Exploring HyperStudio

The exciting 2nd version of HyperStudio gives everyone a chance to explore a certain subject area. It gives a teacher the opportunity to create a personal lesson plan, as simple or as complex as desired. It is very easy to use. HyperStudio allows a person to create a customized program using graphics, animation, sound, and text without writing a line of programming code.

HyperStudio is made up of stacks (a stack is a program within HyperStudio composed of a sequence of screens called cards). The first card in the stack welcomes the user to this new program. There are three buttons on this card. The 1st button brings up the "Help" screen. The 2nd button is an invisible button on a picture of a small house, which returns the user to the "Home Card." The 3rd button, a left and right arrow, moves the user to the next card or back to the previous card.

All the common painting tools are included in HyperStudio, but a person can also import graphics from many popular 6S paint programs, as well as sequences from animation programs. Sound effects from third-party digitizers can be imported or simply use the sound digitizer available in the HyperStudio application. A scrollable text window makes much more room for large amounts of data, a great improvement over earlier versions. It also gives it more of a professional appearance.

A new option called Preferences gives the user a Lock Stack feature. After entering a password, the stack can be unlocked only by typing the exact case-sensitive code back into the password area. There's also an option that permits you to hide the tool menus so the user does not have access to them. By activating both "Hide Items" and "Lock", you can make your stack safe.

Here are a few ideas for HyperStudio stacks. 1) You can create a family tree with pictures and voices of family members. 2) You can draw a picture of your garden and so design your stack that when the user selects an area of your garden he or she receives an explanation of the variety of plants growing there. 3) Create your own phone book. 4) Rolodex-type address list. 5) Recipe List. 6) Coin Collection with graphics of each coin with explanations and grading. 7) Locate particular books in a school library. 8) Help customers find proper aisles for numerous items in a supermarket.

Custom programs can be created that are easy to design and even simpler to use. What exciting new technology!
