#### mini'app'les By-laws

NAME OF ORGANIZATION

The name of the organization is Minnesota Apple Computer Users' Group, Inc. hereafter called "mini'ap-

PURPOSE

The purpose of the organization is to promote the dis-semination of information concerning the use of Apple Computers and products related thereto, and to share the knowledge of members at large concerning their talents and information pertaining to computers in general.

Members of mini'app'les are required to pay annual dues, which will be due on the anniversary of the month they ioined.

The actual amount of dues will be set by the board. A application fee may be charged at the discretion of the board.

Annual dues must be received by anniversary date or membership shall be terminated.

Membership rights will be extended to the immediate household upon receipt of dues from the household. Each membership shall have the right to cast one vote. Membership will not be denied because of race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

Members are expected to abide by these bylaws. Benefits of membership shall include:

A subscription to the miniapp'les newsletter.

Eligibility to purchase miniapp'les software.

Eligibility to participate in mini'app'les sanctioned activi-

LEADERSHIP

The officers of mini'app'les, shall consist of the following positions:

President

Past President

Vice President

Secretary

**Publications Director** 

Interest Group Director

Marketing Director

These eight officers are the governing board of the mini'app'les and all mini'app'les business will be conducted by this board.

Except for the Past President, officers are elected for term of one year. The term runs from May 1 to April 30. The office of Past President will automatically be given to the retiring President. If a President is elected for sequential terms, the incumbent Past President will remain in office.

If Past President resigns or relinquishes office, the President shall appoint a Director at Large to complete Past President term and duties.

If an officer resigns or relinquishes office, the President shall appoint a replacement in a timely manner subject to board approval.

If the President resigns or is unable to perform the duties of the office; the Vice President shall assume those duties

In the absence of the President and Vice President the officers may appoint an acting President.

Board members may be removed from office by a two-

thirds majority vote of the board. A recall election shall be held within 60 days of presentation of an impeach-ment petition bearing the verified signatures of at least five percent of the membership.

The President, Vice President, or Secretary may call a general membership meeting. Membership shall be notified of time, place, and purpose of meeting through the mini'app'les newsletter or a special mailing. Election of Officers.

Nominations will be made by a nominating committee. Further nominations from members will be accepted at a general membership meeting to be held in February. The subsequent list of nominees with such statements as

they may wish to make pursuant to their candidacy shall

appear in the April newsletter.

The election will be by means of a written ballot as published in the April newsletter. Ballots will be accepted at mini'app'les meetings or by mail. All ballots must be received by April 28th. A simple majority of those voting is necessary for election. Results of this election shall be published in the newsletter not more than 60 days following the election.

Board members must be paid up members of the mini'ap-p'les. If a board member's membership lapses, they have effectively resigned from the board of directors, and the board shall so notify them and make record in the min-

No member or membership may hold more than one board position or vote except as noted in bylaws. LEADERSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

General Duties. The duties of the elected officers are in

Promote the purpose and membership of mini'app'les.

Administer the bylaws of the mini'app'les. Assure the financial well-being of the mini'app'les. Attend and report at each board meeting.

Carry out decisions of the board in a timely manner. Appoint staff and committees as necessary, subject to board approval.

Communicate to the board the needs of appointed staff and membership in general.

Duties of the President. The President will:

Provide leadership and direction to the general membership and to the board of directors.

Prepare an agenda for each board meeting.

Chair mini'app'les board and general membership meetings at which business is conducted.

Assign duties to board and staff members.

Establish goals to be reached during the term in office. Duties of the Vice President. The Vice President will: Assist the President with the duties of that office and in the absence of the president, assume the duties of that

Organize the program, facilities and equipment for general membership meetings including meetings for nominations or voting by membership.

Coordinate participation in events, such as trade shows and seminars.

Duties of the Treasurer. The Treasurer will:

Maintain the mini'app'les financial records and records of mini'app'les assets.

Prepare a written financial report to include income, disbursements, current account balances and assets, at each board meeting. This report will be included in the min-

Prepare an annual budget.

Be cognizant of and act upon requirements of the IRS and Minnesota State Department of Revenue in a timely and efficient manner.

Administer the collection of all monies due the mini'ap-

Establish and maintain bank accounts in the name of the mini'app'les.

Deposit all monies in the mini'app'les bank account(s) in a timely and efficient manner.

Pay all bills and demands as authorized by the board. Duties of the Secretary The Secretary will:

Record in a permanent form the minutes of all board and general membership meetings at which business is conducted

Record the results of elections.

Archive and maintain all mini'app'les records other than those kept by the Treasurer.

Keep a mini app'les calendar. Assist the President and Vice President in correspondence

Duties of the Past President. The Past President will: Provide continuity in the leadership of the mini'app'les. Assist the President with the duties of that office. Provide historical references for decision making process. Duties of the Publications Director. The Publications

Oversee publication of the newsletter.

Appoint with consent of the board:

Newsletter Editor and assistants

Advertising Coordinator

Director will:

Marketing Director. The Marketing Director will: Oversee the maintenance and processing of membership records and materials

Promote membership

Duties of the Interest Group Director. The Interest Group

Oversee all matters related to the development and maintenance of Special Interest and Community Interest groups

Encourage and assist in the formation of new interest

Act as spokesperson to the board for group representa-

tives FINANCIAL The mini'app'les will maintain an account(s) at a local

financial institution. Such accounts shall bear interest as The Signatories on the account(s) shall be:

President

Vice President

Treasurer

One signature will be required to disburse funds from the account(s).

The authorization of expenditures will be accomplished by the board approving an annual budget that covers the mini'app'les budget year. The budget year shall run from August 1 to July 31. Those expenditures not budgeted items, or budgeted items which exceed the budgeted amount by more than \$25.00 will require majority approval of the board.

Proper verification of expenditures will be required

before the funds will be disbursed

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the entire net assets remaining after payment of any or all liabilities and obligations of the corporation shall be disbursed in a manner agreeable to a majority of the board members at a specially convened open board meeting and consistent with IRS and State regulations. Notice of this meeting shall be made known to all mini'app'les members through the newsletter or a special mailing 30 days in advance of the meeting.

A Surety Bond shall be obtained, naming the above signatories as principals. BOARD MEETINGS

The business of the mini'app'les will be conducted at board meetings, except for general membership meetings

or voting by the general membership.
The Board of Directors shall meet at least every other month at a place and time designated by the mini'app'les president.

A quorum shall consist of 4 or more officers and no business shall be transacted if a quorum is not present. Notice of board meetings shall be published 30 days in advance of all regularly scheduled board meetings. In emergency situations, officers may agree to meet at any time, but all business transacted will be subject to reconsideration at the next regularly scheduled board meeting. Minutes of the emergency meetings shall be made publicly available in the next issue of the mini'apples newsletter and/or at the request of any member. The board of directors may designate three or more of its members to constitute an executive committee. To the extent determined by the board, the executive committee has the authority of the board in the management of the business of mini'app'les. The executive committee shall act only in the interval between board meetings and at all times shall be subject to the control and direction of the board. Any activity shall be reported to board at next meeting.

Minutes of the board meetings will be made available no later than 60 days following that meeting.

The board will act on this request and on other items pursuant to changes in the bylaws at a board meeting at least three months prior to the election of officers. Changes to the bylaws suggested by the board will be published in the mini'app'les newsletter.
The ratification will be by means of a written ballot as

published in the mini'app'les newsletter. Ballots will be accepted at mini'app'les meetings or by mail. All ballots must be received by the 28th of the month in which vote is taken. A two-thirds majority of those voting is necessary for ratification of the changes to bylaws.

Changes to these bylaws become effective the first day of month following publication of notice of ratification in the newsletter. Such notice shall appear not more than 60 days after the closing date for receiving ballots. MISCELLANEOUS

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

## **Numbers Don't Tell Mac's Story**

Your neighbor drives home with his new BMW and the first thing you say to him is a wisecrack about his car's low market share.

You'd never do it. Nobody would. Most people drive Toyotas or Hondas or Fords, but that means nothing to the people who own BMWs. Right?

Then why are we constantly hearing about the Mac's low market share

from people who ought to know better? I spent an evening checking out the actual percentage of Mac users, and I found numbers that ranged from 1.7 percent to 12 percent. That's a huge range, and the imprecision of the numbers tells a story.

Comparing a free-market product to a monopoly product that's forced on consumers is a difficult task. Many buyers have no idea that they have a choice of operating systems and platforms. They walk into a computer store at the mall and buy what's there, and that means in most cases a Windows PC.

Microsoft's monopoly needs no elaboration. The company tries hard to make consumers think about "experience" and not about operating systems. Microsoft has been trying to keep consumers from realizing they have a choice.

So the numbers for Mac users are guaranteed to be lower than they would be in a competitive market-place because the Microsoft monopoly is pervasive.

Now that we've got that out of the way, let's look at numbers. Apple's global share in the market for new computers hit a low of 1.7 percent in 2003. The 2004 numbers are likely to be a little better, but not much.

Yet my own rough calculations indicate that 8 percent of the personal computers used today in homes - leaving out all the computers used in offices and businesses - are Apple Macintoshes. Others have said my number is conservative; I've seen the total for Macs in home use as high as 12 percent.

How can we have 1.7 percent in one case and 8 percent to 12 percent in another? It's simple: People who represent the Windows side of the computer industry look out one door and Mac fans look out another.

For example, the 2003 figure of 1.7 percent counts only the number of new computers sold month by month. It does not count the number of computers that are in use. You don't have to be a genius to realize the fallacy of this sort of statistic. Macs last longer than Windows PCs and don't need replacing as often. So Mac users aren't ever going to buy new computers at the same rate as Windows users.

If you and I both sell our own widgets but yours last five times as long as mine, I'd have to sell five times as many as you do just to keep the same market share.

The figure of 8 percent is more honest. It represents the number of Macintosh computers currently in use. Even Apple's own numbers for OS X computers is underestimated, from what I can tell. Apple said earlier this year that there were 25 million OS X users, but the total probably is closer to 35 million by now, after you correct for Apple's low estimate and add in the number of new users in the last few months.

As for the 12 percent number, I feel it's probably a huge overestimate. But it's probably accurate if you consider the percentage of Mac users among people who think about what they do and care about how things work.

As expected, Apple today introduced new iBook G4 and PowerBook G4 models.

The 15" and 17" PowerBooks got a speed boost to 1.33 or 1.5 GHz and an ATI Mobility Radeon 9700 graphics processor accomodating up to 128 MB of video memory. The 12" model has Nvidia GeForce FX GoS200 graphics and 64 MB of video memory.

PowerBook pricing starts at \$1599 for the 12" model, and the 15" model with a 4x SuperDrive is now \$2499. Both 12" and 15" models are available now, with the new 17" model due early next month at \$2799 (although the Apple Store lists "3-5 bus. days" for estimated delivery).

Apple's new iBooks run at 1.0 or 1.2 GHz, with doubled memory capacity and a SuperDrive option for the 14" models. Available now, the new iBook G4 starts at \$1099 for a 1-GHz 12" model with Combo drive and rises to \$1699 for a 1.2-GHz 14" model with a SuperDrive and only 256 MB of memory.

[17:10 EDT] Apple's Bluetooth Firmware 1.1 makes D-Link adapters

incompatible with non-Mac systems but promises "improvements in the update installation process, better performance when waking the computer from sleep, and support for additional key commands during startup."

Note the update is not for Mac OS X 10.3-10.3.2, but only for 10.3.3 or 10.2.8 with Bluetooth Update 1.3.3. [17:00 EDT] Apple quietly released a new AirPort Extreme Base Station model (M9397LL/A) at \$249. The new model lacks a modem but adds support for Power Over Ethernet and conforms to the UL 2043 standard which allows use in air-handling spaces. Apple notes that the device's USB port is disabled when Power Over Ethernet is in use.

[10:35 EDT] Apple today released AirPort Update 3.4 with improvements for AirPort Extreme (and support also for older AirPort products):

- \*Improved antenna output control.
  \*Enhanced logging from your base station which is compatible with syslog.
- \*Performance improvements for WPA security implementations.
  AirPort Management Tools, with

AirPort Client Monitor, offer "tools for planning, setting up, fine-tuning, and managing larger, enterprise-class wireless networks."

There's also an updated Windows AirPort Admin Utility, Version 3.4. [18 Apr.] Apple splashed out a new set of pro video products for the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) conference in Las Vegas: Apple's Motion 1.0, due for release this summer, is a \$299 application for creating real-time motion graphics. It offers "interactive animation of text, graphics and video, with instant previewing of multiple filters and particle effects, and introduces 'Behaviors' that allow artists to add natural looking movement to type and graphics, such as gravity and wind, without the use of complex keyframes." Other features include character-by-character title animation, a particle system, Bezierstyle keyframe tools, professionallydesigned templates, 90 accelerated filters, dynamic alignment guides, and much more.

Final Cut Pro HD brings "the real-time performance of high-quality native



Final Cut Pro HD delivers the ability to capture, edit and output broadcast-quality high definition (HD) video over a single FireWire cable, without requiring any additional hardware - an industry first. Final Cut Pro HD supports native DVCPRO HD editing with no recompression or image degradation and enables HD preview monitoring on an Apple Cinema HD Display."

Final Cut Pro 4 owners with a valid serial number can download the new version immediately, according to Apple, while Final Cut 1, 2 and 3 owners can upgrade for \$399. New purchases may be "pre-ordered" at \$999.

Apple's new Xsan is a "64-bit cluster file system for Mac OS X that enables organizations to consolidate storage resources and provide multiple computers with concurrent file-level read/write access to shared volumes over Fibre Channel." It's priced at \$999 per computer, due in the fall, with a beta release available now to "qualified customers."

DVD Studio Pro 3 is a new version of the DVD authoring software, scheduled to begin shipping in mid-May at \$499 for Mac OS X 10.3.2 and up. (According to Apple those who purchased DVD Studio Pro 2 on or after April 18 may qualify for an upgrade through the up-to-date program.) Among other new features, Version 3 offers render-free transitions, alpha transitions, Graphical View (which displays projects in storyboard form), DTS audio, integration with Final Cut Pro HD and Motion, integration with Photoshop, enhanced MPEG-2 encoding, and more.

Shake 3.5 - available now for Mac OS X, Linux and IRIX - features "new shape-based morphing and warping tools for advanced compositing and new 'shape shifting' special effects," plus Qmaster distributed network rendering software, film grain simulation, a multi-input layer node with common blend modes, and much more. Apple notes, "Shake has been used in the production of every Oscarwinning film for Best Visual Effects over the past seven years, including this year's winner 'The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King."



