powerful processor. Accelerators come in a wide vari-

ety of models and a given PowerBook may be able utilize several different models. You will need to explore the possibilities and decide how much processing power you need and how much money [\$150 - \$600] you are willing to spend (those hardware gurus mentioned before may be able to offer some advice). In some cases, it may be better to buy a new machine rather than update an old one; because an accelerator does not speed up the memory and input/output

buses the processor uses to talk to the rest of the world, an old machine with a 500 MHz processor will not complete a job as quickly as a new PowerBook with a 500 MHz processor. The choice is yours.

That old machine of yours can be very useful and help you conserve your resources. Give it a try.

Mac OS X lets you minimize an entire

Marathon

I'm a fairly normal guy. My life was good, until reality shifted into the Mac gaming zone. Feebly, I raised my arm to point. Gibberish drooled from my mouth as a vision appeared before my eyes. The music vibrated my soul "da da da...da-duh-da".....then the army choir shouted: MAR-Ah-THON!!"

Where was I? The Year: 1994. My Mac Performa (68030 processor) was at the local Mac Retailer being upgraded to a brand new PowerMac 7100. The Starship Marathon on the store's display Mac reeled me in and grabbed hard, just like an Alien's extensible chompers. A fleet alien figure came sprinting up the long corridor zapping me with electric shocks. And with just a pistol, I rose to the occasion-blam! blam! Despite my wife rolling her eyes, life had just gotten better.

Besieged by Pfhor, S'pht (no, I don't have a speech impediment), an assortment of alien critters and toyed with a rogue-personality-construct named Durandal, it can be argued that Marathon by Bungie Software is the single most influential game series to ever appear on the Mac's desktop. With an ancestry dating to Castle Wolfenstein, Doom, and Pathways Into Darkness, Marathon was the first good looking First-Person-Shooter (FPS). It had textures on the walls, gee-whiz lighting, an atmosphere, a story, maximum action, and lots of aliens to entertain you. It pushed the computer hardware of the time, but ran without a dedicated graphics card and most importantly, Mac users had it! While the PC minions were drooling over Doom (the poor deluded fools), Mac users were truly blessed with a superior gaming experience.

The first Marathon started with little fanfare, as you arrived on the Starship Marathon. Something was terribly wrong there. And immediately the assault on your senses began. In those early days, I remember being extremely tense and loving every minute of it. The Marathon Series is a story of heroism (yours), manipulation (Durandal's), and target practice, lots

of it as you search and explore exotic environments, search and destroy hostile aliens. The series whisked you from the Starship Marathon, to huge alien structures with planet-side vistas, cool blue waters and sometimes, the bubbly green slime of the sewers. Marathon never disappointed.

And greater than the solo story was the JOY, yes the joy of multiplayer gaming. Its multiplayer capabilities brought gamers together for countless LAN parties. I have probably forgotten more memorable moments than I can remember, there are so many of them. I remember my amazement that 4-8 players and their computers could be synchronized in a common arena for such good-natured carnage. Grenade hopping. The Bobs running around getting in your way, while shouting "they're everywhere!". The pesky floating bots that collapsed in a plume of smoke (when shot). Loon calls. The over grown, sludge-throwing sewer rats. The easy long shots when we were all new to this game. The splat of guts on the wall after a dead-on rocket impact. The juggernauts. The insane adrenaline rush of double sawed-off shotguns in a small arena. Players who live to snipe. The smiley face on the head of a rocket coming right at you. The Marathon mods-Like Devil in a Red Dress and Marathon Evil.

My list of favorite arenas is a huge one, but here are a few - Circular Death, Mutiny is Good, For a Few Shotguns More, Hata, Egan-rac, Mars Needs Women, B'rak Station, and most of the Randall Shaw (FrigidMan) maps not already mentioned.

This outstanding game fulfilled most of my multiplayer gaming needs for a good 7 years. Quite a run! Marathon is the only game from my first PowerMac that still remains on my hard drive. And fans don't want this game to go away.

At the last LAN party I attended (July 2002), we broke out Marathon (the original series) and gave it a shot. Sadly, the MacOS (classic v9.2) seemed to have left Marathon behind.** No one could get decent mouse performance from it. Although the Sun is setting on Marathon, its

place in the Mac Gaming Hall-Of-Fame is secure. And its influence and spirit lives on in games such as Unreal Tournament (with its Marathon Mods), Quake 3 Arena, and most significantly in the Microsoft/Bungie X-Box console game, "Halo", where you can still play "skull" games. (MS just announced their intentions to release the Mac/PC version of Halo.) I think I'm getting teary. So I'll wrap this up by saying, "Marathon-thanks for the memories! You got me addicted to computer gaming and my wife will never forgive you." (Still happily married.)

