s you can probably tell from looking at the cover and table of contents, this month's A + is dif-**L** ferent. A lot of you write in or call us to request our recommendations about software for your Apple II computer. To let you know what we deem the best software programs for the Apple II series, we have created this special A + All-Stars issue.

Many of you may have heard the claim that thousands of programs are

> available for the Apple II series of computers. I have heard estimates go as high as ten thousand software programs, which would make it the

largest body of software for any computer. This figure is a bit misleading, however. Keep in mind that the 11year-old Apple II was the original personal computer and had a five-year head start on the IBM Personal Computer series.

A lot of the software for the Apple II series consists of Applesoft BASIC programs designed for the Apple II Plus and IIe many years ago; these programs are not up to the level of quality that people have come to expect today. I estimate that out of the ten thousand commercial programs ever created for the Apple II, only about two thousand, or 20%, are really any good by today's standards. In order to further narrow down the field, we decided to sort through the thousands of programs out there to determine which programs were not just OK, or even just good, but were so good that you couldn't go wrong with them.

The A + All-Stars represent 96 programs that our panel of writers and editors has determined to be the best of

their breed in each of the ten major categories of Apple II software: word processing, graphics, education, telecommunications, business accounting, music, disk utilities, databases, personal finance, and entertainment. Although there are other worthwhile types of software, these are the software areas that-judging from your letters and calls-you're most interested in.

Because of the tremendous amount of Apple II software we had to sort through and review for this special issue, we assembled a blue-ribbon panel of editors and software reviewers to

planning, and teamwork that went into producing this special issue.

Of the 96 All-Stars, only 11 were for the Apple IIGs, which goes to show that most of the best programs are still for the IIe and IIc computers. Here is a breakdown of how many All-Stars we selected in each of the ten categories: word processing had 11 All-Stars; graphics had 10, education had 18, telecommunications had 7, business accounting had 4, music had 11, disk utilities had 7, databases had 5, personal finance had 3, and entertainment had 21. (These add up to 97, and not 96, because Apple-Works appears twice.) We didn't set any quotas for the number of All-Stars in any category; the reviewers were simply told to identify the programs in their category that they felt were of superior quality. The comparatively large number of All-Stars in the education and entertainment categories attests to the importance and popularity of these software categories in the Apple II market. The relatively few All-Stars in the database, accounting, and personal-finance categories are probably attributable to the dominance of AppleWorks.



ACTIVISION AND COPY PROTECTION

Dear A+: I recently had the misfortune to use two of Activision's programs, Paintworks Plus and The Music Studio. Perhaps I should say "try to use"—the programs' copy protection prevents them from working on non-Apple drives.

My 3.5-inch drive, which I bought via Central Point Software, works perfectly with non-copy-protected software. When I tried both of the Activision disks on another IIGs, they worked fine with Apple's Uni-Disk 3.5 drives but not with my drives. Activision's software crashes shortly before the program turns control over to you.

Incidentally, the software refuses to run on any drive if an old Disk II controller card or mouse card is present.

I do not put my 3.5inch drive at fault. I feel that Activision is at fault for using a form of copy protection that prevents its software from working. It is not alone in this respect-Electronic Arts' DeluxePaint II has the same problem and sometimes doesn't work even on pedigreed Apple 3.5 drives. The company is courteous enough to offer an unprotected version that runs on any configuration—after you mail in \$20 and wait 4-6 weeks.

Is it fair to charge extra for the high crime of using non-Apple drives? Although these companies' warranties and licenses deny any responsibility to the consumer, I feel the firms are morally responsible to provide a working version of their software to any purchaser—at the standard price.

I have never liked copy protection, but this makes me sick.

SHANGHAI DEFENSE

Dear A + : The letter to the editor by Mr. Jones (A +, October 1987) commenting unfavorably on Shanghai and your review of that game is, I believe, an overstatement of an unfortunate situation. To me and my family, Shanghai is an excellent game, well worth the price.