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## Installing a Battery in a fruity imac

I've had my lime colored imac DVD slot loader for four years & in that time it has worked just fine for me. The only hardware problem I've had is that the battery went dead after 3 years. The problem showed itself by my computer time being incorrect and turned to Jan 1,1904, with several programs acting up or not working. To fix the problem, I took the imac to an uptown Apple authorized repair shop and they installed a new battery.

I must admit that at the time I thought \$ 57 for putting a battery in the imac was a stiff price, but knowing nothing about computers, I was reluctant to try installing a battery myself. The consolation in having it installed by a professional was that a battery should last from 3-5 years.

Shortly after the battery installation, I asked Bert Persson, a computer knowledgable club member, if he had ever installed a battery in his computers. He said he had installed many and that it really wasn't that difficult a job. Although he noted he had never installed a battery in an imac, he thought if you read the repair manual and took care that it shouldn't be that difficult a job. In the back of my mind, I thought when the battery goes out in 3-5 years, I'll try installing it myself.

Unfortunately, the battery didn't last 3 years, but went dead in less than a

year. I was tempted to have a professional install another battery. The only thing that stopped me was the thought of having to install a new battery at the cost of \$ 57 every year or less, plus the hassle of delivering it to the repair shop (a 40 mile drive for me). I decided to try installing the battery myself using the rational that if I ruined the imac it would give me an excuse to upgrade to a G4 or G5 Mac.

I sent out a request for information on the Miniapple BBS and received good advice from several club members (Michael Rehbein, Tom Gates & Dave Peck) who directed me to web sites that discussed battery installation and what care should be taken in changing the battery. Unfortunately, the web sites discussed changing batteries in the older imacs which were not exactly like my imac DVD slot loader. The older models had a somewhat different case and required the removal of the logic board mass storage chassis to access the battery.

With determination to install the battery myself, come what may, I searched the Internet for a battery. Fortunately, I found Mac-battery.com who sells batteries and parts for Apple computers. They asked what kind of imac I had and sent me a 3.6 volt lithium, 1/2 AA type Tekcel battery which I received in 2 days from Memphis. Accompaning the battery was complete printed instructions in color on how to install the battery.

The cost of the battery with shipping was only \$ 6.88.

Much to my amazement, installing the battery was easy. I removed four screws and took off the plastic case. The next operation was removing 6 screws and the metal (EMI) shield covering the computers inner components. The old battery was easily removed and replaced by the new battery. In all, the operation took me about 1/2 hour. I was very careful and deliberate in removing the plastic casing & inner shield and if I did it again I could probably replace the battery in 15 minutes or less.

The challenge came after I installed the battery. I could not reset the time and date on the computer, nor access the Miniapple BBS mail or one of my e-mail programs. I finally managed to reset the automatic date button in the Apple date & time menu. Surprise! When I restarted the computer the time & date were automatically set. The problem of access to the BBS & email program was solved by redoing some preferences.

Bert was right, with a little care and following directions it wasn't that difficult replacing the battery, plus it saved me a bundle of money.



Yesterday I received a letter from AT&T that they were refunding the \$ 24 I had been charged for the service. Their explanation was that they

were refunding the money as a customer courtesy. No mention was made that the charge was unjustified. Evidently AT&T has received other complaints about this and similar telephone practices.

It was two-years ago this week that the Mac world lost a prolific Macintosh advocate, and I lost a friend. Rodney Lain, popular writer for Mac sites AppleLinks, The Mac Observer, MacAddict, and our own MyMac.com, died on June 16th, 2002.

A controversial writer from the start, Rodney loved nothing more than to stir the hornets' nest. He was very good at knowing which buttons to push in his readers to get them so hopping mad that they would leave the most vicious email in his in-box, or post after post on message boards and forums around the world. Very few writers could get away with using the dreaded and racist "N" word in an article to describe the state of the Mac faithful. But Rodney could, and did.

He took a lot of flak over the years, weathering it all as the professional he was. While Rodney never got rich from his writing, nor did it lead to any more high-profile opportunities, he continued to write even at the height of his depression. A depression that ultimately led to his death, at his own hands.

Rodney was also a religious man, even after being excommunicated from his church years before. The reasons are not important now, but it did leave a lasting impression on him. Rather than simply fading from view, Rodney joined the Mac web writers in evangelizing the Mac platform as he once did preaching the word of Christ. And with equal fervor.

Very few sites or articles exist today about Rodney. Sure, there are a few out there, most posted or written days after his death. Even Wired Magazine had a brief write-up on Rodney after he died. I have written a few articles since, including my much-read initial article on his suicide, as well as the mostly overlooked MacDaddy tribute to him.

As one of the only Black writers on the Mac web, Rodney was a minority within a minority. He never hid his race behind the keys of his keyboard, instead reveling in his race and computing platform of choice.

When Rodney saw something he did not like, be it a perceived error by Apple Computer, Inc., or another article he disagreed with, Rodney wrote with a "pull no punches" style that was very popular with his many readers.

Today, two years later, is the anniversary of his death. I hope to at least see some other website acknowledge it, though I don't expect to. Without looking back, we cannot move forward. Rodney brought a unique voice to the Mac web, one that has yet to be duplicated.

Thanks, Rodney, for everything. I hope you know, wherever you are, that you are not forgotten.

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## Norton Mac Utilities Days Are numbered

An article in the Mac World magazine announced that Norton utilities and parent company Symantec will be dropping future development of both Norton utilities and System works for the Mac.

Symantec will provide technical support by telephone for one year after the company stops selling the Utilities 8.0 and System Works 3.0, although Symantec will continue to sell both programs as long as there is customer demand. According to the company, they also plan to continue supporting the current version of OX 10.3 as well as future updates to Panther.

Although Symantec will stop developing the system for Mac, they will continue development for Windows Systems on the security utilities including Norton Antivirus and and Norton Personal Firewall)

The withdrawal of Norton from the Mac market has been a surprise because since 1989 Norton has been one of the premier Utilities for Macs. David Shayer, a software engineer who worked on previous versions of Norton Utilities noted, "they haven't made substantial changes to the software in years".

Mac users shouldn't despair about Norton exiting the Mac market. Fortunately, there are some good utilities to fill the gap including Disk Warrior 3.0, Miromat, Tech Tool 4.0 and Drive 10. Although, I must say this announcement left a bad taste in my mouth because I just purchased the Norton system for use on my imac.

## **Choosing an Ink Jet Printer**

Graduation time is the season of digital cameras. Digital cameras make great gifts to give or receive. One of the benefits of using a digital camera is that you choose the prints you want and you can edit the image before you print. Digital camera shoppers spend a lot of time researching the camera, but tend to forget about the importance of the printer if they plan on making prints.

The ink jet printers that are on the consumer market are "drop-on-demand," as opposed to continuous flow. A drop-on-demand printer only produces the ink droplets that are needed, and these are added to the image one drop at a time. The two common types of drop-on-demand ink jet printers are thermal and piezoelectric.

#### Thermal

Thermal ink jet printers were invented by Canon (the Bubblejet) in 1981. The way that the thermal printer works is pretty simple. The ink reservoir is connected to the print head. Inside the print head is a small heating element. When a drop of ink needs to be added to an image, the element quickly heats up and forms an air bubble within the

ink. The bubble forces ink out of the print head then the bubble bursts and a drop breaks off.

With a thermal ink jet printer, the print head moves on a bar back and forth across the paper. Within the print head are multiple print nozzles. The number of nozzles vary by printer, and even by color. For example, the Canon i850 Bubblejet has 320 nozzles in the black print head, 512 in cyan and magenta, and 256 in yellow.

Thermal printers are easy to maintain and provide photographic quality to the naked eye, if the correct paper is used. Canon and HP Deskjet and Photosmart printers are thermal printers.

#### Piezoelectric

The piezoelectric effect is the term used to describe how a crystal changes when subjected to an electric field. It will either expand or contract. So instead of using heat to create a bubble as the thermal printer does above, an electrical charge is added causing a crystal to expand. Remove the charge and it contracts. Epson is the main player in the consumer piezo printer market.

Piezo printheads are typically single units with all colors included and they are a permanent part of the

printer. The number of print nozzles vary by printer. Printers destined for an office environment will have more black nozzles for faster text printing. Advantages to the piezo printers are fine image detail and the range of media that one can print to. Disadvantages are maintenance and repair is expensive, and print speeds can be slower than thermals.

Now that you have the basics of print technology, which printer to choose?

The questions that you have to ask yourself are: What size output? What kind of quality? What type of media? How permanent? How fast? How loud?

#### How expensive?

What size output? Desktop printers usually can't print anything wider than 24 inches and that is dependent on model. You can add to your width by turning the image sideways and using a printer that supported roll-mounted paper. An example of this would be Epson's Stylus Photo 2200 or HP's CP1700 series.

What kind of quality? What affects the quality of a print are the printer's resolution, the number of colors, and the size of the ink droplet. Currently shipping printers

are all of a high enough resolution that you would be hard pressed to discern the difference in dpi's with the naked eye. The number of colors will have a noticeable effect. If you need to print photographic quality, choose a six- or seven-color printer. As far as dot size, the Epson piezo printers will give finer detail due to their technology on certain types of paper. I have a Canon thermal printer at home and even though the experts say that the Epson would be better quality, I can't fault my Canon for photo prints.

#### What kind of media?

Desktop printers have fewer options for paper. Most printer manufacturers recommend that you use their paper with their printers. They claim to have engineered paper coatings specific to their ink. This may be true, but I have used Epson paper in my Canon printer and it worked as well as the paper that came with the printer. Epson has the widest range of paper sizes and types available.

#### How permanent?

The permanence of a printed image is based on the ink and paper combination, as well as how the image is stored or displayed.

Consumer desktop printers either use inks that are based on dyes, or pigments. Dye inks can fade faster than pigment inks. Canon and HP use dye-based inks. Epson has some models that are pigment based, others are dye based. Epson Stylus C64 and C84 series ink jet printers, and the Epson Stylus CX5400 and CX6400 All-In-Ones, use the pigment based DURAbrite Ink. The EPSON Stylus Photo 2200, the EPSON Stylus Pro 7600.

and the EPSON Stylus Pro 9600 use UltraChrome pigment ink. Printer manufacturers will estimate print longevity using the paper that will have the best performance. Use these as estimates.

How fast? Print speeds for desktop printers are measured in pages per minute. Rule of thumb: If you are printing a high-quality, 8-x-10-inch photo, you'll probably be able to get other work done while the image prints. Four-color and printers destined for the office will have faster print speeds than photographic quality printers.

#### How loud?

Check the noise level on the printer so you get an idea of how loud it will be. Most people aren't bothered by ink jet printers (remember how loud the old ImageWriter was?), but compare them to these standard levels in decibels:

Quiet whisper = 15 - 20 db Airport terminal = 55 - 65 db Subway = 90 db Loud rock music = 115 db

#### How expensive?

In addition to the actual price of the printer, ink makes up most of a printer's cost. Be sure to compare prices of consumables when you shop so you know in advance how much you'll have to pay.

## **Kibbles & Bytes**

Our main newsletter is a weekly email publication called Kibbles & Bytes. It contains great deals on Macintosh hardware and software as well as a bit of Macintosh industry news and commentary. This newsletter even has a "Garage Sale" every so often and Don's occasional soapbox ...er, rants on just about any topic! (Emailed weekly on Friday night.) This newsletter is written by Small Dog's CEO, Don Mayer. Here's an excerpt from Kibbles & Bytes #342 that lists some of Apple's "firsts."

Here's a partial list of "Apple Firsts":

1977 - The Apple II was not a "first," but the Apple II was the first "computer for the rest of us." It was the first mass produced COLOR computer, however. The computer remained on Apple's price list until 1980, and was followed by the Apple

II/III Plus, Apple IIe, Apple IIc, Apple IIe Enhanced, and later the Apple IIgs which finally left the price list in the late 1980s!

1979 - VisiCalc, the first spreadsheet program, released for the Apple II -- marking perhaps the first time a software product drove hardware sales.

1983 - Lisa (forerunner to Macintosh), first personal computer with a Graphic User Interface

1984 - Macintosh released. First personal computer with dynamic memory allocation, API programming support (the Toolbox), a graphics API (QuickDraw), a global clipboard,

Undo feature, and 3.5" floppy disk.

1985 - First personal computer with built-in networking (LocalTalk). Also, the LaserWriter establishes the Mac as the standard for desktop publishing, revolutionizing the print and publishing industry.

1986 - First personal computer with

built-in SCSI (Mac Plus)

1987 - Plug-and-play expansion (Nubus in Mac II)

1987 - HyperCard introduces visual programming; MultiFinder brings multitasking (albeit not preemptive) to the Mac.

1988 - Plug and play SCSI CD-ROM

1988 - The first SuperDrive is introduced. Read/writes to Mac, DOS, OS/2, and ProDOS floppies.

1989 - 32-bit QuickDraw allows Macs to display photo-quality true-color images.

1991 -The first plug-and-play Ethernet networking cards

1991 - Apple petitions the FCC to allow personal computers to exchange information via wireless radio.

1991 - QuickTime, the first standard for dynamic media

1992 - WorldScript, the first world-

wide language support for an operating system

1992 - The Duo is introduced with the DuoDock, code named BOB -- best of both worlds

1992 - QuickTime for Windows makes QuickTime the first cross-platform dynamic media standard.

1993 - ColorSync is the first colormatching technology built into an operating system.

1993 - First personal computers with built-in video digitizers and speech recognition (Quadra and Performa 660AV and 840AV).

1993 - Newton Message Pad introduced -- first handheld full-featured computer

1993 - First unified telephony and email architecture for a personal computer operating system (PowerTalk and PowerShare)

1993 - First personal computer with built-in TV and CD stereo system (Macintosh TV)

1994 - Power Macs debut, become the leading RISC-based personal computers.

1994 - System 7.1 for Power Macs is the first operating system to use emulation to run parts of itself, as well as legacy application software (i.e., the backward-support is done in software).

1994 - First 24-bit color digital camera under \$1000 (QuickTake)

1994 - First next-generation typography engine (QuickDraw GX)

1994 - First panoramic virtual-reality technology for personal computers (QuickTime VR)

1995 - PowerBook 5300 was the first PowerPC notebook and the first to include a sleep-swappable drive bay. Included IR receiver for wireless networking.

1997 - PowerBook 3400 -- fastest portable computer in the world also utilized the 1MB IrDA Infra-red standard.

1997 - The 20th Anniversary Mac with integrated TV/Radio system, Bose sound, S-Video input

1997 - Power Mac G3 utilizes the PPC 750 Processor co-designed by IBM and Motorola, and was the first processor capable of using a "backside" cache, which could communicate directly with the processor at extremely high speeds.

1998 - The iMac is introduced.
Unique in its lack of floppy drive, the iMac included a 4Mbps IrDA port and an internal 56Kpbs modem, used two 12 Mbps Universal Serial Ports (USB) as its only means of external expansion, and included a newlydesigned USB keyboard and mouse.