**Note: The Sun may not be set on Marathon just yet. Bungie set Marathon free several years ago with release of its code, which is now open source. Aleph One is a OpenGL update of the classic Marathon series. This version may work better with MacOS9.2 There is also a MacOSX version posted. I briefly looked at Aleph One press info, but have not played it. My impression is much work must be done to get it up to today's gaming graphic standards. If you'd care to critique Aleph One as compared to UT or Q3A, feel free to talk about it in the MacGamer Forums or drop me a note. See Marathon.org for the latest Marathon info. - D. Peck

Some common Macintosh keyboard shortcut combinations

Keyboard shortcuts can be a significant time-saver for those commands which are executed very often by a user. These keystrokes offer the advantage of being more direct in achieving a desired function. Integrating these shortcuts into one's computing habits will result in a more efficient and productive Macintosh session.

All these commands use the 'command' key, located next the space bar, on either side. This 'command' key also has the apple symbol on it as well. To issue one of these keyboard shortcuts, continually hold down the 'command' key and then hit the appropriate alphanumeric key (do not release the 'command' key until the alphanumeric key has been pressed). Here is a list of commonly-used functions supported by keyboard shortcuts

APPLE key = command
CONTROL key = Ctrl
ENTER key = Enter
OPTION key = Option
POWER ON key = PWR (note: this
key is on the top right corner of the
keyboard on some machines)

Force Quit (command - Option - ESC)

Use this feature with extreme caution. You should definitely not rely on this as a usual way to quit an application. It is useful in the event that you have unsaved work in other applications when your current application freezes up. By using this feature, you can return to the Finder and save the work in your other applications. You should restart your computer after using this feature.

To boot up PowerMac off CD-ROM (Hold down the letter "C" and Restart the Mac)

To boot up off external drive (command - Shift - Option - Delete and Restart the Mac)

Soft Boot Restart (command - Control - Restart)

This feature should also be used with

caution. Use only in the event of a freeze up and after you have tried Force Quit. It will restart your computer without having to turn it off and on again. The Restart button is one of two buttons found on some Mac models. It has a left-pointing triangle symbol on it. The buttons can be found on the side, back or front of the Mac. If your Mac has one, pressing it when your Mac has frozen, is the preferred method for restarting. The other button is called the Interrupt button and is used by programmers.

Reboot without Restart button (command - Control - Power)

Zap the PRAM (command - Option - P - R - and restart the Mac)

PRAM stands for Parameter RAM. Your Mac's Chooser and control panel settings are stored there, even when the computer is turned off. Sometimes these settings need to be reset.

Rebuild the Desktop (command - Option -.... at RESTART)

Take Snapshot of screen (command - Shift - #3)

This feature allows you to capture your screen as a PICT file. Files are saved on your hard drive as Picture X (where X is a number from 0 to 9.)

Turn Off Extensions (Shift -.... at RESTART)

This disables, for this startup only, any items that load at startup, such as system extensions, control panels, or chooser extensions. It also disables virtual memory, and background printing with Print Monitor, and turns the Disk Cache down to 16k (the minimum.) It also prevents launching any items in the Startup Items Folder.

To empty Trash with locked files (Option and Empty Trash from Special menu)

Bypass Set Start-up Device (command - Option - Shift - Delete -..... at RESTART) Copy Selection (command - C)

After a selection of text is highlighted, its contents can then be copied for temporary storage by typing command-C and be used elsewhere later on. Copying also works for names of icons in the system. See Paste Selection on how to place the copied information.

Cut Selection (command - X)

To remove a highlighted selection of text and temporarily save it, one can use command-X to cut it out immediately. See Paste Selection on how to place this cut information elsewhere.

Paste Selection (command - V)

Whether a highlighted selection of text has been copied or cut, it can be placed by positioning the cursor at the desired start point. Using command-V will paste the cut or copied information at that desired location.

Undo (command - Z)

For a faster undo, try command-Z. This key combination will restore the previous state before the most recent change. Most major applications which have an Undo feature use this key stroke combination as well.

New (command - N)

In the operating system, command-N will create a new folder in the current window. In applications which use documents, command-N creates something new but this depends on the type of application; some examples are New Window, New Spreadsheet, and New Document.

Open (command - O)

Using command-O from the system will open the icon which has been selected. If the icon is a document file or an application, it will start-up the appropriate application, just like dou-

ble-clicking on it with the mouse. If the icon is a folder, it will reveal its contents in a window. In an application, command-O usually opens an existing file for that particular application.

Close Window (command - W)

To close a particular window without having to click on that little box in the upper left hand corner, use command-W which performs the same function of closing it. Make sure that the window to be closed is selected before doing so.