Although I have had some problems with it—e.g., lines left on the screen after tiles have been removed, program/keyboard freeze, and the like—they occurred after I'd tried to save a game several times, restart, recall a saved game five or

six times, or "bounce" be-

six times, or "bounce" between different modes of the game. I attribute these problems to growing pains we must learn to accept with a new computer such as the IIGs. When I just play Shanghai in normal modes, I have no difficulties.

There is one problem Mr. Jones did not mention. When you "win," your reward should be a fire-breathing dragon on your screen. You won't get it unless you "prefix" the volume by selecting Open from the File menu and then Cancel, which returns you to the game on the screen. My phone call to Activision afforded this solution and prompted the remark, "We do not know why Shanghai does not automatically go into animation when you win a game."

Like Mr. Jones, I find Activision unresponsive to letters—in my case, five in the past five months—but the company's personnel are helpful on the phone. The bottom line remains: Shanghai is great; A + is great. Keep charging!


Dear A+: I am pretty mad at the software developers that are currently writing programs for the Apple IIcs. I think it is very unfair that software such as Graphic-Writer, Multiscribe, Music Construction Set, and others do not include print options for Epson or other types of printers.

Why are these programs set up for printing only on an Image-Writer or LaserWriter? I have an Epson FX80, and I don't want to buy a new printer. The software developers could increase their market by including these printers.

One of the last GS tool sets Apple completed and released was the Print Manager (May 1987), and many new GS applications that needed it shipped just after this date. Apple has now released documents showing developers how to write GS printer drivers and will even license the source code to the ImageWriter driver for study purposes. As a result, we're likely to see printer drivers for other popular printers from third parties soon.

When you do get a new driver, by the way, install it by putting it into the SYSTEM/DRIVERS/ subdirectory of your ProDOS 16 boot disk. When the time comes to print from a desktop application, select Choose Printer (usually in the File menu) and choose the appropriate driver.

ON BALANCE AMPLIFICATION

Dear A +: I just finished reading your September issue and feel I must write about the review of Brøderbund's On Balance. Your review had some incorrect and incomplete information that needs to be corrected.

The original version was copyprotected, but no longer. I recently bought On Balance and ended up with this version. On the first day of use, I somehow managed to damage the program disk. I mailed my disk and proof of purchase to Brøderbund and received both the 5¼- and 3.5-inch un-copy-protected versions in just two weeks. Considering that I'm overseas, this customer support is incredibly fast.

You can save data to either disk format, but On Balance is memoryintensive, so using a 3.5-inch disk drive does not increase the data limits of the program. You can initially set up 200 accounts, 23 account groups, and up to 850 transactions per month. The more accounts you add, the less room there is for transactions or viceversa. Using excessive account memos greatly decreases the number of accounts and transactions that the program can handle. In my setup, I have more than 90 accounts and 14 groups and can add nearly 700 transactions every

month, so I do not see anyone running out of memory before the end of each month.

On Balance can work with a mouse and run on an Apple IIGs. The mouse is not sensitive enough for my liking, but with the openapple commands available, moving through the program is quick and easy.

I do not care for programs that fail to work with ProDOS, a harddisk drive, or a RAMdisk, but On Balance is an exception. This program has room for improvement for just those reasons, but after attempting to use three other personal-finance programs, I have concluded that On Balance's speed and ease of use make On Balance a clear winner that I will be using for a long time to come.



MORE MULTICOLUMN-PRINTING THOUGHTS

Dear A +: I agree completely with Mark Shields (A +, September)1987, page 106) that his method of creating multicolumn text layout with AppleWorks is superior in efficiency and flexibility to the one Charles Rubin described (A + Iulv)1987, pages 75-79). I would merely add that you can apply Shields' method with any good word-processing program capable of controlling page layout and printout page by page.