Recent History - AirPort wireless 802.11b was brought to the mass market, Gigabit ethernet standard on personal computers, FireWire 400 and 800, the second coming of the SuperDrive (CD-RW,DVD-R), iSight, AirPort Extreme 802.11g, 64-bit processing, and a host of innovative software products, including the best and most solid operating system on the planet!

Spring Cleaning!

Time to get out those lint-free cloths and go to work on your computer both externally and internally! Luckily, this isn't as involved as my grandmother's spring cleaning. (Does anyone beat rugs anymore?) We'll start with the outside of the computer.

Have you been looking at greasy fingerprints on your laptop or LCD

display?

#### How to Clean the LCD:

- 1. Turn off the computer or display. You may need to turn off the computer in order to turn off some Apple displays.
- 2. Dampen a clean, soft, lint-free cloth or paper with water only.
- 3. Wipe the screen. Do not spray liquid directly on the screen.

You may also use a mild glass cleaner that contains no alcohol or ammonia.

While there are many commercial products available that will work without damaging the plastics, Apple has tested a product called Klear Screen, made by Meridrew Enterprises, and found it does not cause any harm to the plastics.

How to Clean the Keyboard

Take care not to spill any liquid on the keyboard. If you do, turn off your computer immediately. Disconnect the keyboard from the computer immediately.

If you spill liquid that is thin and clear, turn off your computer, unplug the keyboard, turn it upside down to let the liquid drain out, and let it dry for 24 hours at room temperature. If after you take these steps the keyboard doesn't work, take it to your Apple-authorized service provider for repair.

If you spill liquid that is greasy, sweet, or sticky, unplug the keyboard and take it to your Appleauthorized service provider for repair.

WARNING: Do not use acetone, alcohol, or any alcohol-based cleaner on your computer. Never spray cleaner

directly onto your computer. Liquid could drip inside the screen or case and cause an electrical shock.

To get crumbs out of your keyboard, you can hold it upside down and give it a few shakes, use a clean brush to try to brush the crumbs out, or use a can of compressed air (be careful though, since these can contain moisture). When we are cleaning grimy, well-used keyboards to prepare them for sale, we use a paper towel sprayed with Simple Green

to clean up the keys. Again, don't spray directly on the keyboard.

The best bet for a tidy keyboard is to cover it with a protector. The iSkin protectors do a good job without drastically changing the feel of the keyboard, though it does take some time to get used to the feel.

## Cleaning the Inside of Your Computer

If you aren't in the habit of repairing permissions after installing new software, now is a good time to do this. Occasionally, user permissions associated with files or applications are set incorrectly. Each Mac comes with an application called Disk Utility. Launch that, click Verify or Repair Permissions, and you are all set.

Mac OS X performs background maintenance tasks at certain times if the computer is not in sleep mode. If your computer is shut down or in sleep at the designated times, the maintenance does not occur. In that case, you may want or need to run these manually.

Mac OS X periodically runs background tasks that, in part, remove system files that are no longer needed. This includes purging older information from log files or deleting certain temporary items. These tasks do not run if the computer is shut down or in sleep mode. If the tasks do not run, it is possible that certain log files (such as system.log) may become very large.

These tasks are scheduled for 03:15 to 05:30 in your computer's local time zone. This is described further in "Mac OS X: Unexplained Disk Activity Produced by "find" Process".

If your computer is normally shut down at night, you may choose to force the process to start manually.

#### How to force maintenance tasks

There are two options available to you:

- 1. Use a third-party application. Some third-party applications allow you to run these tasks whenever you wish. Three examples include:
  Mac Janitor by Brian R. Hill
  CronMaster by Dan Klein
  weRclean by Parental Advisory
  You can search for these or other solutions at VersionTracker
  <<http://www.versiontracker.com/>>.
- 2. Advanced: Use the terminal.
- A. Open Terminal (/Applications/Utilities).
  B. Type: sudo sh /etc/daily

Optionally, for Mac OS X 10.2 or later, you can use: sudo periodic daily.

Tip: Typing "daily" runs tasks normally scheduled for a daily interval.

Type "monthly" or "weekly" in place of "daily" to runs tasks scheduled for those intervals. Weekly tasks usually require a longer time to run than others.

C. Press Return.
D. Enter your Admin password when prompted, then press Return.

E. Quit Terminal when the task is complete.

#### **Tech Tails**

Hard Drive Diagnostics by Duane Letourneau (Duane@smalldog.com)

The most common problems here in the Retail Tech Room are with hard drives. Generally a Mac will be brought in with a flashing system folder, a prohibitory sign, or the spinning wheel/pills. I thought that it might be helpful to relay to you the methods I use for diagnosing a bad or corrupted hard drive. A bad hard drive is one that, for one reason or another, has developed a mechanical or electronic problem. A corrupted hard drive's data has been scrambled enough to prevent your Mac from doing its normal startup.

First and foremost, I use my ears. A mechanically damaged hard drive can sound like a game of ping-pong. That sound is often accompanied by groans of pain as someone realizes that his or her hard drive is not working properly. The ping-pong sound is caused by the read-write head

actuator motor going from one extent of its travel to another, clanking against the retaining tabs. The recovery probability from this hardware failure is very low, but I have pulled bits and pieces from these drives occasionally.

Another aural clue is the sound of silence. All hard drives have one or more 3.5-inch platters spinning at better than 4200 RPM. The motor spinning the platters makes a distinctive whine while running that, if absent, indicates one of two possible problems. The first problem might be that the electronics on the circuit board attached to the hard drive have failed. The second is that the motor driving the platters may be impeded by friction or has failed spinning all together. I have changed electronics and been able to resurrect some drives, but by and large the motor has failed and there are no chances of recovery.

If your drive spins and doesn't make the ping-pong sound, you probably have some data corruption that can be repaired by Disk First Aid, Disk Utility, or DiskWarrior. In some cases, a system reinstall is required after the disk repairs because needed system files have been lost.

This is where I can't stress enough that you must copy your valuable data to some kind of offline media, be it a CD-R or an external hard drive. I have not been classically trained for managing the grief associated with data loss, but my work has provided me with plenty of on-the-job training. Do yourself a favor and back up your correspondence, your family photos, your music, or what have you. Professional data recovery services are available, but cost anywhere from \$5,000 to \$20,000 US for their valuable services. Ask us about backup methods and products to save yourself and your data.

The One, Two, Threes of Selecting a Digital Video Camera by Ed Shepard (Ed@Smalldog.com)

There has never been a better time to consider purchasing a new video camera. Prices are coming down, quality is going up, and more features are being added all the time. It can be confusing to find the right camera for your budget and shooting requirements. Here are some tips to help guide your search:

camera over an analog video camera. Specifically, choose a camcorder that records to the MiniDV format. MiniDV camcorders offer the best combination of price, performance, and flexibility. MiniDV cameras use CCDs (charged coupling devices) to capture light. In general, the larger the CCD, the better the color quality, resolution, and ability to selectively focus. 1/6-inch CCDs

are as small as you want to go.

1. Focus: Consider a digital video

- 2. Photos: Current MiniDV camera offer the ability to capture still photos. Some create a still frame on the video tape, while others can capture a photo to a removable memory card. You will get better higher-resolution results by using the memory card. If snapping still images is important to you, look for models that can take a memory card. However, no video camera can yet rival the quality of a dedicated still-digital camera. Currently, a \$200 3.2 megapixel still camera will invariably take better photos than a \$5,000 video camera.
- 3. Features: Look for at least a 10x optical zoom. Digital zoom can be

useful, but it does degrade the quality of the image. Many MiniDV cameras are offering 18x optical zoom and higher. Image stabilization is essential in these cameras. Optical stabilization is preferable to digital stabilization, but both work well. On larger cameras, look for at least a 2.5-inch LCD viewfinder. This can make shooting more fun and flexible, though it does use up the battery faster. Onboard camera microphones can be decent, but for best audio quality seek a camera with an external microphone jack and purchase an external mic. Audio is 50 percent of your video presentation. Look for a camera with analogto-digital pass-through capability. This feature allows you to transfer your old VHS tapes to your computer for editing and burning to DVD.

Finally, if at all possible, pick up the camera and try it out. The feel of the camera can make a big difference in your selection, especially if you plan on using the camera frequently.

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## TIP OF THE WEEK OS X AND HARD DISK DEFRAGMENTATION

In last week's newsletter, I answered a question about the optimization process that is run after an application or system update is installed. The letter writer assumed it was hard disk defragmentation, which is understandable; after all, in OS 9, "optimization" was synonymous with "defragmentation." That's not the case, though. The OS X Installer's optimization process performs a task called "prebinding" that helps the application load a little faster. It has absolutely nothing to do with file defragmentation.

After the issue was sent out, I received a number of follow-up questions from readers desperate to defragment their hard disks in OS X. I quickly realized that I should have said more on the subject.

The reality is that there is very little need to defragment your hard disk in OS X. The new operating system simply does a much better job of managing files than its predecessor. Firstly, Mac OS X Extended hard disk formatting avoids reusing space from deleted files as much as possible. Secondly, there has been a fundamental change

in application design. In most cases, files are not appended (or added to) when saving a change; instead, they're completely rewritten. As a result, there is no need to optimize your hard disk unless it is almost completely full.



#### Need A Hood Man?

Do you use your PowerBook in locations where the ambient light washes out the screen and makes it really hard to see your favorite picture or text? You really hate to increase the screen brightness much because that not only wears the battery down more quickly but also shortens the life of the bulb. If you happen to be riding in a car, you can put a sun screen such as the Axius Auto-Shade #80050 (about \$10 per pair at Wal-Mart) on the window to block some of the light but the PowerBook will probably still be hard to see.

Since we like to use our PowerBook while we are traveling in our minivan, we have purchased a lap tray on which to set the computer to keep the computer off our legs. My home-brew method for keeping the ambient light off the PowerBook screen was to build an enclosure for it. I used poster board and packaging tape to create a little building (two sides, a back, and a top) which was dimensioned to the width

and depth of the lap tray and the height of the PowerBook screen. The enclosure can be folded flat for storage and unfolded to enclose the PowerBook. The enclosure is inconvenient to store and clumsy to use so I kept looking for an alternate solution. Some time ago I saw an ad in one of the Mac magazines for a product manufactured by the Hoodman company. Just prior to this year's vacation I decided to order a unit and give it a try.

The Eclipse E2000-12 sun shade for our 12 inch PowerBook is a combination of black cloth and springy wire. In its carrying case, the Eclipse is 8" by 7" by 1.5" thick. When it is removed from the carrying case, it springs into a shape which fits right over the PowerBook screen. Three easy folds needing both hands flattens the Eclipse for return to its carrying case. You can't lose the carrying case while you are using the Eclipse because it fastens to the top of the Eclipse and hangs over the back of the PowerBook screen, helping to keep the Eclipse in

place.

I am quite pleased with our Eclipse. It does a very good job of sheltering the PowerBook screen from the ambient light. The sides of the Eclipse angle inward slightly so you look at the screen through a 7.5" wide by 5" high opening 4.5 inches from the screen. The cloth of the Eclipse is an opaque black that lets no light reach the screen from the sides. When we are finished with the Eclipse, it fits quite conveniently into a glovebox. The Eclipse is available in sizes to fit many PowerBooks. The E2000-12 is available from Hoodman.com for \$28 plus shipping.

Hoodman also sells small hoods for the LCD screens of digital cameras, but that's a story someone else will have to tell.

### **Shareware Review: iClip**

Shareware Review: iClip by Harry Lienke

iClip is an OS X application that combines the capabilities of multiple OS X Finder clipboards, the Scrapbook of the older operating systems, and much more. You can store text, pictures, sounds, Internet locations, and file aliases in each of the "clipping bins" that iClip makes available. The clipping bins can be organized into sets so information you frequently access can be found quickly. All of this information is automatically stored on your hard drive so it is available every time you fire up your Mac until you decide you no longer need the data and clear the bin(s).

iClip should be launched at start-up so its clipping bins are on your desktop and its menu is available from the menu bar whenever you need it (iClip can be launched from the Dock if you prefer to operate that way). The iClip window which shows the clipping

bins remains in front of application windows so it is always available (see the accompanying screenshot). The iClip window can be collapsed, expanded, or hidden with a single click and shown with a command from the iClip menu. Clipping bins can be easily added to or removed from the iClip window as changes are needed.

iClip permits you to use "Copy" and Paste" buttons located next to its bins or "drag and drop" to move data between your application, the OS X Clipboard, and iClip's clipping bins. The data may pass through or bypass the OS X clipboard as you wish. The multiple clipping bins provided by iClip make it easy to transfer multiple clippings from one application to another.

The data stored in a particular bin is represented by a snippet of the data to help identify it. Moving the cursor to one of the bins and pausing there

causes iClip to display the contents of the bin.

If you store file aliases in iClip's clipping bins, you can use iClip as a program launcher. Double-clicking on the file alias opens the aliased application or opens the aliased document in an appropriate application.

iClip is a very powerful addition to any Mac OS X desktop. iClip works very well and I have run up against no bugs in the program. Thus far I have not made extensive use of iClip, however, because the times I need its power seem to be few and far between.

iClip is available from the usual Mac software sites like Versiontracker and MacUpdate or from http://inventive.us. It requires Mac OS X version 10.2 or later. Cost of iClip is \$20.

## Norton Mac Utilities Days Are numbered

An article in the Mac World magazine announced that Norton utilities and parent company Symantec would be dropping future development of both Norton utilities and System works for the Mac.

Symantec will provide technical support by telephone for one year after the company stops selling the Utilities 8.0 and System Works 3.0, although Symantec will continue to sell both programs as long as there is customer demand. According to the company, they also plan to continue supporting the current version of OX 10.3 as well

as future updates to Panther.

Although Symantec will stop developing the system for Mac, they will continue development for Windows Systems on the security utilities including Norton Antivirus and Norton Personal Firewall)

The withdrawal of Norton from the Mac market has been a surprise because since 1989 Norton has been one of the premier Utilities for Macs. David Shayer, a software engineer who worked on previous versions of Norton Utilities noted, "They haven't made substantial changes to the software in years".

Mac users shouldn't despair about Norton exiting the Mac market. Fortunately, there are some good utilities to fill the gap including Disk Warrior 3.0, Miromat, Tech Tool 4.0 and Drive 10. Although, I must say this announcement left a bad taste in my mouth because I just purchased the Norton system for use on my imac.

## **Apple's Steve Jobs Begins Cancer Recovery**

SAN JOSE, Calif. - As Steve Jobs began his recovery from cancer surgery, the charismatic chief executive of Apple Computer Inc. and Pixar Animation Studios took care to reassure employees, friends and investors that he expects a full recovery.