Close All Windows (command - Option - W)

Save File (command - S)

Save File As -.... (Shift - command - S)

Make Alias (command - M)

Get Info (command - I)

For info on a particular icon, click on the icon and type command-I. For an icon representing an application, using command-I immediately displays the memory requirements and other information for that application.

Eject Disk - Permanently (command - Y)

Dragging a floppy disk or CD-ROM icon to the trash to eject a disk can be time consuming and misleading. An alternate way is to click on the disk icon and then hit command-Y, which will eject the disk and send its icon automatically into the trash.

Eject Disk - Temporarily (command - E)

Another way to temporarily eject a floppy disk or CD-ROM is to use command-E. Note that the icon does not go away from the desktop and expects to get the disk back sometime later in the session.

Duplicate (command - D)

To copy anything in the system with an icon, click on the icon and press command-D which will automatically create a duplicate of it.

Select All (command - A)

Typing command-A is a much quicker way of selecting everything. In the system, it selects all icons in the currently selected window (or desktop). In applications, it may select the entire contents of its current window.

Print (command - P)

The power of printing is also available to one's fingertips by pressing command-P.Most applications have this keyboard shortcut, which can also be used in the system. The dialog box of printing options appears as usual before the actual printing occurs.

Cancel (command - period)

In the Mac operating system, command-period (where 'period' is the period key) can be used as an alternative to clicking the 'cancel' button in cases where a dialog box is displayed.

Find (command - F)

The command-F shortcut works with the system and almost any application which has a finding feature.

Find Next (command - G)

To find the next occurrence of something much more quickly, try command-G. This shortcut bypasses any repeated button clicking that is required to perform this function when using the mouse.

Quit (command - Q)

Although there is no quit for the operating system itself, almost all Mac applications can be quit by using command-Q.

Word processor (ClarisWorks/AppleWorks 5) specific shortcuts. Select text and use the following commands.

Bold Text (command - B)

Italic Text (command - I)

Underline Text (command - U)

Copy Ruler (Shift - command - C)

Apply Ruler (Shift - command - V)

Insert Footnote (Shift - command - F)

Insert Column Break (enter)

Insert Page Break (Shift - enter)

Insert Section Break (Option - enter)

I have had several people write to me lately complaining about not being able to import certain music CDs with iTunes. Worse yet, these CDs occasionally get stuck in a drive and will neither mount or eject. On some systems, the machine will hang, and you cannot start up with the CD in the drive! These CDs are called "copy-protected" by the manufacturers. For those of us who rely on a computer as a music source, they can be "use-protected" as well!

Here's what's going on:

The data on an audio CD is just that: raw data. It is not structured like a file system, with a directory that contains information about the contents of the disk. An audio CD has just one file which is a continuous stream of information. This is so that CD players don't have to be very smart to read the data. In order for a player or drive

to detect the number and lengths of the tracks of a CD, it must scan through the audio portion of the disk, checking where each track begins and ends. Kind of a laborious process, but I guess being able to make a CD player without a microcontroller is worth the few seconds we must wait for a CD player to scan a disk.

Enhanced music CDs put additional information at the end of the audio track. They are essentially partitioned into two volumes. This is why they show up on your desktop as two separate items. (Ever drag a CD to the trash, and had it disappear but not eject? It might be an enhanced audio CD. Try looking for the other mounted volume.) While this is great marketing materiel for bands, even some computer games are published using this format. This is so you can listen to the soundtrack of the game in your car CD player and pretend you are flying an X-Wing instead of a '83 Oldsmobile. But I digress.

In order for a computer to recognize an enhanced CD, it must scan the entire disk and search for more data following the audio track. It must do this with every audio CD that's inserted, since there is no other way to distinguish between an audio CD and an enhanced CD. Usually, the drive finds nothing there. Sometimes, the drive finds data in a generic sort of file system that many computers can understand. Then you can watch you favorite band cavort on the tour bus with their Handy-Cam. And then sometimes...when you least expect it, you find a dirty trick.

Copy-protected CDs are not actually CDs, since they violate the standards set forth by the industry. Their first part is a standard audio track, one huge file of raw data. This is all a normal audio CCD player can see, so they play the CD without a second glance and stop at the end of the audio track. A smarter CD mechanism, like the CD-ROM drive found in

a computer (any computer, running any operating system), a smart consumer DVD player, or a professional-grade CD player will continue past the end of the CD and search for more data. This is where the trap lies.

There is no data at the end of the CD. but there are two sets of instructions. The first tells the drive to look for more data in the second part. The second part tells the drive to go find more data in the first part. Sony just handed your CD drive one of those little cards that says "Turn me over!" on the front and "Look on the other side!" on the back. Unfortunately, CD drives are too stupid to laugh at this first-grade joke and so they flip the card back and forth endlessly, while telling the computer, "Hang on, I have more data for you, just gimme a second..." Thus, your computer might even hang or fail to boot with one of these CDs inserted. At the least, your computer won't eject the disk because it's in use.