During the '86-'87 school year, I edited a small faculty newsletter. I started out with my usual wordprocessing program, Word Juggler, which allows direct and thorough control of the printer through a combination of easy internal commands and escape sequences. Essentially, you can do any text manipulation the printer can do (I use

an ImageWriter II) in multicolumn format, such as proportional spacing in the NLQ mode, wide lettering for headlines, full justification-even color-and do it conveniently by treating each column as a separate page, the heart of Shields' method.

But this level of control provides no graphics, and Word Juggler's

Multiscribe adds multiple fonts, font editing, and importation of graphics.

Preview function, although good for standard text, gives little idea on the screen of enhancements such as proportional spacing. For later issues of the newsletter, I created files with Word Juggler and then moved them to Multiscribe, where I used the font editor to create a masthead and gained access to a greater variety of fonts for headlines. Again I used Shields' method, printing each column separately. I discovered, however, an improvement on my earlier procedure. Instead of using tractor-feed paper, which tends to misalign when you roll it backward to the top of the page, it is best to use single sheets. Still, you have to be very careful about aligning the paper in the printer exactly the same way for the second column as for the first.

Also, with the ImageWriter II, if the printhead is not forced to realign (there are several ways to do this), the first line of text in the second column will be skewed. Since Multiscribe uses a graphics screen, it can display proportional spacing, although not center, full, or right justification. Other programs, including Multiscribe GS, now sport enhanced graphics-handling capabilities such as importing doublehi-res drawings, and some can incorporate AppleWorks text files. GraphicWriter handles both columns and graphics directly, is a full WYSIWYG program, and sells for half the price of AppleWorks.

Passing the paper through the printer twice, as Shields recommends, makes AppleWorks more

WE'VE FOUND THE FINDER

The long-awaited Finder for the Apple IIGs is finally here! For those who are not familiar with the Macintosh program of the same name, the Finder is a startup program that lets you select pro-

form various disk- and file-maintenance chores, such as copying and renaming. It uses the familiar menu/window desk-top interface the Macintosh popularized. One flashy feature of the GS Finder is the ability to set the color of any icon (an icon represents a file or subdirectory). By carefully color-coding icons, you can spot important files quickly.

The DeskTop program that Apple shipped with the GS beginning in September 1986 is quite similar to the Finder. A major difference, however, is that the Finder is a ProDOS 16 application, so it runs only on the GS.

the Finder unless you buy a GS memory-expansion card, however—it requires at least 512K of RAM. When you boot the system disk on a minimal 256K system, the system bypasses the Finder and displays a simple program-launcher dialog box instead.

If you purchased your GS before the Finder was available, you can get it for free by asking an au-






APPLEFEST REPORT

The revival of AppleFest. was a success! Apple-Fest—an Apple II exhibition that disappeared from the scene four years ago-came back as a three-day show in mid-September in San Francisco, drawing approximately 20,000 attendees. More than 100 exhibitors showed off products for the entire II family. Not bad for a supposedly aging technology. The next AppleFest will take place May 20-22 in Boston. According to the show's promoters, most of the exhibit space for that show is already sold out.

The product highlights from September's Apple-Fest generally fell into the categories of enhancement hardware and graphics/desktop-publishing software. Here are a few of the highlights (much of this stuff is vaporware as we go to press but might be available by the time you read this).

Perhaps the most exciting hardware announcement was the Zip Chip accelerator from Zip Technology. The Zip Chip (\$129 introductory price) is a replacement for the 6502 (or 65C02) microprocessor of the II, II Plus, IIe, and IIc. (A similar replacement for the







65816 on the GS was announced but is not expected to be available for quite a while. Meanwhile, MDIdeas was showing a very early prototype of a card-style GS accelerator.) With the Zip Chip installed, you can run all your software about four times faster than before. The chip works its magic by using an 8K memory cache stored on the same silicon wafer as the microprocessor component of the chip. The advantages of using it instead of a traditional card-based accelerator such as the Applied **Engineering TransWarp**





are clear: No slot is required, and the chip consumes much less power than a card does. Ironically, a prototype version of a similar chip, called the RocketChip, was being shown privately at the show by Bits and Pieces Technology. Two models are planned: a 4-MHz version and a 6-MHz version (for a four- or sixfold speed increase).