Jobs sent an e-mail message Sunday announcing that his form of pancreatic cancer - an islet cell neuroendocrine tumor - is extremely rare and easily cured if diagnosed early.

This kind of cancer "represents about 1 percent of the total cases of pancreatic cancer diagnosed each year, and can be cured by surgical removal if diagnosed in time (mine was)," he wrote.

And, never one to miss an opportunity to pitch Apple products, he added a post-script about the company's bigscreen laptop and new wireless networking device: "P.S.: I'm sending this from my hospital bed using my 17-inch PowerBook and an Airport Express."

Jobs said he would require no chemotherapy or radiation treatment, but will be off to recuperate during August and expects to return to work in September.

Meanwhile, Apple will be led by Timothy Cook, the company's executive vice president of worldwide sales and operations. Cook said the current management team has worked with Jobs for many years, and that experience will guide them through the next month.

Shares in Apple slipped 59 cents, or nearly 2 percent, to \$31.75 on the Nasdaq Stock Market.

Jobs, in his message, also was upbeat about the management team.

"While I'm out, I've asked Tim Cook to be responsible for Apple's day to day operations, so we shouldn't miss a beat. I'm sure I'll be calling some of you way too much in August, and I look forward to seeing you in September," he wrote.

Pixar will be led by president Ed Catmull will take day-to-day control until Jobs returns.

Apple's board is confident Cook can manage the company in Jobs' absence, said Bill Campbell, an Apple director, who expressed relief that the surgery went well.

"The surgery was hugely successful, and the prognosis is excellent," Campbell said. "We feel very relieved and optimistic about the future."

Jobs noted in his e-mail that a far more deadly - and common form - of pancreatic cancer is adenocarcinoma. "I mention this because when one hears 'pancreatic cancer' (or Googles it), one immediately encounters this far more common and deadly form, which, thank God, is not what I had," he said in the message.

Surgery does cure the kind of tumor that Jobs had, and radiation treatments are rarely necessary as a follow-up, according to Dr. Jeffrey Norton, a specialist in gastrointestinal oncology and pancreas surgery at Stanford University Medical Center. "If you remove all of the tumor, there is a high probability the patient is cured," Norton told the San Jose Mercury News.

Jobs, 49, and friend Steve Wozniak founded Apple Computer in 1976, five years before IBM Corp. jumped into the personal computer market.

In 1984, the company released the Macintosh, which was the first commercially successful computer to have a graphical user interface that mimicked a physical desktop. It was eventually copied by IBM-clone computers, which became far more dominant.

A year later, Jobs left Apple following a struggle with the company's board. He cashed in some Apple stock and formed another computer company, NeXT.

But NeXT took too long to release its "mainframe on a desk," and once it was available in 1989, it was criticized

for its \$4,000 price. Within four years, NeXT abandoned the hardware market and announced it was focusing on operating system software.

By then, Apple was struggling and efforts to upgrade its operating system were going nowhere. In 1996, Apple bought NeXT. In 1997, Jobs was brought back as an interim chief executive. In 2000, "interim" was dropped from the title.

He made a splash in 1998 with the

release of a revamped and stylish iMac, which was followed by new lines of laptops as well as professional-grade computers and servers. In 2001, Apple jumped into the digital music player business with its iPod, which is now the most popular.

And last year, Apple launched the iTunes Music Store, which allowed legal music downloads after Jobs persuaded music companies that his technology was secure.

It also helped that Jobs also owned an entertainment company. Jobs paid \$10 million to buy a special effects computer business from filmmaker George Lucas. The company, which eventually became Pixar, has become hugely successful after releasing "Toy Story," "Finding Nemo" and "Monsters, Inc."

Intel to launch tri-mode Wi-Fi chipset

Fulfilling a long-time goal, Intel Corp. is set to introduce on Thursday its first chipset that supports all three current forms of Wi-Fi, according to sources familiar with the announcement.

With a chipset that includes IEEE 802.11a, b and g technology, a notebook PC can continue to connect to corporate wireless LANs without a hardware upgrade even if the enterprise migrates to a new infrastructure. Other vendors already offer so-called "tri-mode" chipsets. Early this year Intel introduced a combination 802.11b/g chipset, but it has yet to include all three technologies. Intel spokeswoman Amy Martin declined to comment, but the company last week sent out an e-mail invitation to a Thursday morning webcast "to introduce its latest wireless technology for Intel Centrino notebooks." "It really will mark the time that Intel's caught up," said Mike Feibus, an analyst at TechKnowledge Strategies Inc., in Scottsdale, Ariz. Intel's size makes it less agile than smaller competitors such as Broadcom Corp., Atheros Communications Inc. and Texas Instruments Inc., which have had the chipsets for some time, some analysts said.

In addition, Intel is very careful because it has so much invested in the Centrino brand, said Linley Group analyst Bob Wheeler. "They are extremely rigorous in terms of testing, primarily for compatibility but also making sure that they are complying with all the appropriate specs," Wheeler said.

The 802.11b and g technologies use radio spectrum around 2.4GHz to deliver data at a rate of 11Mbps (bits per second) and 54Mbps, respectively. The less common 802.11a variant, also with a 54Mbps rate, uses spectrum around 5GHz and can be used on more channels simultaneously. Also, there is less interference in the 5GHz band.

Apple introduced 802.11b networking technology to Mac users in 1999 with the first iBook model. Dubbed "AirPort," the technology quickly became a ubiquitous feature of Apple's CPU products. It was replaced in 2003 by "AirPort Extreme," which uses the faster 802.11g technology. Apple bypassed 802.11a networking all together in its own products, although it is supported by third-party manufacturers.

802.11a's SGHz technology is likely to grow more popular as 802.11b and g networks get more heavily loaded with users, analysts said. The 2.4GHz technologies only allow for three channels to be used simultaneously. The number of channels on 802.11a varies by country but is generally more; it supports 24 in the U.S. That can make a difference in offices and crowded meeting rooms, Feibus said. Another emerging application for 802.11a is in wireless home entertainment systems.

Intel's Centrino marketing also should help drive adoption of tri-mode technology, said Will Strauss, principal analyst at Forward Concepts Co., in Tempe, Arizona. But he believes most users, especially consumers, are happy with 802.11b/g for now. Demand for 802.11a will not suddenly soar, he said.

"We will see increasing demand ... but it's not going to be a hockey stick,"

Strauss said.

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Another analyst said tri-mode has a big future, at least in the business market.

"We'll see the enterprise products go to a/b/g probably almost exclusively by the first or second quarter of next year, if not sooner than that," said Abner Germanow, at IDC, in Framingham, Mass.

#### **Need A Hood Man?**

Do you use your PowerBook in locations where the ambient light washes out the screen and makes it really hard to see your favorite picture or text? You really hate to increase the screen brightness much because that not only wears the battery down more quickly but also shortens the life of the bulb. If you happen to be riding in a car, you can put a sun screen such as the Axius Auto-Shade #80050 (about \$10 per pair at Wal-Mart) on the window to block some of the light but the PowerBook will probably still be hard to see.

Since we like to use our PowerBook while we are traveling in our minivan, we have purchased a lap tray on which to set the computer to keep the computer off our legs. My home-brew method for keeping the ambient light off the PowerBook screen was to build an enclosure for it. I used poster board and packaging tape to create a little building (two sides, a back, and a top) which was dimensioned to the width and depth of the lap tray and the height of the PowerBook screen. The enclosure can be folded flat for storage and unfolded to enclose the PowerBook. The enclosure is inconvenient to store and clumsy to use so I kept looking for an alternate solution. Some time ago I saw an ad in one of the Mac magazines for a product manufactured by the Hoodman company. Just prior to this year's vacation I decided to order a unit and give it a try.


The Eclipse E2000-12 sun shade for our 12 inch PowerBook is a combination of black cloth and springy wire. In its carrying case, the Eclipse is 8" by 7" by 1.5" thick. When it is removed from the carrying case, it springs into a shape which fits right over the PowerBook screen. Three easy folds needing both hands flattens the Eclipse for return to its carrying case. You can't lose the carrying case while you are using the Eclipse because it fastens to the top of the Eclipse and hangs over the back of the PowerBook screen, helping to keep the Eclipse in place.

I am quite pleased with our Eclipse. It does a very good job of sheltering the PowerBook screen from the ambient light. The sides of the Eclipse angle inward slightly so you look at the screen through a 7.5" wide by 5" high opening 4.5 inches from the screen. The cloth of the Eclipse is an opaque

black that lets no light reach the screen from the sides. When we are finished with the Eclipse, it fits quite conveniently into a glovebox. The Eclipse is available in sizes to fit many PowerBooks. The E2000-12 is available from Hoodman.com for \$28 plus shipping.

Hoodman also sells small hoods for the LCD screens of digital cameras, but that's a story someone else will have to tell.

## Second-Generation Power Mac G5 Hot New CPU Pushes High End Higher

Back in June 2003, when Apple announced its first Power Mac G5 models, performance-hungry pro users heaved a sigh of relief. Compared with the G4 line, the new machines offered an elegant enclosure, a sophisticated cooling system that didn't make a racket, and lots of other state-of-the-art technology.

Above all, there was the PowerPC G5 processor. Besides a huge one-time performance boost, it was supposed to provide plenty of headroom for future advances, thanks to a streamlined architecture and a manufacturer—IBM—renowned for its chip-building prowess. The lagging performance and frustrating delays that marked the Motorola-built G4s were ancient history, we were told at the WWDC. Steve Jobs even promised an assem-

blage of Apple developers last year that the top of the Power Mac line would hit 3GHz—a 50 percent speedup—by mid-2004.

Unfortunately, things haven't quite worked out that way. Just like Intel and other chip makers, IBM ran into unexpected difficulties as it moved to a new generation of production technology. For a year the G5 stalled at a maximum speed of 2GHz, and when Apple announced new Power Macs in June of this year, the best it could offer was 2.5GHz—embarrassingly short of Jobs's promise. And IBM even had trouble living up to that commitment: the new high-end Power Mac, with dual-2.5GHz G5 processors (that is, two completely separate chips, not one chip with dual processing cores) was supposed to ship in July, according to Apple's announcement, but didn't actually begin to reach impatient customers until late August.

Still, the new model is finally here, along with new versions of its dual-2GHz and dual-1.8GHz siblings, and it delivers a substantial, if not earth-shaking, speedup. The improvement is noticeable even in mundane tasks like unstuffing files, scrolling through PDF documents, and browsing the Web, but as you'd expect, the benefits are most significant in demanding image- and multimedia-processing work (see the benchmark chart).

Three Times Two

As usual, Apple offers three standard Power Mac configurations, but now they all have dual processors. The top-of-the-line system is priced as before at \$2,999, but it now comes with a pair of the new 2.5GHz G5 processors. The midrange, \$2,499 configuration, formerly powered by dual-1.8GHz processors, now has two that run at 2GHz. And what used to be the least expensive Power Mac, with a single 1.6GHz G5 chip and a price tag of \$1,799, has been replaced by a dual-1.8GHz model priced at \$1,999.

All three configurations now have 8x SuperDrives, up from 4x in the previous generation. That advance hasn't attracted a lot of attention, but if you burn many DVDs, you'll definitely appreciate it. As before, 512MB of memory and a 160GB, 7,200-rpm Serial ATA hard drive are standard in the top-of-the-line and midrange models, while the entry-level configuration has only 256MB of RAM—barely adequate to run OS X—and an 80GB, 7,200-rpm hard drive.

Those aren't the only ways in which the new dual-1.8GHz configuration resembles the discontinued solo 1.6GHz model—it also shares some inherent technological limitations. The logic boards, for example, have only four DIMM slots and are limited

to a maximum of 4GB of RAM, compared with eight such slots and a maximum of 8GB of memory on the higher-end configurations. And while the expansion slots in the high-end models are based on PCI-X technology, those in the new dual-1.8GHz configuration handle only cards built for the older and slower PCI standard. Apple has marketed three different Power Mac G5s with 1.8GHz processors so far. Both the original singleprocessor model and the dual-processor version that replaced it had PCI-X slots and could handle 8GB of RAM: the latest version has PCI and a 4GB limit on memory. All of this could add up to a nightmare for system administrators in organizations with many Macs. It's enough to make you pine for meaningful model numbers.

Of course, not everyone—not even every pro user—needs 8GB of RAM or PCI-X slots. In fact, 15 months after Apple announced its first PCI-X systems, the Made4Mac database of third-party products on the company's Web site still showed only four Mac-compatible PCI-X cards. Still, it makes sense to give some hard thought to your future as well as present hardware needs before you shell out about \$2,000 for a system Apple has deliberately hobbled.

ADC RIP

Like their predecessors, all three new machines have an AGP (Accelerated Graphics Port) 8x Pro slot. Nvidia's GeForce FX 5200 Ultra, with 64MB of dedicated memory, again fills it on the standard entry-level and midrange configurations, while the high-end system now comes with the 128MB ATI Radeon 9600 XT, successor to the 9600 Pro that was standard in the old high-end setup.

If you have your Power Mac configured to order, you're free to upgrade to higher-performance graphics: buyers of the low-end and midrange models can move up to the Radeon 9600 XT for \$50 more, to the new ATI Radeon 9800 XT for \$350, or to the Nvidia GeForce 6800 Ultra DDL (required if you're going to use Apple's new 30-inch Cinema HD Display) for \$500; from the high-end Power Mac, the upgrades are \$50 less. (We tested only the standard cards.)

All of these cards support dual dis-

plays and have two DVI ports; a DVIto-VGA adapter is included. Apple apparently has given up on its proprietary, single-cable ADC connector—a setback for those who can't stand cable clutter, but a win if you prefer industry-standard ports and a wide range of displays to choose from.

A word of warning, though: some third-party displays may not work with the cards Apple offers. An AG Neovo flat-panel display we've used with Power Mac G4s wouldn't work at all when connected to the Nvidia card in the new dual-2GHz G5, though it worked fine with the Radeon 9600 XT in the high-end model. Posts in the discussion forums on Apple's online support site report problems with displays from Samsung and several other manufacturers.

Any Port in a Storm

In other respects, the new Power Macs are basically similar to their predecessors. They have the same enormous enclosure with brushed-aluminum surfaces and a hole-punched grille on the outside, and an elaborate thermalmanagement system, with plastic baffles and nine fans, on the inside. In the high-end model, a water-cooling system built into the processor modules—and therefore invisible to the user, even when you remove the Power Mac's side panel—helps keep the dual 2.5GHz processors from melting down. You'll still hear the fans kick in fairly often, particularly when you're doing processor-intensive work, but sometimes for no obvious reason. Like the original G5s, however, the new systems are noticeably quieter than Power Mac G4s.