Here's what to do:

If you have a copy-protected CD stuck in your computer, try restarting and holding down on the mouse button. This should cause the computer to

eject the disk. In some cases, a manual eject may be necessary, by poking a paper clip into a small hole in the CD drive. OS X is smart enough to be able to eject these disks via iTunes or DVD Player, so you could boot holding the "x" key if you have OS X installed but are booting to OS 9. My favorite is to restart and hold Command-Option-OF at startup. In open firmware, type "eject cd" and that'll take care of it!

Due to successful lobbying by CD manufacturers and computer companies (including Apple), Sony is no longer able to put the CD logo on disks that contain this copy-protection scheme. Instead, they must clearly state that disk is incompatible with computers. I urge you to look closely at each CD you intend to purchase and make sure that it has the CD logo. If the logo isn't there, but you really must listen to the artist's work, download it from LimeWire and send the artist a couple bucks in the mail. That'll be one hundred times what they'd get from the record company anyway.

5. Tips for Ten: Capture That Window

With Mac OS X v10.2, you now have an additional option for capturing screen shots.

- 1. Type Command-Shift-3 to take a screen shot of your entire screen.
 2. Type Command-Shift-4 and Mac OS X will present you with crosshairs you can use to select whatever portion of your display you'd like to capture in a screen shot. And here's the new option:
- 3. Immediately hit the spacebar after typing Command-Shift-4. Instead of crosshairs, you'll see a little a camera. Move the camera around to highlight the Dock, the menu bar, the desktop, or any open window. Then just click the mouse to "snap" a screen shot. In fact, with this option, you can entirely eliminate the desktop when you capture a screen shot of an individual window.

6. iTunes Tip: Move That Column

You probably already know that you can tell iTunes to sort the music you're browsing simply by clicking one of the column heads. 



UPGRADE TO 10.2.1

By Art Hendrickson

It is strongly recommended that you update to 10.2.1 if you have made the move to Jaguar. There's a long list (included below) of bug fixes and corrections that may affect performance of your machine.

The following is copied directly from Apple's Knowledge Base Article 107036:

"There are two ways to update to from Mac OS X 10.2 to 10.2.1.

I. Automatic Software Update Installation

See technical document 106704, "Mac OS X: How to Update Your Software".

Because some updates are prerequisites for others, you may need to use Software Update more than once to get all desired updates.

II. Standalone Installer

Enhancements Delivered with this update

Disc Burning Enhancements

- * Allows CDs burned on a Mac to be read on Microsoft Windows.
- * Addresses a potential failure when burning a disc using iTunes 3 and a high burn speed.
- * Addresses an issue in which Disk Utility inaccurately reported "problems" when scanning a disc that was burned with iTunes or in the Finder.
- * Adds support for various third-party disc burners, including: TDK

VeloCD 241032FP and 241040F, MCE Technologies Lucid-24 24x10x24x Portable FireWire CDRW Drive, LaCie PocketCDRW 24x10x24 U&I, EZQuest Boa CDR/w 48x12x48 FireWire, Formac cdrw 40x10x40 and cdrw 48x10x40.

Digital Hub and Peripheral Device Enhancements

- * Decreases the amount of time Final Cut Pro takes to open, and improves iMovie compatibility when a Sony DVMC-DA1 media converter is connected to the computer.
- * Improves iMovie compatibility with Canopus ADVC-100 media converter.
- * Improves compatibility with certain (SCSI-based) scanners.
- * Improves compatibility of Image Capture with Epson DS (TWAIN).
- * Improves results when scanning in grayscale or black-and-white with Image Capture and Epson UI.
- * Enhances reliability when hot-swapping a FireWire-based camera on certain iMacs using Final Cut Pro.
- * Addresses an issue in which a USB keyboard or mouse is not recognized or able to wake the computer after having been connected to or disconnected from an external USB hub while the computer is in sleep.

Networking and Mail Enhancements

- * Addresses a situation in which certain Internet service providers (ISPs) may not accept outgoing email (SMTP) from computers using NAT and a ".local" hostname (which may be assigned by Rendezvous).
- * Prevents IMAP messages from being lost when your Internet connection is interrupted during a transfer.
- * Improves access to Mac OS X Server during heavy AFP load.
- * Improves Mac OS X Server reliability when a Mac OS 9 client attempts a scheduled AFP connection.
- * Resolves a potential issue in which Mail could fail to import mail messages from Eudora as expected.
- * Addresses an issue in which you

cannot browse the contents of an iDisk while a large file is being copied to it.

* Kerberos authenticator now allows keytabs to be disabled.

