Teachers' Column By Kirk Gamble and Darrell Robertson



Darrell has kept the teachers' column going for the past three issues of the WAC Journal. I thank him for all that writing while I got settled into a new teaching job at Gervais Elementary.

Gervais is the largest school I have ever taught in. Yet, it is still considered small with only about 350 students in grades K-8. About half the students are Hispanic and one-fourth Russian. I have found this teaching situation to be quite unique from other jobs I have had.

I'm looking forward to sharing with you information concerning computer education at Gervais Elementary. The biggest computer happening for me since I started teaching on the 7th-8th grade team at Gervais is keeping my grades on the computer. I started with a program called Gradebook. It is a simple program that is easy to learn and able to move around in quickly. After using it for a report period, I decided I wanted to be able to manipulate the program more. I couldn't do it with Gradebook so I switched to Projac's Comput-a-Grade.

I am using the elementary version and right away I liked the way I could enter a class list once, then transfer that same list to another subject area without retyping all the names again. When it came time to enter grades, I liked the way I could enter 90 grades per subject instead of only 30. I was also able to enter late grades by student or by assignment. course, what makes any grade program a time saver is not recording grades but in computing averages and printing reports. There are other advantages such as printing the entire assignment information so a student has not only a copy of missing assignments but what those assignments are. Each student has a random ID number so I can post reports without posting the students' names.

Two things I liked about Gradebook that I lose on Comput-a-grade are 1) the report to the parent was more complete and 2) using EX for an excused assignment instead of NG for no grade. I prefer EX to convey excused rather than NG.

Next issue I will give you a better idea what computer education means at Gervais. Each school is different and all seem to move forward accordingly.