In terms of connectivity, the new GSs sport the same rich variety of options as last year's models. A USB 2.0 port, a FireWire 400 connector, and a headphone jack are conveniently located on the front panel. On the back there's an even dozen ports: two for USB 2.0; one each for FireWire 800 and 400, Gigabit Ethernet, and the built-in 56-Kbps modem; four audio jacks (analog and optical in and out); and antenna connectors for optional internal AirPort Extreme and Bluetooth cards (\$79 and \$50, respectively).

The Price/Performance Equation

In the previous generation of Power

Macs, the midrange model was the clear standout in terms of bang for the buck once Apple added a second 1.8GHz G5 processor. In the new lineup, however, the price/performance ratios look quite different. First of all, the high-end configuration, with its 2.5GHz processors, now holds a much larger speed lead—21 percent on our Photoshop test, for example—over the midrange model.

At the other end of the spectrum, now that the base configuration also has dual processors, it's no longer the relative laggard the entry-level Power Mac used to be: on our Speedmark benchmark, the new dual-1.8GHz system trails the dual-2GHz model by only 8.5 percent; in the previous generation, the base model, with a single 1.6GHz GS processor, came in almost 23 percent behind what was then the midrange configuration (with two 1.8GHz chips). Macworld's Buying Advice

For the graphics and media pros the Power Mac G5 line is designed for, we think the clear speed advantage of the dual-2.5GHz model makes it well worth its \$2,999 price tag. But if your budget is tight, you can live with a little less than maximum performance, and you don't foresee any need for PCI-X or more than 4GB of memory, then our recommendation is the \$1,999 base model. It's only a little slower than Apple's midrange offering, and even after you add some RAM and maybe a larger hard drive, you'll still save several hundred dollars

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### Shareware Review: iClip

iClip is an OS X application that combines the capabilities of multiple OS X Finder clipboards, the Scrapbook of the older operating systems, and much more. You can store text, pictures, sounds, Internet locations, and file aliases in each of the "clipping bins" that iClip makes available. The clipping bins can be organized into sets so information you frequently access can be found quickly. All of this information is automatically stored on your hard drive so it is available every time you fire up your Mac until you decide you no longer need the data and clear the bin(s).

iClip should be launched at start-up so its clipping bins are on your desktop and its menu is available from the menu bar whenever you need it (iClip can be launched from the Dock if you prefer to operate that way). The iClip window which shows the clipping

bins remains in front of application windows so it is always available (see the accompanying screenshot). The iClip window can be collapsed, expanded, or hidden with a single click and shown with a command from the iClip menu. Clipping bins can be easily added to or removed from the iClip window as changes are needed.

iClip permits you to use "Copy" and Paste" buttons located next to its bins or "drag and drop" to move data between your application, the OS X Clipboard, and iClip's clipping bins. The data may pass through or bypass the OS X clipboard as you wish. The multiple clipping bins provided by iClip make it easy to transfer multiple clippings from one application to another.


The data stored in a particular bin is represented by a snippet of the data to help identify it. Moving the cursor to

one of the bins and pausing there causes iClip to display the contents of the bin.

If you store file aliases in iClip's clipping bins, you can use iClip as a program launcher. Double-clicking on the file alias opens the aliased application or opens the aliased document in an appropriate application.

iClip is a very powerful addition to any Mac OS X desktop. iClip works very well and I have run up against no bugs in the program. Thus far I have not made extensive use of iClip, however, because the times I need its power seem to be few and far between.

iClip is available from the usual Mac software sites like Versiontracker and MacUpdate or from http://inventive.us. It requires Mac OS X version 10.2 or later. Cost of iClip is \$20.



## **Keyboard shortcuts**

Some Macintosh keyboard shortcuts used by older operating systems.

Keyboard shortcuts can be a significant time-saver for those commands which are executed very often by a user. These keystrokes offer the advantage of being more direct in achieving a desired function. Integrating these shortcuts into one's computing habits will result in a more efficient and productive Macintosh

All these commands use the 'command' key, located next the space bar, on either side. This 'command' key also has the apple symbol on it as well. To issue one of these keyboard shortcuts, continually hold down the 'command' key and then hit the appropriate alphanumeric key (do not release the 'command' key until the alphanumeric key has been pressed). Here is a list of commonly-used functions supported by keyboard shortcuts.

APPLE key = command = **€**CONTROL key = Ctrl
ENTER key = Enter
OPTION key = Option
POWER ON key = PWR (note: this key is on the top right corner of the keyboard on some machines)

Force Quit (command - Option - ESC)
Use this feature with extreme caution.
You should definitely not rely on this as a usual way to quit an application.
It is useful in the event that you have unsaved work in other applications when your current application freezes up. By using this feature, you can return to the Finder and save the work in your other applications. You should restart your computer after using this feature.

To boot up PowerMac off CD-ROM (Hold down the letter "C" and Restart the Mac)

To boot up off external drive (command - Shift - Option - Delete - and Restart the Mac)

Soft Boot Restart (command - Control - Restart) This feature should also be used with caution. Use only in the event of a freeze up and after you have tried Force Quit. It will restart your computer without having to turn it off and on again. The Restart button is one of two buttons found on some Mac models. It has a left-pointing triangle symbol on it. The buttons can be found on the side, back or front of the Mac. If your Mac has one, pressing it when your Mac has frozen, is the preferred method for restarting. The other button is called the Interrupt button and is used by programmers.

Reboot without Restart button (command - Control - Power)

Zap the PRAM (command - Option - P - R - and restart the Mac)
PRAM stands for Parameter RAM.
Your Mac's Chooser and control panel settings are stored there, even when the computer is turned off. Sometimes these settings need to be reset.

Rebuild the Desktop (command - Option -.... at RESTART)

Take Snapshot of screen (command - Shift - #3) This feature allows you to capture your screen as a PICT file. Files are saved on your hard drive as Picture X (where X is a number from 0 to 9.)

Take Snapshot of a selected area of screen (command - Shift - #4)
This feature allows you to capture your screen as a PICT file. Files are saved on your hard drive as Picture X (where X is a number from 0 to 9.)

Turn Off Extensions (Shift -..... at RESTART)
This disables, for this startup only, any items that load at startup, such as system extensions, control panels, or chooser extensions. It also disables virtual memory, and background printing with Print Monitor, and turns the Disk Cache down to 16k (the minimum.) It also prevents launching any items in the Startup Items Folder.

To empty Trash with locked files (Option and Empty Trash from Special menu) Bypass Set Start-up Device (command - Option - Shift - Delete -..... at RESTART)

Copy Selection (command - C)

After a selection of text is highlighted, its contents can then be copied for temporary storage by typing command-C and be used elsewhere later on. Copying also works for names of icons in the system. See Paste Selection on how to place the copied information.

Cut Selection (command - X)

To remove a highlighted selection of text and temporarily save it, one can use command-X to cut it out immediately. See Paste Selection on how to place this cut information elsewhere.

Paste Selection (command - V)

Whether a highlighted selection of text has been copied or cut, it can be placed by positioning the cursor at the desired start point. Using command-V will paste the cut or copied information at that desired location.

Undo (command - Z)

For a faster undo, try command-Z. This key combination will restore the previous state before the most recent change. Most major applications which have an Undo feature use this key stroke combination as well.

New (command - N)

In the operating system, command-N will create a new folder in the current window. In applications which use documents, command-N creates something new but this depends on the type of application; some examples are New Window, New Spreadsheet, and New Document.

Open (command - O)

Using command-O from the system will open the icon which has been selected. If the icon is a document file or an application, it will start-up the appropriate application, just like double-clicking on it with the mouse. If the icon is a folder, it will reveal its

contents in a window. In an application, command-O usually opens an existing file for that particular application.

Close Window (command - W)

To close a particular window without having to click on that little box in the upper left hand corner, use command-W which performs the same function of closing it. Make sure that the window to be closed is selected before doing so.

Close All Windows (command - Option - W)

Save File (command - S)

Save File As -.... (Shift - command - S)

Make Alias (command - M)

Get Info (command - I)

For info on a particular icon, click on the icon and type command-I. For an icon representing an application, using command-I immediately displays the memory requirements and other information for that application.

Eject Disk - Permanently (command - Y)
Dragging a floppy disk or CD-ROM icon to the trash to eject a disk can be time consuming and misleading. An alternate way is to click on the disk icon and then hit command-Y, which will eject the disk and send its icon automatically into the trash.

Eject Disk - Temporarily (command - E)
Another way to temporarily eject a floppy disk or CD-ROM is to use command-E. Note that the icon does not go away from the desktop and expects to get the disk back sometime later in the session.

Duplicate (command - D)

To copy anything in the system with an icon, click on the icon and press command-D which will automatically create a duplicate of it.

Select All

(command - A)

Typing command-A is a much quicker way of selecting everything. In the system, it selects all icons in the currently selected window (or desktop). In applications, it may select the entire contents of its current window.

Print

(command - P)

The power of printing is also available to one's fingertips by pressing command-P.Most applications have this keyboard shortcut, which can also be used in the system. The dialog box of printing options appears as usual before the actual printing occurs.

Cancel
(command - period)
In the Mac operating system, command-period (where 'period' is the

period key) can be used as an alternative to clicking the 'cancel' button in cases where a dialog box is displayed.

Find

(command - F)

The command-F shortcut works with the system and almost any application which has a finding feature.

Find Next (command - G)

To find the next occurrence of something much more quickly, try command-G. This shortcut bypasses any repeated button clicking that is required to perform this function when using the mouse.

Quit

(command - Q)

Although there is no quit for the operating system itself, almost all Mac applications can be quit by using command-Q.



## Apple upgrades iBooks

Apple Computer Inc. on Tuesday updated the company's iBook consumer notebook, adding built-in AirPort Extreme across the line. The new machines feature a 1.33GHz processor at the high-end, and a lowend model that sells for under US\$1.000.

"These are the most affordable and fastest iBooks we've ever offered. We really think the iBook is the obvious choice for the digital life on-the-go," David Moody vice president of Worldwide Mac Product Marketing, told MacCentral.

The new iBooks also feature an available SuperDrive DVD burner and iLife, Apple's consumer suite of applications for managing digital music and photos, making movies and music and creating DVDs.

The 12-inch model comes with 256MB DDR SDRAM expandable to up to 1.25GB maximum memory; a 30GB Ultra ATA hard drive; AirPort Extreme 54 Mbps 802.11g wireless networking; two USB 2.0 ports, FireWire 400; VGA video out, S-video and composite video out support; Ethernet (10/100BASE-T); and a slot-

load Combo (DVD-ROM/CD-RW) drive.

The mid-range 14-inch model has 256MB DDR SDRAM expandable to up to 1.25GB maximum memory; a 60GB Ultra ATA hard drive; AirPort Extreme 54 Mbps 802.11g wireless networking; two USB 2.0 ports, FireWire 400; VGA video out, S-video and composite video out support; Ethernet (10/100BASE-T); and a slotload Combo (DVD-ROM/CD-RW) drive.

The high-end 14-inch model has 256MB DDR SDRAM expandable to up to 1.25GB maximum memory; a 60GB Ultra ATA hard drive; AirPort Extreme 54 Mbps 802.11g wireless networking; two USB 2.0 ports, FireWire 400; VGA video out, S-video and composite video out support; Ethernet (10/100BASE-T); and a slotload SuperDrive (DVD-R/CD-RW) drive.

The 12-inch model is available for \$999, while the mid-range 14-inch will cost \$1299 and the high-end model will be \$1499.

If you are planning to purchase an Apple portable for Christmas but want to wait to make sure a new model isn't released at the last

minute, you can rest easy - Apple says this is their holiday line-up.

"This new line-up of iBooks, along with the current PowerBooks we have will make-up the complete portable line-up we will be offering for the holidays," said Moody.

Compared to older models

The iBook's predecessors topped out at 1.2GHz and was available in three models: 12-inch 1GHz (\$1099), 14-inch 1GHz (\$1299) and a 14-inch 1.2GHz (\$1499). The entire iBook line shared many of the same features including a 512K L2 cache; 1024 x 768 resolution; 256MB DDR266 RAM; Combo Drive; the ATI Mobility Radeon 9200; and 32MB DDR video memory.

The main differences in these models were with hard disk capacity and AirPort Extreme capabilities out of the box. The low-end, 12-inch iBook came with a 30GB hard drive and AirPort Extreme ready, while the midrange 14-inch iBook had a 40GB hard drive and came AirPort Extreme ready. The high-end 14-inch iBook had a 60GB drive and came with AirPort Extreme built-in.

## Apple cuts prices and improves products

Apple has revamped its hardware line in time for Christmas, with boosts for iBook specs, a new low-spec Power Mac G5 and lower prices on X-Serve RAID arrays

Apple introduced a range of new machines on Tuesday, as it gears up for the annual Christmas shopping season.

As part of the launch, it cut the price of its entry-level iBook G4 notebook computer and boosted chip speed across the line.

The new low-end iBook features a 1.2 GHz G4 chip, a combination drive that can play DVDs and burn CDs,

and a 12-inch screen. It sells for £749.

A midrange model features a 1.33GHz chip, a combo drive and a 14-inch screen, for £899. The top-of-the-line iBook sells for £1,049 and has the SuperDrive, a drive that can burn both DVDs and CDs.

Previously, the SuperDrive had been available only as a configure-to-order option. "We think this is making the product quite a bit better, able to handle the consumer's complete digital life," said Dave Russell, Apple's senior director of portables and wireless marketing.

With the new iBooks, Apple's notebook line-up is complete for the holidays, said David Moody, vice president of worldwide Mac product marketing. Although the company typically doesn't comment on its future product plans, the pronouncement is Apple's way of dampening speculation that faster PowerBooks are on the way.

Apple has also added faster 802.11g wireless networking as standard to all its iBook models, and Bluetooth is now an option on the whole range as well.

One potential challenge for Apple is that the faster processors and 802.11g wireless networking put the iBook closer in features to the company's higher-end PowerBook line. In particular, the changes encroach on the 12-inch PowerBook, which sells for £1,149 and includes many of the same capabilities as the beefed-up iBooks. The 15-inch and 17-inch PowerBooks have features not includ-

ed in the smaller model, such as Gigabit Ethernet networking and faster FireWire ports.

Russell said these features and others, such as lower weight and support for a second display, will lead professional customers to opt for the pricier PowerBook. "We think there is differentiation," Russell said. He went on to note: "We're certainly happy if they choose any Apple notebook."

On the desktop

Alongside the update to its iBook line, Apple added a cheaper, single-processor model to its Power Mac G5 desktops, introducing a 1.8GHz machine for £1,099. With that addition, the company's desktop line-up is probably also complete, as it recently introduced updated iMacs.

On top of this, Apple is adding the option of a cheaper Nvidia graphics card for its PowerMacs. The graphics card is capable of supporting the company's 30-inch Cinema Display. That

display was announced in June, but just started shipping in volume two weeks ago -- weeks later than Apple had planned.