Printing Enhancements

- * Addresses a situation in which Print Center would unexpectedly quit when using St. Claire Software's Default Folder X.
- * Improves compatibility with HP LaserJet 4V and HP LaserJet 4MV printers (see Note).
- * Reduces occurrences of a "busy; source EIO (ATALK)" alert message when printing using AppleTalk via CUPS.
- * Addresses an issue when printing via CUPS in which the second queued print job would automatically start if the first print job was stopped.
- * Addresses an "error -1" message in Print Center when adding a thirdparty USB printer.

Note: This enhancement alleviates certain alert or log messages, but you still need to download an additional file. See technical document 107029, "Mac OS X 10.2: Cannot Print to HP LaserJet 4V or 4MV".

Other Enhancements

- * Reduces certain instances of Web page graphics taking longer than expected to appear.
- * Improves compatibility with Microsoft Entourage.
- * Reduces occurrence of a "ticking hard drive" sound that could be caused by IOAudio errors being written repeatedly to the system.log file.
- * Addresses an issue in which Mac Help may not be available following an erase-installation.
- * Improves compatibility of the Universal Access Zoom feature with some iBook computers.
- * Addresses a situation in which no video may appear after waking

certain iBook computers that are connected to an external display or presentation device.

- * Addresses a situation in which a Classic application may fail to produce sound after waking from sleep.
- * Addresses a situation in which AppleTalk may not be available in the

Classic environment after waking from sleep.

* Addresses various potential kernel panic situations."

As you can see, many issues are addressed in the 10.2.1 updater. You should definitely install this upgrade to your operating system.





Changing your PRAM battery

Many Mac and Mac-clone users cringe at the thought of replacing the PRAM battery in their desktop system.

While the actual replacement is fairly simple, it sometimes not easy to determine which type of battery to use or even find one when it's needed. Over the years, Apple has changed battery types several times and continues to change the part number.

While the confusion may continue let's see if we can't demystify the process and make things a little easier for everyone.

As a supplier of PRAM batteries to Mac users all over the world, our technical support group gets questions about these devices and the problems they can cause. Here are the most frequently asked questions about Mac PRAM batteries:

"Why can't I purchase a PRAM battery for my Mac at a local computer

store?"

There are several reasons. First, it's usually not in the computer store's best interest to sell you a PRAM battery because that would eliminate their ability to charge an installation or labor fee. Second, there are multiple types of PRAM batteries used in Macs and IBM compatible computers, so retailers and repair facilities simply can't stock them all. In reality, there are over a hundred different types of batteries used in Macs, Mac-clones

and IBM compatible computers. Most retailers and repair facilities keep the most common types (based on their usage) and order the rest, as needed. "Why won't my MAC start up when the PRAM battery is weak?"

Not all Macs exhibit problems with start-up. Most of the older Macs that use the 3.6 Volt Lithium, one-half AA battery (TL5101/S or equivalent) will start and run even if the battery is dead. However, users must replace information in "Chooser" (date, time, screen type, printer and network connection) in order to be able to use the system each time they start the system.

Unfortunately, a significant percentage of Mac Performas and Mac-clones use a different type of battery and exhibit some circuit anomalies that make them difficult, if not impossible, to start if the battery is weak or dead. If the PRAM battery can't provide at least 3.8 Volts, the system may not be able to start. Apple did the right thing by providing a 4.5 Volt alkaline battery (the Rayovac 841) that would eliminate the day-to-day problems. Unfortunately, alkaline batteries don't last as long as the Lithium batteries used in other Macs because of the way they operate and the characteristics of the alkaline chemistry. Alkaline batteries tend to self-discharge and don't have a shelf live that is anywhere near that of Lithium batteries.

It is also a good idea to pay attention to date codes when purchasing batteries. Don't purchase any alkaline battery with a date code older than two years. You need all the Voltage you can get in the Macs that use these devices. A factory-fresh battery should measure at least 4.65 Volts. If Rayovac made the battery, and it has a paper label, it is probably more than two years old and should be avoided. The one-half AA Lithium batteries have a much longer shelf life (typically five years or more) and aren't as susceptible to self-discharge and the phenomenon known as "thermal wear-out." It is also a good idea to avoid "bargain" batteries that have been stripped of solder tabs or were manufactured for special uses like alarm systems.

A little-known fact about Macs is that they continue to draw a small amount

of current from the AC supply (via the wall outlet) EVEN if they are turned off. The object of this design feature is to make the PRAM battery last longer. In the case of Lithium, it does. In the case of the alkaline batteries, the effect isn't quite as dramatic. As mentioned before, alkaline battery chemistry is susceptible to self-discharge and thermal wear-out due to the high heat produced in Mac CPU cases.