Another breakthrough product was the first internal 2400-bps modem ever available for the Apple II.

The product is called the Epic and is made by Epic Technology. The card is equivalent to the standard Super Serial Card/Hayes Smartmodem combination, so it should work with existing communications programs without modification. The modem card has been expertly engineered and is smaller than most 1200- or 300-bps modems that we have seen. The best feature, however, is the price: only \$175! An external version of the card is also available for \$189.

AppleFest attracted all types of Apple II users and gave them an opportunity to try out a host of new products. In the A+/Ziff-Davis Publishing booth, they got to see the prizes awarded to the winners of our "How I Use the II to Teach" contest. And industry insiders got a chance to loosen up at the A+ party.







The other interesting hardware products at AppleFest were for the IIGs. There were two new advanced sound digitizers, FutureSound (\$279) from Applied Visions (we caught it playing a great version of the "Jetsons" theme song) and Digitizer Professional (\$149.95) from MDIdeas.

And Digital Vision, Inc. showed the Apple IIGS version of its popular ComputerEyes, a \$249 color/monochrome video digitizer.



Two new, interesting memory cards for the IIGS were also available. The MemorySaver from Checkmate Technology (\$149.95) is not actually a memory card; it is a holder for your existing IIGs memory card that is able to power the card from a transformer and/ or battery. As a result, you don't lose the contents of a RAMdisk even if you turn off the IIGs. You can also connect two RAM cards (such as Apple's or Applied Engineering's) to MemorySaver-convenient if your GS memory card has no memoryexpansion option and you need more memory.



The memory card, Mega-RAM from Parallax, is a one-megabyte card that costs only \$189.95. You can use it with an EPROM expansion card with a capacity of 896K (\$89.95 unpopulated); you can configure the memory on the expansion card as a ROMdisk and boot it when you turn the GS on.

- On the software front, Brøderbund Software announced Show Off, a \$59.95 presentation-graphics program, and released the IIGs version of The Print Shop, also \$59.95.
- WordPerfect
 Corporation showed its
 professional wordprocessing program for
 the GS (also called

WordPerfect and priced at \$179) and said the release date had been moved back from September to November.

- Softsync demonstrated its \$59.95
 Personal Newsletter desktop-publishing program, which runs on an Apple IIe (enhanced), IIc, or IIGS.
- TimeWorks showed off its impressive desktop publisher, Publish It (\$99.95). It works on the same machines as Softsync's product does but requires a mouse or a joystick.
- Milliken Publishing Company introduced Medley (\$195), an extremely sophisticated desktop-publishing program for the IIGS (requiring a megabyte of RAM) that appears to be a few months from completion.
- Although this software wasn't really announced at the show, word about a possible IIGs version of the new Macintosh product HyperCard began circulating on the eve of AppleFest. Bill Atkinson, author of HyperCard and MacPaint, let it slip on The Computer Show, a nationally syndicated talk show, that a GS version of HyperCard is in the works.

SOME SERIOUS ENTERTAINMENT

Entertainment-software sales aren't doing too shabbily, thank you very much. This bit of news comes from a couple different quarters. The Software Publishers Association, for instance, tracks software sales in 15 different categories and found that recreational software currently ranks fourth in sales—behind word-processing pro-

grams, database-management programs, and spreadsheet programs. The SPA survey, which included 42 producers of recreational software, found that Apple II entertainment software sales rose 90% year to year. This increase isn't quite as dramatic as the 98% jump IBM entertainment software enjoyed, but it's nothing to sneeze at, nonetheless.