Finally, Apple revamped its Xserve RAID rack-mounted storage system. The new Xserve RAID systems come in three models. The first features four 250GB modules and sells for £4,599. A midrange model offers seven 400GB modules for £6,549, and the top model offers 5.6 terabytes of total storage for £9,999.

"It's bigger, it's faster and more affordable," said Alex Grossman, Apple's director of server and storage product marketing. Grossman noted that the new systems cost just over \$2 per gigabyte, down from about \$3 per gigabyte on earlier Xserve RAID models.

The 400GB modules will become available as an option for the Xserve server, allowing owners to increase the storage on those models to 1.2

terabytes. Apple said it doesn't plan to bump up the 2GHz top speed of the machine's processors, even though it did ship some 2.3GHz servers to Virginia Tech for that school's supercomputer.

"Virginia Tech was a one-off," Grossman said. "That is not something we have planned or announced."

The product news follows Sunday's price cut from Intel, which supplies computer chips to a majority of Apple's rivals. Intel has also ramped up its efforts to stimulate holiday sales. The chipmaker lowered prices on its flagship mobile computer chips, including its Pentium M processors and its Centrino bundle.

The fourth quarter of the calendar year is historically the most profitable for computer hardware makers and for many other consumer products companies.

## Steve Jobs unveils Apple mini stores



At a private viewing at Stanford Shopping Center in Palo Alto, Calif., Apple Computer Inc. on Thursday unveiled a new 750-square-foot "mini" design for its retail store. The first six stores using the design, which Apple CEO Steve Jobs -- in his first public appearance since cancer surgery -- described as "designed to be small, and cool because [they] are small," will open this Saturday.

The six stores opening this Saturday at 10 a.m. are in Palo Alto; San Jose, Calif.; Santa Rosa, Calif.; Tukwila, Wash.; Bridgewater, New Jersey; and Rockaway, New Jersey. Three additional mini stores are due to open by the end of 2004 in Bethesda, Maryland; Syracuse, New York; and St. Louis, Missouri.

The new stores feature a striking new design inside the small space, which is roughly half the size of Apple's smallest and most common retail outlets. The ceiling is an unbroken expanse of white, lit from behind; the walls are Japanese-made stainless steel (with Power Mac GS-style holes around the top of the walls for venti-

lation purposes); and the floor is a shiny white made, according to Jobs, of "material used in aircraft hangars."



Mini store

Products in the new stores are half iPod related, half Mac related, according to Jobs. "That's new for us, and we hope to draw iPod customers into the store," he said. Both Jobs and Apple Senior Vice President of Retail Ron Johnson said they hoped the new store's hip design would draw a younger, hipper customer.

"This design will help us carry our philosophy to even more people," Jobs said as the store was unveiled.

The mini retail stores will give Apple

the opportunity to locate in places that, until now, have been too small to fit a tradition retail location. Apple now has four designs for its retail locations: The two-story Flagship stores with glass staircase; stores with theaters; smaller size stores with no theatre; and the mini stores. Johnson said that the new store size will allow Apple to serve both smaller markets that currently have no Apple retail presence, as well as high-traffic areas that are somewhat close to established Apple stores.

For example, the Stanford Shopping Center store is only about a mile from Apple's large Palo Alto store, but Johnson said that the large amount of shoppers at Stanford made adding an Apple presence there make sense. The store will be connected to nearby Apple outlets via an Internet-based voice messaging system, so that customers who can't find a product at the smaller store can be directed to that product if it's in stock at a nearby store.

Johnson also pointed out that the new store design was the same size as

reail outlets in airports, and suggested that airport-based Apple retail outlets could be convenient for travelers wishing to buy iPods and other accessories.

With the exception of four stools at a small Genius Bar at the back of the store, the entire floor of the new store is empty. On a single row of counters to the left of the entrance are a series of iPod stations, showcasing each iPod product with selected accessories. On the right side, a similar countertop features iBooks, PowerBooks, and the iMac G5 with

selected accessories. (eMacs and Power Mac G5s were not present.) The back half of the store offers six tall rows of shelves on each side; the left side is stocked with accessories, while the right contains software and books.

Most uniquely, between the front and back sections of the store are two touch-screen-based kiosks, embedded in the walls, that allow customers to scan the bar codes of the products they wish to buy. Once they scan a product, an image of it will appear on the screen. Customers will then insert

a credit card to pay for them, and walk out of the store, all without interacting with a clerk.

Johnson said that currently 80 percent of Apple's retail customers pay for products with a credit card. He also said that, at first, one kiosk at mini stores will be for "assisted checkout" with the help of an Apple employee; the other kiosk will be devoted to self-serve check-out. After that, the stores will adapt based on how customers embrace the self-check-out system.



## Firefox Browser Drawing Lots of Fans into its Web

Gary Vollink, who works at an Edina based tech firm, is on a quiet crusade to convert his co-workers.

He wants them to switch from Microsoft Internet Explorer browser to the increasing popular Firefox.

This upstart browser has seen a surge of I.E. converts, with downloads exceeding seven million as of last week. This is partly due to the well-publicized security problems involving I.E. and partly because Firefox boasts features not found in the market-leading Microsoft browser.

Firefox, long available in experimen-

tal form, is due to be officially released this week in versions for Windows, Mac OSX and other operating systems.

Well Vollink doesn't expect his colleagues at Corvu North America to abandom I.E. on their Window XP PCs - some web sites won't display properly in other browsers - he believes many will switch to Firefox for the bulk of their browsing once they become aware of it's capabilities.

Here are some of the Firefox features that have Vollink and legions of others so enthusiastic:

Tab Browsing
When Ellen Danzis of Hoboken, NJ
reads news articles on the web every
morning, he opens each article in it's

own browser window. But the windows aren't strewn across his onscreen desktop, as they would be with I.E. users.

Instead, they're neatly integrated into one window, with a set of tabs in the upper-edge for quickly clicking from article to article.

"I have the habit of going to the main news sites, opening each news article in a new tab, before setting in a actually reading all the articles," says Danzis, who works at the NYC public relations firm.

Tab browsing isn't unique to Firefox. Other web browsers, such as the Macbased Safari and multiple platform Opera, also offer it. One browser, Omniweb for the Mac, even creates tabs in the form of small web page pictures so they're easy to differentiate. Given tabs popularity, many are amazed that Microsoft hasn't embraced them.

#### Extensions

A sure sign that a software product has become popular is that an array of third-party plug-ins to augment the program's capabilities. By that measure, Firefox is a success thanks to the easy to install "extensions" that turbo-charge the browser.

Firefox users polled for this article offered up their favorities, including extensions that let them block web ads, keep up with local weather conditions, zoom in on images within pages, synchronize browser bookmarks on multiple machines, spell check text in form fields, move tabs around, help translate foreign web pages into English and even control music programs such as iTunes and Window Media Player.

I.E. users employ add on toolbars from Yahoo and Google, and Firefox isn't far behind. The Firefox ultrabar (Firefoxtoolbar.com) adds an array of net search features, and Amazon.com last week released a Firefox version of its a-9 search engine toolbar (toolbar.a9.com).

#### Live book marks

Weblogs and new sites are continually being refreshed with new information. Such updates are being disseminated as automated (feeds) via the popular technology known as really simple syndication. RSS junkies have typically used standalone "reader" software for subscribing to their favorite feeds, but RSS is now built into Firefox in the form of web bookmarks that are continually updated. Users create a live-bookmark folder associated with their favorite blogs, or new sites, then click the folder every morning to see the latest entries.

Live bookmarks are "kind of tricky to set up", say Robert Foltz, a Dallas web site developer and Firefox junkie, "but nice to have."

#### Pop-up Blocking

Web users detest pop-up windows, so a blocking control is a must have. Even Microsoft has added such a feature. The catch: its latest version of I.E. works only with Windows XP. Those with older versions of Windows must either add a third-party pop-up blocker such as the Google toolbar or switch to a different web browser.

"I started using Firefox over a year ago because I was sick of pop-up ads," say Matthew Dettinger of St. Paul, a 3M senior systems analyst who now relies on the browser at work and at home.

#### The Intangibles

Some Firefox users say they're converts for reasons not related to specific features.

Isaac Grover of River Falls, WI, likes that Firefox is a non-profit, collaborative "open source" project that yields upgrades at a fast pace compared to commercial I.E., which stagnated for years before undergoing a series of improvements.

"Firefox source code is scrutinized by many programmers and security professionals than I.E., whose only scrutiny is performed in-house at Microsoft," Grover says.

Phil West of San Antonio, TX, is leery of internet Explorer despite recent security upgrades. "I'm just not convinced, with I.E"s prevalence, that it's not going to (be) a target for hackers," he says.

Firefox represents less of a security risk, some users say because it isn't interwined with the windows operating system the way internet Explorer is. Ross Mayfield, chief executive of the Silicon Valley based Socialtext software firm, summarizes what he sees as key Firefox advantages: "Simple, secure, open."

## Keyboard command database for ClarisWorks/Appleworks

One of our members Burt Benson has developed a ClarisWorks/AppleWorks database for finding keyboard shortcut commands to word processing, spreadsheet, database, draw and paint routines in ClarisWorks/AppleWorks. Even though this database was developed using ClarisWorks 4.0 many if not all of these shortcuts are used in older as well as newer versions of ClarisWorks/AppleWorks. This database will be available for download from our BBS (Bulletin Board System). We have added the screen shots in the following Read Me file for illustrative purposes.



Keyboard Commands. ClarisWorks 4.0 version 4. System 7.5.3.

This is a database of shortcut keyboard commands that I created.

The database is a more convenient way for me to locate the keyboard commands that I forget. It is not necessary to know them to operate this computer.

The main layout I use is the Data Input & Find Form. Near the top of the Data Input & Find Form, under Keyboard Command, is a field in red that combines the three fields in red at the bottom of the form. This is the layout I use to put data into or to find records with the Find command under the Layout Menu.

The Data Input & Find Form contains the fields or environments that I make reports on. Word Processing.

Spreadsheet.

Database.

Draw.

Paint.

Communications.

Finder.

Starting up.

These are the eight fields that I put the description of what the keyboard command does in each environment.

Below the fields above are three red fields that I put the commands in.

Command Key.

Letter or Number.

Character.

It is best to type the parts of the Keyboard Command in the right field so that sorting them will work the way I intended. To use this database, select one of the eight reports above from the report pop up menu on the tool palette. Shift Command T opens and closes the tool palette. The reports are found in the lower right hand corner of the palette. When you have a report open, it will have a green background. It will be sorted and there will be no empty fields. If you notice some red type in the field, that means there may be some hidden text there. Select that field by clicking on it with the mouse or by using the tab key. It will expand and you will be able to see a more complete explanation.

When you see parenthesis in the description, this is where you will find that command in the menu if you are using this version of ClarisWorks and Operating System. You will be able to scan this report to see if a shortcut keyboard command is

available.

If I know there is a keyboard command, but I can not remember it, I go to the Data Input & Find Form Report and use the Command F Find/Change dialog box to find what I want. In this dialog box, I put in any part of the keyboard command that I can remember, and search for it. This will find any record in this database that has the same information in it. You may also use the Find Form (Shift Command F) under the Layout Menu to find groups of records in this report. If you try to find a record when you are in a report with the green background, the Find command will not find any information that is in the keyboard command column, because that command is manufactured from a formula.

CEO Steve Jobs will once again deliver the opening keynote address for Macworld Conference & Expo when it returns to San Francisco, Calif. in January. Jobs' keynote is set to take place on Tuesday, January 11, 2005 at 9:00 AM Pacific Time. The convention itself runs from January 10 - 14, 2005.

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# iBook G4 Updates Portables Get a Speed Boost; AirPort Extreme Now Standard



In a clear effort to boost the appeal of its iBook family to holiday shoppers, Apple cranked up the clock speed on all three models, made AirPort Extreme standard across the line, cut the price of the entry-level model, and added a SuperDrive at the top of the line. Indeed, the inclusion of the SuperDrive in the top model is the only difference between the two high-end iBooks; therefore, we tested only the low-end and the high-end models for this review.

The October update to the consumer and education portables brought the base configuration, priced at \$1,099 since last spring, back down below the psychologically significant \$1,000 mark—more precisely, to \$999. In addition, Apple increased the speed of the G4 processor from 1GHz to 1.2GHz and added an AirPort Extreme card; the 802.11g wireless network card, with a nominal speed of 54 Mbps, was previously a \$79 option.

Other specs on the entry-level model remain unchanged: it still has a 12.1-inch screen, a 30GB hard drive, and a slot-loading Combo (DVD-ROM and



CD-RW) drive. The standard configuration still includes only 256MB of RAM—not enough to use Mac OS X efficiently, in our judgment—but you can use the free DIMM slot to expand to as much as 1.25GB. As before, this iBook has connectors for Ethernet (10/100BaseT), a V.92 modem, and video out, plus two USB 2.0 ports and one FireWire 400 port.

In the case of the midlevel iBook, with its 14.1-inch screen (but the same 1,024-by-768-pixel resolution as the 12.1-inch model), the latest update brought no change in price—it's still \$1,299. However, its processor speed has gone from 1.06 GHz to 1.33 GHz, hard drive capacity has increased from 40GB to 60GB, and AirPort Extreme has again moved from the options page to the stan-

dard-equipment list. In other respects, the \$1,299 configuration resembles the \$999 one: 256MB of RAM, the same list of ports, and a Combo drive.

Until this latest update, customers buying the middle iBook model at Apple's online store had the option of upgrading to a SuperDrive (CD-RW and DVD-R) for \$200. No longer—now, iBook buyers who want to burn DVDs on the go have to choose the top-of-the-line model, in which the SuperDrive is now standard. That model, which also has a 14.1-inch, 1,024-by-768-pixel screen, is still priced at \$1,499, but its G4 processor has gone from 1.2GHz to 1.33GHz, matching the midlevel model.

The speed bump and the addition of the SuperDrive are the only changes to the high-end

model: as before, it comes with 256MB of RAM, a 60GB hard drive, an AirPort Extreme card, and the same array of ports its siblings have.

A Bluetooth module, providing wireless connectivity to selected mobile phones, printers, and other peripherals, remains a \$50 option for customers buying from the Apple online store.

As our benchmark testing suggests, the extra performance resulting from the new iBooks' faster G4 processors won't exactly blow your socks off; in fact, the differences are barely noticeable without a stopwatch. But the other improvements to the lineup make the iBooks considerably better values than they were before.