A significant number of Mac users call our technical support group and complain that their Mac was working fine until there was a power outage. When we ask whether or not the Mac was plugged into a surge suppressor that remained on all the time, they usually reply, "Yes." What happened is that the Mac ran off the wall current for a period of 2-3 years while the alkaline battery simply discharged due to its chemistry characteristics and the heat generated inside the Mac case. When the power came back on, there wasn't enough Voltage in the battery to energize the circuitry, so the Mac wouldn't start.

Unless you live in an area where heavy thunderstorms abound, we recommend that you leave your Mac plugged into a surge suppressor or UPS that is always left on. However, this brings up one VERY important point: If your Mac is connected to a phone line for the modem or a cable modem, you MUST have a surge suppressor on the telecom line. Nine times out of ten, when a damaging Voltage spike enters a home or a business, it comes in through the phone line! We recommend that ALL computers, answering machines, FAXes, etc, connected to the phone or cable modems use a surge suppressor. Our technical support staff regularly refers callers to their local phone book so they can read the safety information clearly printed in EVERY phone book that is distributed to the public. It simply reads: "When there are thunderstorms in your area, DO NOT pick up the telephone." The phone and cable companies are very much aware that their system is very susceptible to Voltage spikes from lightning.

"Is there a way to make my PRAM battery last longer?"

By now, you've probably guessed the

answer to this question. The way to get more battery life for Macs that use Lithium batteries is to simply leave the system plugged into a surge suppressor that is always left on. While you will also get a little more battery life with the alkaline batteries used in some Macs, you probably won't get more than 2-3 years. In some really extreme cases where the surge suppressor is turned off each day, the actual battery life is just over a year.

We've only covered two types of batteries up to this point. There is a third type of battery used in Macs that should be used in Power Mac 6100s and beyond. This includes the new Imac. That battery is a 3.6 Volt Lithium, one-half AA, battery (TL2150/S or equivalent) and looks exactly like the one used in early Macs. The only difference is that these devices have a high-current drain cathode. They are used because the SoftKey circuit in Macs produces a high drain on the PRAM battery circuit when the Mac "wakes up" via the keyboard. You can use other types of batteries but they typically won't last as long and can cause intermittent problems.

When you order a battery, consult one or more of the many cross-reference and self-help sites available on the Internet before you purchase or order a replacement PRAM battery. We also recommend that you visually verify which device is actually used in your desktop system before purchasing a battery. Computer manufacturers, including Apple, make engineering changes without documenting them or notifying the marketplace. Visually verifying what is in the system will eliminate the delays caused by an exchange and eliminate additional shipping charges.

"How can I tell if my battery needs to be replaced?"

If your Mac is losing time or you have to replace "Chooser" items like the screen type or printer connection when you boot the machine, it's time to replace the battery. If the battery is completely dead, the date will usually revert by to 1956 or some other odd date and the "Chooser" items will be gone.

With a couple of exceptions in the

Mac product line, replacing your PRAM battery is simple, whether it is the Lithium or alkaline type. Just remove the cover or slide the CPU board out, and locate the PRAM battery. A small number of Mac models have the PRAM battery installed underneath disk drives or, in the case of Quadra towers, the battery is in a small compartment near the cooling fan on the outside of the case. To change the one-half AA battery, you will have to remove the retaining clip that covers the plastic battery holder. Remove the old battery, and replace it with the new one. Then re-install the retaining clip and reassemble.

Removing a Rayovac alkaline battery can sometimes be tricky. Sometimes the Velcro patches become fused due

to the heat generated in the CPU case. The adhesive used to hold the patches in place runs and seeps between the hook and loop material. If this happens, unplug the Berg connector that connects the battery to the CPU board. Then, place a finger under one corner of the battery and GENTLY lift and twist the battery. Don't just lift the battery up and stress the CPU board, as this can cause problems! Normally, you can just unplug the connector and gently lift the battery out. Install the new battery (the plug is polarized, so you can't put it in backwards) and reassemble the CPU

When you restart, open "Chooser" and input the correct date, time, screen type, printer and network con-

nections, and you're ready to go!

Multiple OSX partitions

Symptom: In OSX you see multiple copies of your partitions in Sherlock.

Possible Suspect: A preference problem

Troubleshoot: Run Disk Utility from the OSX install CD and verify your partitions are in good shape. They check ok. Create a second user and see if the problem exists when you start Sherlock. The problem goes away. When you run a program, it's settings go into your User Folder under Library/Preferences. When you create a new user and they run Sherlock, a new set of preferences are set which go into their user folder.

The solution based on this scenario: Open the harddrive icon on the desktop which holds the OSX system. Navigate to the Users folder to your user folder (that was displaying the problem). Open Library/Preferences and remove the Sherlock Preference Folder and the com.apple. sherlock.plist file. Restart. The problem should have gone away. While this problem was of a very specific nature. This technique could be used for other situations. If there is a problem, see if it occurs with a different user. That narrows it down to a problem in your User folder.

