
Meetings-Regular Membership

TEACHER'S COLUMN

I thought for awhile I wouldn't have anything new to share about computer education at Pratum. The initial excitement of having a new IIGS in the school wore off and "volunteer" learning ended. Assignments were allowed to slide and the amount of in-depth problem solving being done just wasn't there anymore. Remember those students staying after school to play with Logo? This time I am able to sit down at the school computer to write this. Such are the problems of teaching. But, after some adjustments I made with the students, they are once again doing some work I am pleased about.


The adjustments I made were: (1) you must be current with your work or you don't play in the next basketball game, and (2) remember, report cards are going home soon. Then I assigned a lot of work.

Report cards went home yesterday and we played a basketball game today, short only a few players.

All my students have completed enough typing lessons that my best can move around the keyboard at around 27 words per minute. So, we pulled out Newsroom and published our first newspaper of the school year. Two students were assigned the task of learning how to use the program. Everyone wrote articles, but only the fastest typists entered the information into Newsroom. When it came time to do "layout," our success was minimal. The graphics they tried to import into the layout didn't transfer. Newsroom also has a cumbersome method of laying out text. There

are a series of 3 or 4 blocks on each side of a page to be filled with text. If your article is more than that block, it fills up a portion of the next block. If the article is short, the rest of the block stays empty. We ended up actually cutting and pasting the articles by hand to get the look we wanted. I'm sure we can do better next time, I hope.

Logo skills have jumped lately. Students have come from using the repeat command to get an interesting graphic, to writing short programs called procedures, and combining those





procedures to draw graphics. They have mastered using color commands in their procedures and also text commands. It is fun watching their program run and see each part of the graphic draw itself onto the monitor screen. When someone learns a new Logo command, they share it around and help each other work the bugs out of their programs. I am afraid they have surpassed me once again with their Logo skills. I'll share some of their graphic programs with you and hope you enjoy their effort.

The Fred Meyer receipt campaign lasts into March, the 17th I believe. Keep collecting. This is a great opportunity for schools to get computer equipment that they wouldn't get otherwise.