We've always appreciated the entrylevel iBook's compact size and relatively low price, and Apple's \$100 price cut and the addition of AirPort Extreme make it a better value than ever. Granted, its 30GB hard drive is a bit puny by today's standards, but if you buy from Apple online, you can double your storage capacity for just \$75, or go all the way to 80GB for \$150. If your eyes demand a larger screen or you just have to have DVDburning capabilities, obviously you'll want to opt for one of the larger, pricier models; otherwise, we see no reason not to take advantage of a genuine bargain. 

## **Backup - It's Worth the Time**

Backup - It's Worth the Time:

As we go about our daily activities, about the last thing we're thinking about is doing a backup. It should be the first. Especially as today's software even makes that automatic and easy, a backup simply should be there. Unfortunately, it's usually after the problem strikes that having a backup comes to mind.

Today's hard drives are extremely reliable, but they are still one of the most if not the most likely component in a computer to experience some sort of problem. Doesn't matter what type of drive we're talking - SCSI, ATA, IDE, FireWire, USB, whatever - at the heart are platters of data spinning from 4200RPM on up to 15,000RPM (rotations per minute).

These drives are designed with various shock protection and with parts designed for the constant high RPM, but just think about it. These are self contained devices constantly under load. And if you've ever held one while it's accessing (I'd not recommend it), you can feel the stresses on the drive as those read/write heads shift to different positions.

The good news is that it is very rare for a drive to fail due a manufacturer defect... But, like any device with moving parts, plenty of other things can cause trouble.... And even where the drive itself has no problem, user error and/or software related problems could result in lost data all the same.

Some causes of data loss and/or drive failure:

\* Jolt to the drive while it is on: While it takes quite a hit to damage a drive that is off, a good jolt to your drive while it is spinning can do it your drive in. Take care that your computer, external drives aren't in a position where a pet or child/person might bump into them, pull on cables, etc. \* Accidental Deletion: More often than anything else, data is lost not because of a mechanical problem - but due to operator error. Whether it

be improperly dismounting a device or just accidentally deleting the wrong folder/files.

- \* Other Users: Kinda in the line of accidental deletion... Being human means we make mistakes... And so might others you allow to use your Mac.
- \* Virus: While Mac Viruses are very rare, you never know when we might get hit. We are lucky as Mac users in this rarity, but it just takes one.
- \* OS Hiccup/Power Outage: Whether it be a hiccup on the system bus or a power outage without an APC to keep you running, at the wrong time this can cause directory block damage or worse.

Think about how much time you've got into your 'data collection'. Then consider where you'd be if all or even a valued part of that data was no longer accessible. Backing is very economical to insure piece of mind in eliminating that single point of failure. With a backup, whether it be a mistake or otherwise, you've got that ace in the hole from which you can get right back and going again. Without a backup, if the worst happens, in the end you pay the price and you've really got one other than yourself to blame.

Recommended Mac Backup Solutions: Dantz Retrospect Express - makes backing up easy with automated scheduling and syncing. Retrospect is the clear in front leader in Backup Software. Included w/ OWC Drives.

Prosoft Backup - A new comer that does it right.

Carbon Copy Cloner - The original OS X HD 'cloner'. Makes a complete, bootable copy of your entire drive - great for getting a new drive going intended to replace the drive you have already. Also allows specific file cloning. This product is shareware and if you like it (we sure do), please give your support!

Didn't have a backup? Depending on the trouble, these utilities may give you a chance to recover that priceless data:

\* Prosoft Data Rescue - Heavy Duty

HD File recovery for the Mac.

- \* TechTool Pro Recovers lost data, optimizes your drive, and a whole lot more!
- \* Drive 10 OS X Drive Maintenance and Repair Utility

No backup and a dead/mechanically failed drive? Then it gets pretty expensive.

DriveSavers: Burned, Driven over, submerged, or mechanically self destructed-these guys are the leaders in data recovery. The price will make you wish you had a backup though!

The DriveSavers Museum of Disasters has a couple Mac Entries and is a neat checkout too...

At the end of the day - backup storage is cheap whereas your data can be priceless

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Quick Tip - Backup or Beware! In the October 11th Newsletter, I presented a Quick Tip about backing up and covered software and services available for recovering lost data if you didn't. Just this past week, my own powerbook experience has served as a personal reminder of the importance and value a backup really has. Having switched to a new Powerbook about 5 weeks ago, I hadn't yet gotten around to getting the backups on schedule again. When OS X went all beach balls', proceeded by the system not seeing a startup drive, proceeded by the Apple Hardware diagnostic returning a storage device error - that sinking feeling engulfed me as I began the process of accepting the loss of what was the prior three weeks of emails and stored project work.

Well, as fate would have it - it was not the Hitachi/IBM 5K80 5400RPM 80GB drive that had failed, but rather the PowerBook's internal ATA hard drive controller flaking out! I got VERY LUCKY and although not the least pleased having a problem with a practically brand new PowerBook, I was very happy having the drive operating without any issue, and with all my data, inside a Mercury On-The-Go

FireWire enclosure. The Apple utility was pretty vague and searching with the code that it returned yielded only one result on Google from a very annoyed user who'd posted somewhere regarding that code and 4 months of work lost. Given my experience, I'd almost wonder if that user's data too had been retrievable if only the drive had been checked separate. Another story in itself...

I'll say it again - I got lucky. But even so, it was not a pleasant feeling when I thought that three weeks of work was lost. Had I followed my own advice, the stress of that thought wouldn't have existed as the thought itself avoided. Needless to say, I have the backup back setup and on autopilot - no more worries - and easily accomplished with Retrospect, although the Carbon Copy Cloner shareware app is another EXCELLENT backup option if you do not have Retrospect. Links and information on these backup applications as well as that Data Recover utility + recovery service center info is all in that fore mentioned Quick Tip.

The thing is, backing up is easy -

much easier than not having a backup when something goes wrong. Think of all those songs (If you lose music purchased from the iTunes store - that's it unless you buy them again!), personal stuff, work stuff, e-mail, etc. Think of that stuff gone without a simple backup. Now consider weighing cost of losing that stuff forever versus the significant expense of having a data recovery house getting it back.

Still - while I had reserved myself the several weeks of lost e-mail and project data, had I kept up with my own advice - that sinking feeling is something I wouldn't have had to experience. I am back up and good again, and my automatic backup/sync is all in place. And that's the thing - backing up is easy! The cost of losing the data is far beyond the cost of a FireWire drive that includes Retrospect backup software. And it gets better - if you are using Retrospect or even the excellent free application Carbon Copy Cloner, the backup can be setup to be BOOTABLE! Main drive craps out, boot from the FireWire drive and no lost time at all.

Way back when, backing up meant messing with floppy discs, tape cartridges, zip discs, or even burning CDs... Today, with plug and play FireWire, backing up is a breeze and getting back up from the backup is a breeze too. Knock on wood, this is my first scare in years - but it could have been more than a scare. Having a backup gives you protection from non-hardware problems too - like accidental deletions, system corruption glitches, etc. For little more than a Franklin you can have an effective backup solution that is worth its weight in gold for the peace of mind it provides and the serious cash it'll save should the worst someday hap-

6. Tips for Ten: Just Zip It

When you want to archive documents or send large files to colleagues, it's very helpful to have compression software at hand. Compressing files saves storage space and helps speed files over the Internet.

And if you've installed Mac OS X v10.3 "Panther," you don't have to go very far to find such software because compression technology comes built in. To take advantage of this technology from the Finder, simply:

- 1. Select a document, a group of documents or a folder
- 2. Pull down the File menu and choose "Create Archive of [name]"

Panther adds a ".zip" suffix at the end of individual files or folders; creates a file called "Archive.Zip" when you compress multiple documents or folders. And here's an added bonus: zip is the most common compression format in the Windows world.





### **Shootout at the Disk Repair Corral**

Some things are inevitable. Death, taxes, and disk crashes. One day you will try to open an important file, only to receive a dire error message. Or perhaps you'll discover that an entire folder has vanished. Worse yet, maybe your Mac won't even boot, thanks to some sort of disk corruption.

Fortunately, you have a full backup of all your data, so you just restore the missing data from your backup, and you're back in business. What's that you say? The last time you backed up was during the Reagan administration?

If an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, then surely the most effective disk repair program is actually a reliable backup utility. My favorite is Dantz's Retrospect. But whatever backup program you choose, you must use it regularly, so you have a current backup when your hard disk is called to that great clean room in the sky. (See the TidBITS article series, "Have You Backed Up Today?" for more details on setting up a good backup strategy.) <a href="http://db.tidbits.com/getbits.acgi?tbs.er=1041">http://db.tidbits.com/getbits.acgi?tbs.er=1041</a>

Yet just as so many of us would prefer to lose weight by taking a magic pill rather than through diet and exercise, we'd rather fix a corrupted disk with a disk utility, rather than restoring from a backup, even when a recent backup is available. It can take many hours to do a full restore from a backup, whereas a good disk utility can often fix minor disk errors in minutes. Some of the Macintosh world's favorite disk repair programs have recent upgrades, and here I'll compare the Norton Disk Doctor tool in Symantec's Norton Utilities 8.0 (\$100), Alsoft's DiskWarrior 3.0 (\$80), Micromat's Drive 10 1.1.4 (\$70), SubRosaSoft's DiskGuardian 2.2 (\$70), and Apple's Disk Utility (free). Although these programs contain a wide variety of disparate features, I concentrate on their disk repair functions in Mac OS X. I chose not to include Prosoft Engineering's Data Rescue X, because it recovers files onto another disk and does not repair

The user interface and ancillary features of a disk repair program are secondary, because in the event of disaster you care about only one thing: will it get my data back? So let's concentrate on the heart of the issue: what are the most common disk errors you may experience, and which disk repair programs can save your bacon when you're unfortunate enough to suffer disk corruption? In my experience, most people run into three general categories of disk problems: hardware failure, bad sectors, and damaged directories. After a brief examination of how you get started with these programs, given that you can't repair an active startup disk in Mac OS X, I look at the worst type of problem - hardware failures, after which I examine the soft errors and compare the performance of the disk repair programs.

\*\*Booty Call\*\* -- One disadvantage of Mac OS X is that a disk repair program can't safely check the startup disk. Despite this, and the fact that Apple's official line is that checking startup disks is not supported, Norton Disk Doctor and DiskGuardian both allow checking of the startup disk, although they warn against doing so. I consider messing about with startup disks under Mac OS X dangerous, and I advise you not to do it. Fortunately, there is a simple solution. Restart in "single user mode" by holding down Command-S while the Mac is starting up. In single user mode, you're dropped into a command line version of Mac OS X, without windows or a mouse pointer. Type "fsck -y" to check (and repair, if necessary) the boot disk, after which you restart the Mac by typing "reboot" (sans quotes for both commands). Disk Utility and fsck rely on the same engine, so running fsck in single user mode is exactly the same as running

Disk Utility.

If you're uncomfortable with the command line for even two commands. you have an alternative. If you boot your Mac using the Mac OS X Installer CD, you can run Disk Utility from there. At the first screen in the Installer, choose Open Disk Utility from the Installer menu. What about the other disk repair programs? All except DiskGuardian (for now, but a new version is expected soon) come on bootable CDs. Insert the CD, turn on your Mac, and hold down the C key to force the computer to boot from the CD. Bootable CDs are essential in the event that your hard disk is so badly damaged that your computer won't even start up.

\*\*It's Dead, Jim\*\* -- Let's look at what can go wrong now. Hardware failure can result from the electronics on the drive's controller board burning out, or the heads or the arm developing mechanical problems. Sometimes a problem with the lubricating grease prevents the disk from spinning or the read arm from moving, causing a problem known as "sticktion." These problems are caused by dropping the disk, by defective components, by static discharge, or even by sheer age. Usually the disk won't even show up on the Desktop. As far as the disk utilities go, Drive 10 can detect hardware errors with a "Unit Ready" test, which is just what it sounds like. Drive 10 asks the drive "Are you ready?" and the drive replies "No." This test is mostly helpful for confirming hardware errors you probably already suspect.

Hopefully there's no vital data locked in the dead drive. No software program can repair a disk with hardware problems. If you desperately need to retrieve the data, your only option is a data recovery company such as DriveSavers, who I've found to be professional, competent, and expensive. \*\*Extended Warranties\*\* -- If your drive has just suffered a hardware failure, you're probably checking the warranty and hunting for your receipt. Don't despair, even if your computer or external hard drive is out of warranty from the manufacturer. Many hard drives, even those installed in computers, are also covered by longer warranties provided by the OEM (original equipment manufacturer), the company that actually made the drive. If you're willing and able to open a case and remove the drive mechanism, you can take advantage of this warranty.

Here's the trick. Although you may have bought the computer from Apple, or the drive from VST, those companies don't make drive mechanisms. Instead, your drive was probably made by IBM, Seagate, Maxtor, HP, Western Digital, or another hard drive manufacturer. These companies often offer an independent warranty on their drives, and it's often longer than the warranty on your Mac or external hard drive. Drive mechanism warranties may be two years, and some run as long as five years. Better yet, if you've lost the receipt, the company can sometimes look up a drive's serial number to verify that it's still under warranty.

Both HP and IBM have replaced dead drives for me, without a receipt, simply by checking my serial numbers. Even better, IBM didn't make 14 GB drives anymore, so they replaced my dead one with a 20 GB unit.

\*\*SMART Stuff\*\* -- Some modern hard drives have a feature called SMART, which stands for Self-Monitoring, Analysis, and Reporting Technology. Originally developed by IBM, SMARTcompliant drives constantly perform diagnostics to monitor variables like drive temperature, spin up time, and how well the heads stay on track. By noting when these physical parameters slip out of spec, SMART can predict some types of drive failure before they happen, giving you time to back up your data and buy a new drive. Unfortunately, most hard drives have no way to tell you about an impending disaster; you need a program to query the drive's SMART statistics. Both DiskWarrior and DiskGuardian can check the drive at regular intervals and alert you if they find trouble. Using SMART works well if your disk has a factory defect that's slowly getting worse, because it gives you time to move your data to a new disk. But SMART doesn't help you deal with the

occasional bad sector or corrupted directory, much less catastrophic hardware failures. Since I don't have a drive with impending hardware failure, I was unable to test the SMART capabilities of DiskWarrior and DiskGuardian.

\*\*Unsavory Sectors\*\* - Now it's time to move from pure hardware problems to problems that could be either physical (hardware) or logical (software). Disks are broken up into sectors. Each sector usually holds 512 bytes of data. There are two types of problems that lead to bad sectors: hard errors and soft errors. Hard errors are caused by physical damage to the disk surface. Dropping the disk and manufacturing defects are the most common causes of hard errors. Although there's no way to repair hard errors, they can be "fixed" by "sparing" the bad sector. Disks maintain a small number of spare sectors in reserve: when a hard error occurs, the drive controller maps out the bad sector and uses one of the spare sectors in its place. How are these bad sectors spared? SCSI hard disks provide a SCSI command - "reassign" - to spare a bad sector. A low-level format also spares any bad sectors. On pre-SCSI disks, a lowlevel format was the only way to fix bad sectors.