Yellow Dog Linux (for PowerPC)

No doubt by now you've heard of Linux as one of the other alternatives to Microsoft Windows. You may have made the connection that Mac OS X is based on a UNIX platform very similar to Linux. But did you know that Linux is a viable operating system for your Mac?

A variety of Linux distributions are available for the PowerPC processor, and there's even one for the 680x0 processor. Of these, Yellow Dog Linux (http://yellowdoglinux.com) has been called the most user-friendly, so I bought a copy to try it out on my PowerBook G3 (Wallstreet) series. In less than a week it had become my primary operating system!

Why would you want to run Linux on your Mac? Well, maybe you can't afford Photoshop or Microsoft Office and have heard that there are free equivalents of these programs (the GIMP and OpenOffice, respectively) available for Linux. Maybe your Mac is on a Windows or UNIX network and you need to be able to access file servers and printers that Mac OS doesn't support. Or maybe you just want to see what all the fuss is about.

Getting Started

First of all, buying Linux is very different from buying Mac OS, because it's free of charge and there's no license. You can pay for CD-ROMs, manuals, or support, but you can't pay for the software itself. If you have a high-speed Internet connection, you can download the two-CD set from the yellowdoglinux.com Web site and burn your own CDs, or you can buy them mail-order. I bought some (legal!) third-party CDs on eBay for \$10, and if any of you in the Twin Cities would like to borrow them, just let me know.

Installing Yellow Dog Linux was about as simple as installing Windows 98. I can't speak to Mac OS X yet. The installer asked some questions about how my hard disk was partitioned, but the printed instructions that came with the CD explained all of this beforehand. You will need to repartition your disk (or install a second hard disk) before installing Linux, and you'll need at least 2 GB for a full install.

Installing Software

Yellow Dog comes with a full suite of Internet and office applications,

games, and other miscellaneous stuff, much of which is not documented in any immediately apparent way. Several times I went to download something, only to find that it was already installed.

Yellow Dog Linux is based on the very popular Red Hat Linux for the Intel processor, so you can download software in "RPM" format and install it very easily. However, RPMs for Intel are not always compatible with PowerPC, and many programs are not yet available as PowerPC RPMs. If you want to install such programs, you have to "compile" them from the "source code." This is a foreign concept to many Mac users, but it's pretty straightforward if you follow the instructions. However, I quickly learned that the "desktop" installation of Yellow Dog did not include any compilers, so I had to go back and install the "full" version.

If you still need to run Mac software, fear not... not only can you restart the computer in MacOS, but you can open MacOS in a window. The emulator, called Mac-on-Linux, is actually faster at some things (like starting up, for instance, or running Photoshop) than Mac OS is on its own!

There are two major compatibility problems I ran into when I moved my files over from the Mac OS to Linux. One is PICT files... there doesn't seem to be any software for Linux that will open PICT files at all. The other is Stufflt. I had archived my Mac files with Stufflt, but Stufflt Expander for Linux is only available for Intel, not PowerPC, so I had to go back and put everything in zip archives instead.

Hardware Support

At first I was concerned that Linux wouldn't support the hardware of my PowerBook... after all, the sound volume and screen brightness are controlled by software! What about batteries, PCMCIA cards, and my internal modem?

I shouldn't have worried. The folks at Yellow Dog have done a great job of supporting Apple hardware. The volume and brightness controls on my keyboard don't work, but the equivalent software gives me better control of volume and brightness than Mac OS ever did! The command key is useless, but the Fn key is finally useful. My SuperDisk drive works faster and better under Linux than under MacOS, and the machine wakes up from sleep faster. I haven't experimented much with SCSI or PCMCIA yet, but I haven't had a need to. Linux runs down my batteries slightly faster than Mac OS because I haven't yet figured out how to do processor cycling (an automatic feature for PowerBooks under Mac OS).

By far the best improvement I've seen with Linux is in memory management. No matter how much memory you have under Mac OS (prior to version X, at least), it never seems to be enough. Linux takes care of all that behind the scenes say goodbye to allocating memory to specific applications or turning virtual memory on or off or increasing your cache. This may explain why Mac-on-Linux is sometimes faster than Mac OS alone.

Linux expects your mouse to have three buttons instead of one, but it's a simple matter to define two of your function keys as mouse buttons.

User Interface

I'm very, very pleased with KDE, the default desktop environment for Yellow Dog. It looks like a cross between Windows and Mac OS, so it's easy to learn if you're familiar with both of those platforms. KMail is the best mail program I've ever used, and Konguerer (the default Web browser) is such a great way to manipulate files especially if you move files around a lot over networks -- that I'm willing to forgive its limitations as a Web browser. If you need to view Flash, Shockwave, or QuickTime animations, you'll want to continue using Mac OS for your Web surfing, because Linux just isn't there yet.

