
Presidential Peelings






Hello Again,

With the paucity of Apple publications, We should support the ones that are still in print. One such was reviewed by APPLEUGENE and since I agree with the editor and don't think that I can express it better. I hope he doesn't mind because I am copying his review.

Computist 13 an Apple information-exchange newsletter. It has no paid staff members. Instead, the magazine publishes submissions from it's subscribers, and the main topic is copy deprotection. The quality of the submitted letters is variable as you might expect, and the greatest emphasis is deprotecting games. Computist recently experienced some financial difficulties which lead them to reduce the number of issues to 8/year, with a reduction in the subscription price to \$24. The quality of the magazine has improved consistently over the years, however, in terms of both content and format, and the long term prospects for the magazine seem good. Computist is currenty setting up a Computist Bulletin Board in order to allow communications via electronic between subscribers. For those who want to be able to back up their software, this magazine may be worth a look. Write: Computist, POB 110846-H, Tacoma, WA 98411.