Many modern disks, including many internal ATA, FireWire, and USB drives, automatically spare sectors with hard errors the next time the sector is written. That's helpful, but if data is stored on that sector, programs may be unable to read it successfully, causing problems and making it difficult to spare. Erasing the disk with Apple's Disk Utility spares any bad sectors if you select the "Zero all data" option. What about soft errors? In addition to the 512 bytes of data stored in each sector, a few additional bytes hold an error correction code (ECC). When the sector is written, the drive's controller computes and records the ECC. When the file system later reads that sector, it checks the ECC to make sure the data hasn't been corrupted. If the ECC doesn't match the data, it's called a soft error. The disk surface is fine, but the data on that sector has become scrambled. Soft errors can be caused if the disk is

Soft errors can be caused if the disk is jarred while it's writing or if power is lost while writing, either of which can leave a sector half written. Large mag-

nets (such as can be found in electric motors) next to hard disks also tend to have bad effects on the data. As with hard errors, most modern disks repair soft errors automatically the next time the sector is written.

\*\*Bad Sector Detector\*\* - Norton Disk Doctor, DiskGuardian and Drive 10 (but not DiskWarrior or Disk Utility) claim to detect bad sectors using a test called either a "defective media check" or a "surface scan." Using a proprietary tool that creates soft errors on disks, I tested each program. Although Norton Disk Doctor claims to be able to find and repair bad sectors, its defective media check didn't detect the bad sectors on my test disk, erroneously giving it gave a clean bill of health.

DiskGuardian detected the bad sectors, although it took several hours to run a full check. Unfortunately, it didn't tell me which files used the bad sectors, so I had no way of finding out which files were damaged and would thus need to be restored from backup. DiskGuardian lacks the capability to repair bad sectors.

Like DiskGuardian, Drive 10 detected the bad sectors, but didn't identify which files were damaged.

Confusingly, Drive 10's report describing the damage claimed it could fix the bad sectors, but I couldn't find a command to fix them. Micromat tech support confirmed the report was wrong; Drive 10 can't fix the bad sectors it finds. It's too bad, since Drive 10 could fix the bad sectors merely by writing zeros to them.

Although Disk Utility cannot scan for bad sectors, it can fix bad sectors on modern disks if you erase the disk with the "Zero all data" option selected.

I must rate all these products unacceptable in dealing with bad sectors. Even though two could detect bad sectors, none of them could tell you which files contain bad sectors, making it impossible to learn which files you should restore from your backup. Only Disk Utility successfully fixed the bad sectors, but at the price of erasing the entire disk.

\*\*Ripping the Yellow Pages\*\* - We've now looked at pure hardware failures, and bad sectors, which can be either hard errors or soft errors, and so far, our disk repair utilities don't help much at all. Now it's time to move on to problems that exist entirely in software, the most common type of which are errors in the directory, which tracks the files and folders on the disk. In the case of directory errors, there is nothing wrong with the drive mechanism or the disk surface; instead, the directory information that's necessary to locate your data on the disk has simply become scrambled. Often your data is intact, if it could just be located.

As an aside, people with important data sometimes use mirrored disks or RAID arrays, which faithfully duplicate each byte on the main disk to a backup disk. If the main disk suffers a hardware failure or develops a bad sector, the backup disk can save the day. However, it's worth noting that this strategy provides absolutely no protection against directory damage. That's because the RAID faithfully records all data to the backup disk, whether or not that data is good, which results in both the main disk and the backup disk containing corrupt data. I may sound like your mother telling you to eat your vegetables, but the best protection really is regular backups.

The most common cause of directory damage is crashing. If the computer crashes while a file is being created or saved, causing only part of the change to be written to disk, the directory will contain inconsistent information. Mac OS X crashes far less often than Mac OS 9, but directory-corrupting crashes can and do still occur. Both Mac OS 9 and Mac OS X automatically check and repair the startup disk after a crash, which reduces the incidence of disk damage dramatically. A new feature in Mac OS X 10.3 Panther that should reduce directory errors even more is the journalled file system. You can enable it in Disk Utility, and it's usually turned on for disks onto which you install Panther. Here's how journalling works. Before the file system changes the directory, it leaves a note on the disk saying, "I'm going to make this change in the directory." Then the file system makes the change, and once it finishes, it clears the note. If the file system ever sees an incomplete change note on the disk during startup, it knows something bad happened and "rolls back" the directory to its previous state. You will lose your last change, but the directory won't suffer any damage.

Other causes of damaged directories include buggy programs that write bad data to disk, buggy programs that overwrite cached data waiting to be written to disk, and even bugs in the file system itself. The first two are much less likely in Mac OS X than in Mac OS 9 because of its file privileges and memory protection, respectively. Bugs in the file system are extremely rare but have occurred at times in the past.

It's worth noting that directory damage is not always readily apparent. A damaged disk may appear to operate perfectly, but regular use can cause minor errors to grow into serious problems. Most directory problems are easy to fix if they're caught early but can be difficult, if not impossible, to fix later. That's why checking and repairing startup disks automatically after a crash is so important, and why it's essential to leave the Check Disk option turned on in Mac OS 9's General Controls control panel (the disk check isn't optional in Mac OS X).

To test how the disk repair utilities perform with different types of directory errors, I created an HFS+ disk image, copied an assortment of files and folders to it, and then used a low-level disk editor to damage various directory data structures. I then duplicated the damaged disk image, and let each utility try to repair its own copy. Each utility repaired an identical disk image, with identical damage.

\*\*Errors Speak Volumes\*\* -- For my first test, I started with relatively simple damage in the volume bit map, which is also known as the allocation file. The volume bit map tracks which blocks on the disk contain files, and which are unused. All five utilities fixed my damaged volume bit map easily.

Next up was damage to the volume header, which tracks vital information about the disk, such as the amount of used and free space, and the locations of the catalog and allocation file. The volume header is stored at the beginning of the HFS+ partition. I erased the volume header's signature, which makes the file system assume the volume header is corrupt and refuse to use the disk. Fortunately, the file system keeps a backup copy of the volume header at the end of the disk; it's imaginatively called the alternate volume header. All five of our utilities

successfully repaired the disk, although Drive 10 and DiskGuardian couldn't figure out the name of the damaged disk.

\*\*Catalog Catastrophe\*\* -- The catalog b-tree tracks all the files and folders on the disk. It's a vitally important part of the directory, and many of my tests focus on it. The catalog is divided into nodes, and each node is divided into records. Most records track a file or folder on the disk, although some contain threads or indexes, which are used internally by the file system to look up files and folders. The first node in the catalog is called the header node, which points to other key nodes. I erased the header node. Norton Disk Doctor, DiskWarrior, and Drive 10 recreated the header node properly; Disk Utility and DiskGuardian failed to fix it. Once again, Drive 10 couldn't figure out the name of the damaged disk. The header node also contains a map which tracks which nodes are used and which are free. I corrupted this map, but my corruption didn't faze any of the utilities, all of which successfully fixed the header node map. The nodes in the catalog are linked together in a precise pattern of connections. Horizontal links connect nodes on the same level, and downward links connect the levels. The file system relies on these links to look up files and folders. I damaged these links. As happened when I erased the catalog header node, Norton Disk Doctor, DiskWarrior, and Drive 10 fixed these links, but Disk Utility and DiskGuardian weren't able to put the links back together.

File and folder records are stored in alphabetical order in the catalog. I rearranged these records, putting them in random order. All the utilities restored the alphabetical order. Certain characters, such as a colon, are illegal in file and folder names. Normally, the operating system prevents you from typing an illegal character when saving a file or creating a folder, but it's not inconceivable that unusual circumstances could cause one to appear. I renamed a folder with a colon by inserting the colon directly into the folder record in the catalog. With this test, the results start to become more interesting. Disk Utility and DiskGuardian didn't detect any problem. Drive 10 noticed the illegal character, but didn't fix it. Norton

Disk Doctor and DiskWarrior both fixed it properly by replacing the colon with a legal character.

\*\*More Catalog Corruption\*\* -- Each catalog node ends with a map that points back to the records in that node. I damaged the map for one of the nodes, which sounds bad, but it's still possible to find the records by calculating the size of each record to find the next record. Disk Utility and Norton Disk Doctor realized there was a problem, but they couldn't fix it. Drive 10 and DiskGuardian both identified and fixed the problem, but in the process lost five and six files, respectively. Partial repair isn't always better than complete failure, since you may believe the disk was repaired successfully and only later - potentially much later - realize that some files have been lost. DiskWarrior fixed the catalog node map properly. Next, I changed a thread record to be an unknown type of record, which creates two problems. A thread record that the file system relied upon was missing, and it was confronted by a record with an illegal type. Disk Utility and DiskGuardian detected the corruption, but couldn't fix it. DiskWarrior fixed the problem but lost some of the data in one file. Only Drive 10 and Norton Disk Doctor managed to repair my damage proper-

Note that DiskWarrior moves any files it suspects may have problems into a folder called Rescued Items. In my tests, most of these files turned out to be fine. This approach has the advantage that it's clear which files may be damaged. But if the Rescued Items folder contains many files, checking them and putting them away can be tedious. Norton Disk Doctor can optionally put aliases to damaged files in a folder, a potentially more helpful feature. But in my tests it didn't work. Norton Disk Doctor also lists the names of damaged files in its report. The most important aspect of a file record is the location of the file's data on the disk. One of the worst sorts of directory damage that you may see happens when two files try to occupy the same physical space at the same time. Different utilities refer to this problem as "overlapping extents" or cross-linked files." In the best case, one file has entirely overwritten the other, since then one file has valid data, while the other's data is completely gone. In the worst case, the two files somehow manage to interleave their data, which results in both being damaged beyond repair. I crosslinked two files, thus damaging the files' catalog records, as well as the volume header and volume bit map. Disk Utility and DiskGuardian repaired the catalog records, the volume header, and the volume bit map, but they didn't actually separate the two files. In contrast, Drive 10, DiskWarrior and Norton Disk Doctor fixed the damage and separated the files. It's important to realize that the data in the overwritten file couldn't be recovered, but not through any failing of these repair programs. When one file overwrites another, the unlucky file has no chance of surviving the encounter.

\*\*I See Fragged People\*\* -- Some

months ago, I wrote an article for

TidBITS explaining why defragment-

ing disks generally isn't worthwhile

(see "Optimizing Disks Is a Waste of

Time" in TidBITS-686\_). Although fragmentation is totally normal and acceptable, serious fragmentation requires additional directory structures, and they too can become corrupted and require repair. <a href="http://db.tidbits.com/getbits.acgi?tba">http://db.tidbits.com/getbits.acgi?tba</a> rt=07254> Using another proprietary tool, I fragmented a disk very badly, which breaks files into so many pieces that the file record in the catalog b-tree can't track them all. The file system responds by creating new records in the extents b-tree to help track all the pieces. The extents b-tree is like the catalog b-tree, but exists solely to help track highly fragmented files. Again, severe fragmentation is not inherently a problem, but I had put the disk into a precarious, if legal, state. I then damaged two extent records so the file system couldn't find all the pieces to two files, but I damaged each in a different way. Disk Utility, DiskGuardian, and Drive 10 all detected my damaged extent records, but weren't able to repair the damage. DiskWarrior and Norton Disk Doctor performed better, fixing the problem but losing part of the data in one file. Considering the type of damage I inflicted, they did as well as could be expected.

HFS+ volumes are enclosed in a "wrapper," which is actually a plain old HFS volume. The reason for the

wrapper is historical. Apple first released HFS+ with Mac OS 8.1. If you connected an HFS+-formatted disk to a Mac running Mac OS 8.0 or earlier in other words, one that understood only the older HFS format, the wrapper kept the older system from deciding the HFS+ disk was damaged and offering to initialize it. For my next test, I damaged the catalog b-tree header node in the wrapper. Disk Utility and DiskGuardian didn't notice anything wrong. Drive 10 and DiskWarrior detected the corrupt wrapper, but didn't fix it. Norton Disk Doctor identified the damage and fixed it properly.

Disks can contain multiple partitions, which are listed in a partition map at the beginning of the disk. Since disk images don't have partition maps, I used an external FireWire hard disk for this test, in which I damaged the partition map, making the disk driver's partition overlap the HFS partition. Of all these disk repair utilities, only Norton Disk Doctor claims to check partition maps, and indeed it was the only one to detect the problem, although even it proved incapable of fixing the overlapping partition map. Luckily, damaged partition maps are extremely rare, which may be why none of the other utilities bother to check them.

\*\*The Grand Finale\*\* -- Finally, I decided to recreate the worst damage I've ever seen on a Macintosh hard disk. Starting with the badly fragmented disk above, I corrupted and overwrote various parts of the catalog and extent b-trees. In some nodes I corrupted the node header (not to be confused with the header node), in some I munged the data records, and in others I zapped the record offset map. A few lucky nodes suffered all three types of damage at the hands of my disk editor. Only DiskWarrior was able to bring the disk back to a usable state, although 35 files were either lost or partly damaged. That 35 files were lost or damaged is not an indictment of DiskWarrior; the program couldn't have done any better, considering how much vital information had been destroyed. None of the other utilities managed to repair the disk successfully.

\*\*And the Winner Is...\*\* Of my 15 tests, DiskWarrior fixed 12 successfully, Norton Disk Doctor fixed 11, Drive

10 fixed 9, DiskGuardian fixed 5, and Disk Utility fixed 4. "Fixed" includes cases where recovery may not have been perfect, but was good enough. So what, in my professional opinion, should you do if your disk starts acting up? First, try Apple's free Disk Utility. It may fix only a limited set of problems, but when Disk Utility finds a problem, it's invariably correct, and it applies fixes only when it's absolutely certain it knows the correct fix. I've never seen Disk Utility accidentally make a problem worse, something the other utilities can do, even if only very occasionally. If Disk Utility doesn't succeed, let DiskWarrior do battle with your damner, and it deserves its excellent reputation. DiskWarrior can also show you a preview of the repairs before you accept them, which lets you check that a damaged file or folder really was fixed before DiskWarrior makes the fix permanent.

If DiskWarrior fails, give Norton Disk Doctor a try, since it can address some problems that DiskWarrior misses. After that, try sacrificing chickens. Seriously, if the combination of Disk Utility, DiskWarrior, and Norton Disk Doctor can't repair your disk, you can either restore your data from backup, or, if that's not possible, decide if the data is sufficiently important to pay DriveSavers for recovery.

I still think the most important data

protection utility you should own is a backup program. But sometimes a good disk repair program can save the day by repairing minor damage quickly so you don't have to run through the time-consuming process of reinitializing your hard disk and restoring from backup.

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
