Security is an extra-hot topic these days, as all sorts of government agencies short on letters but long on budgets keep getting accused of spying on their own citizens, and debates rage on whether what look like accidental bugs may actually turn out to be quite intentional.

A larger iPhone 6 could bring Apple challenges for general usability If the rumor mill is to be given any credence, Apple will be releasing an iPhone with a larger display, possibly between 4.5 and 4.8inches, along with a larger 5.5-inch or 6-inch 'phablet' later this year. Although Apple has been content to run its own race historically, the rise in popularity of large Android smartphones, and the expectations of Wall Street, almost demands that Apple offers an iPhone that appeals to users who prefer larger displays. In fact, it would be more of surprise come the unveiling of the 'iPhone 6' if Apple were to release only another 4-inch device. Until now, Apple's seeming

reluctance to embrace a larger iPhone has revolved around one-handed usability and what it considers to be unacceptable tradeoffs that compromise the user experience.  How One Scammer Manipulated Apple's Top Charts to Earn Tens of Thousands Daily Using a \$10 GameSalad Template by Sarah Perez

Something fishy has been going on with Apple's App Store top charts. No, I'm not talking about "Flappy Bird" (well, maybe that too), but rather how on earth two different developers used a \$10 GameSalad template to send their respective apps — one free, and one paid — into the App Store's top charts. And more importantly, how did that paid app keep climbing the charts, earning a developer who's clearly a well-known scammer, a lot of money? Industry insiders noticed this was happening earlier this month, though word

has spread further as the apps climbed higher and higher in the charts.

 Apple touts secure design of iOS as Google chief admits Android is best target for malicious hackers by Daniel Eran Dilger

Speaking at Mobile World Conference, Google's new Android chief Sundar Pichai admitted that security plays second fiddle to "freedom" in the design and implementation of Google's mobile operation system, exposing Android users to an overwhelming, disproportionate share of malware vulnerabilities.

Last month, a report by Cisco detailed that 99 percent of mobile malware targets Android, echoing the "staggering rate" of malware growth observed last summer by Juniper Networks in a report that noted that "77 percent of Android's threats could be largely eliminated today if all Android devices had the latest OS. Currently only 4 percent do."

When asked about Android's malware problems, Pichai (the Chrome OS executive who replaced Andy Rubin as the head of Google's Android development early last year) answered by saying that Android is not really "designed to be safe" but rather to provide "freedom.".

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March Mini'app'les Meeting

This month we looked at the new versions of Pages, Keynote, and Numbers. A few things about the new versions of Pages:

- Apple refers to the new versions with their version number, so Pages 5, instead of using the year.
- The new version uses a new format that is not compatible with older versions. Despite this incompatibility, the new format still uses .pages as the extension for documents. If you need to open a document in an older version, you can export it to the '09 file format.
- Using the sidebar to rearrange pages does not work in versions before 5.2. The 5.2 update was made available on April 1.
- The toolbar is customizable after an early update.
- The Inspector has been made into the Format and Document right side bar.
- There is no longer the option of choosing a word processing or page layout document.
 The feature is under the Document side bar, as the Document Body option. When unchecking the option, it will delete all text that is not in a text box.
- The save option can also be found in the title bar of the document. It also allows for adding tags to the document and moving it to iCloud.
- Exporting to a RTF document has been removed, but exporting a document to Word and changing the extension to .rtf is an easy workaround.
- The update made available on April 1 fixed or added back a number of features that we discussed as missing or broken. This is also true of the updates for Numbers and Keynote.

January Mini'app'les Meeting

At the January Mini'app'les we looked at some essential apps for the Mac and iOS devices. Some of the Mac apps we talked about were some of the basic office apps like iWork and Office and some alternatives like Byword. There were a variety of to do apps like Things, OmniFocus, and Clear, each has its strengths depending on what you want. The built-in Reminders was also demonstrated. It was pointed out that since Reminders is part of the system, it ties in very well across the entire OS

from using Siri to create a to-do item to having items show up in the built-in calendar. 1Password or LastPass was given as an essential for online security and password management. Day One was shown as a good journaling app and ReadKit, a RSS reader, is used by a number of members as a news source. For multimedia apps, VLC is a good addition for video files because it will play more formats than QuickTime. Handbrake was the popular choice for converting DVDs to movie files. And Dropbox was mentioned as a essential file storing and sharing service.

One app that was mentioned for number of purposes was Evernote. Evernote, with a free or paid subscription, can be a place to save notes, webpages, and to-dos. It can save PDFs and JPGs with a free subscription and a broad range of other files with a premium subscription. And best of all, is Evernote can be synced across multiple devices and computers allowing you easy access all things you want to remember. For utilities, TinkerTool is an app that allows for more customization and preference settings of OS X without going into the Terminal. Carbon Copy Cloner and SuperDuper were given as essential backup tools.

A laptop essential app is Sidekick for those who move from location to location and need different system settings for each location. Sidekick will detect the available wireless networks, connect to the predefined network, and automatically change settings based the location. Settings such as network settings, volume level, default printers, Bluetooth, and screen brightness, to name a few, can be changed.

For the iOS, many of the Mac apps have iOS counterparts, such as Evernote, Day One, iWork, Things, OmniFocus, and 1Password. Notability is essential app for freehand note taking, annotating documents and images and

sketching. Notability is a universal app and notes can be synced across devices. Documents by Readdle is a good jack of all trades document reader being able to handle PDFs, Office docs, images, and media files. And best of all, it's free.

We also reminded everyone of the details of the upcoming annual meeting.

Jeff Berg presented Editorial, \$4.99 iPad only, which is a plain text editor for the iPad with powerful automation tools and a beautiful inline preview for writing Markdown. You can combine a large selection of simple text processing actions into your very own workflows — all in an intuitive drag-n-drop interface that makes it easy to see what's happening.

Scriptable: Blockquote with citation script example: With the built-in browser, you can select text and paste it into the working document with a block quote markdown and with the URL and page title

Features:

Inline Markdown Preview – You can always swipe left to switch to a full HTML preview. Extensible with Workflows – Almost 50 configurable actions can be combined into powerful workflows for extending Editorial's feature set.

Scriptable with Python – You can also integrate scripts into your workflows for even more advanced automation.

Full Documentation – Editorial comes with a complete set of documentation for all the different workflow actions and Python modules. Help is directly accessible from the workflow and Python editors.

Sync with Dropbox – You can store your documents in a configurable Dropbox folder, and even view comparisons with older versions to see the progress you've made.

Password Generator: A single click gives you a random, incredibly strong new password you can save for a new account or paste into apps like iTunes and Skype. Generated password are automatically saved in 1Password. The Password Recipe allows you to generate long passwords with whatever requirements you need.

Demo Vault: Create a demo vault for showing someone how to use 1Password

Syncing: You can use Apple's iCloud to sync your 1Password data between Mac, iPhone, and iPad for 1Password purchased from the App Store. Syncing with Dropbox is available. Sync between a wide variety of devices and platforms with your Dropbox account. WiFi syncing is added back in. Sync Mac, iPhone, and iPad locally. Your data never leaves your network.

Security Audit: 1Password can show all your items with weak, duplicate, and old passwords so you can decide which ones to fortify and

update. The Security Audit gives a quick look at the strength of each Login password on-the-fly, then update them as you see fit. It also shows duplicate passwords. Nothing puts you at bigger risk than re-used passwords. Quickly find duplicate passwords and replace them with strong, unique ones.