KDE acts like OS X, of course, due to their common UNIX background. By that I mean that when you open an application, you can go back to working on other things while the program is starting up, and if it crashes, it doesn't take anything else down with it. (There are a few exceptions to this... don't try to mount an audio CD as a disk!) Even if the whole X Window system (the equivalent of the Mac OS Finder) freezes up, you can usually flip over to another of the 8 available screens and shut it down gracefully.

There are some times when it's easiest to use Linux's command line (a "shell") rather than the KDE windows, but these times are few and far between.

But Can She Type?

OpenOffice is a suite of applications similar to Microsoft Office. It was originally developed by Sun Microsystems under the name StarOffice before it was spun off as an open source project. The good news is that OpenOffice will allow you to work with Microsoft Office documents in a reasonably user-friendly way.

There are two pieces of bad news. One is that OpenOffice is a memory hog.

Remember how I said memory management was great under Linux? OpenOffice is the exception. It tries to take all available memory and then some, and when you quit, it doesn't give the memory back again until you force it to.

The other bad news is that OpenOffice doesn't quite do everything that Microsoft Office does. The presentation maker is particularly lacking, when compared to PowerPoint. But because these programs are continuously under development, we can expect them to get better in the future.

If you need a full office suite with all the bells and whistles, another alternative is Corel Office, which is priced competitively with Microsoft Office. Unfortunately it's not yet available for the PowerPC, and it's not opensource, so you can't compile it yourself.

Support

Since essentially all Linux software is developed by volunteers, you're unlikely to be able to call technical support when something goes wrong. The good news is that those volunteers all communicate by e-mail, and they're usually happy to answer questions. There's also a thriving Linux user group in the Twin Cities, http://www.mn-linux.org.

In Summary

Switching to Linux was a good move for me, but it's not for everyone. If you're interested in trying something new, it needn't cost you anything and might reveal capabilities you never knew your computer had. Just be sure to approach it as a labor of love by thousands of volunteers — not a commercial product that's intended to be flawless — and you'll be fine!





New iMac to sport Flat Panel Display, "Sahara" G3

It has long been rumored that a major revision to Apple's iMac consumer desktop line would not only give the internals of the machine a major bump, but also mark a major shift in the form-factor. As the current iMac line, while not particularly pokey in any respect, lacks the high-MHz processor and large screen necessary to compete in a marketplace dominated by 'Wintel' machines, Apple is working on a revision to the line whose introduction is sure to be seen as just as large a revolution as that of the original.

The form factor of the current machine has been essentially unchanged since the introduction of the original Bondi Blue iMac in 1998. Over the last 3 years there has been only one case revision, barring color changes, and it was a modest update at that- it came with the introduction of the 'Kehei' or 'slot loading' iMac line in October 1999. The updated design sported a smoother shell without the metal RF plating that was visible under the previous model's polycarbonate skin, and this exact form

factor still exists today. Indeed, the iMac is the only machine in Apple's lineup that is clearly a holdover from the early days of Jonathan Ive's tenure as chief of Industrial Design at Apple. While most other Apple products are sleek and minimal, packing the maximum amount of functionality into the smallest space, the iMac remains colorful and perhaps somewhat bloated—not at all in line with the currently fashionable minimalist design ethos introduced in the PowerBook C4

It's no surprise that a major change to the iMac is coming. What has been difficult to nail down is exactly what will be changed, and when these changes will occur. What has precluded this product from being introduced is component availability and prices: AppleInsider sources have revealed, however, that the prices of key components has reached an acceptable level at which Apple can sell the new iMac at a price palatable to consumers and still retain profitability on its most popular line.

AppleInsider has learned that the new-generation iMac will be introduced in the first months of 2002, either at MacWorld Expo San

Francisco in January, MacWorld Tokyo in March, or at an "Apple Special Event" akin to the launches of the iBook (Dual USB) and iPod. Its external design will be nothing short of spectacular. The new iMac will continue the convenience of the All in One design that the current model holds, but in a significantly sexier manner. Based around a 15" TFT Flat-Panel display, running at a native resolution of 1024x768, the new iMac will closely resemble the current 15" Apple Studio Display from many angles. However, the enclosure will be thicker (so as to accommodate the extra bulk of computer internals), and constructed with more robust, scratchproof materials similar in texture and finish to the iBook.

The changes in technical specifications in the new iMac will be as innovative as the changes to the case design. At the center of the new iMac will be IBM's 750FX "Sahara" G3, running at speeds approaching 1Ghz. The Sahara chip is designed for low-power, low heat operation, thereby allowing the new iMac to continue the 'fan-less tradition' of nearly silent operation that has become a hallmark of the