Activision, Inc., would probably agree. Activision, a leader in the IIGS software market, recently




announced its first quarterly profit in four years. The fiscal improvement follows on the heels of a major management shake-up that took place last January when company founder James Levy left the company and Bruce Davis became Activision's president. At the end of June, the company said it had earned \$524,474 on sales of \$8.7 million—a vast improvement over the loss of \$1.9 million on sales of \$4.6 million in the company's year-earlier period.





COPY **PROTECTION** REMOVED

In a surprise move last September, Activision, a longtime Apple II software publisher, announced the removal of copy protection from its entire line of "productivity" and "creativity" software. Activision's line of entertainment programs remains protected, how-

The list of deprotected

software includes three recent titles for the Apple IIGs: Paintworks Plus. Draw Plus, and Writer's Choice elite. Activision's protection scheme for these programs involved checking for the presence of an original key disk during start-up, but this scheme proved annoying to hard-disk users. Reports also surfaced that the copy-protection scheme did not work properly with Central Point Software's 3.5-inch drives or Apple's own UniDisk 3.5.



Activision probably made its decision for two reasons: to reduce the technical-support burden that goes with any form of copy protection and to compete more effectively with similar, unprotected, products (notably

StyleWare's Multiscribe

Activision mailed notices in early October to all registered users of affected software, giving them the opportunity to upgrade to the new unprotected versions for \$10 per title. If you didn't send in your registration card, you can still participate by sending \$10 to Activision along with your purchase receipt, the front cover of the manual, or a cutout of the product number on the back cover.



GS BASIC RELEASED

Apple has released a version of the BASIC programming language specifically for the Apple IIGs. It's called GS BASIC and, like Applesoft, it is an interpreted BASIC, meaning you don't have to compile source code before running a program-you simply load a source program file from disk and run it. As a result, you can create and debug programs more quickly than you can with a compiled BASIC.

The GS BASIC interpreter is a ProDOS 16 program, and the programs you create with it can take advantage of the entire GS memory space. (Applesoft programs are limited to a paltry 48K space.) It has symbolic interfaces to the functions in the GS toolbox ROM, so you can call them with the same names assembly-language, Pascal, and C programmers use.

The chief programmer for GS BASIC was John Arkley, one of Apple's earliest employees, who is no stranger to BASIC. In 1979 John worked on a version of Apple II BA-SIC dubbed BASIC 3, which was essentially a disk version of Applesoft. He was responsible for the PRINT USING module, which programmers use to simplify the formatting of output to

the screen or printer. For one reason or another, BASIC 3 never saw the light of day. It did, however, form the foundation for Business BASIC for the Apple III.

Several months before the public announcement of the IIGS, Apple decided to dust off Business BASIC and convert it into what is now GS BA-SIC. Arkley ended up doing more than a simple conversion-he completely rewrote Business BASIC. His effort included redesigning all number-crunching subroutines to work with the SANE (floating-point) and Integer Math tool sets built into the GS.

One module that Arkley didn't change very much was his coveted PRINT USING command. Still robust after all these years!

\$150 MILLION FOR SCHOOLS

What could U.S. schools do with \$150 million for computer education? They could buy products, train teachers, and share information about computers in the curriculum. At least those are the goals behind the Computer Education Assistance Act, a piece of legislation that was introduced last March by Senator Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ).

As this issue of A + was going to press, the Senate had just come back from its late-summer recess, and Lautenberg's bill (S. 838) was going on to the committee level, having just gone through the publichearing stage.

If this bill successfully wends its way through the legislative process, it will provide schools with that \$150 million to assist them in acquiring hardware and software, to fund teacher-training institutes through the National Science Foundation, and to disseminate advice about how to integrate computers into the curriculum. If you are interested in finding out more about the Computer Education Assistance Act, you should contact your senator in Washington, D.C. The number for the Capitol switchboard is (202) 224-3121.

In an article about **Direct Memory Access** (DMA) in the September issue of A +, we indicated that Orange Micro's RamPak 4GS memory-expansion card must be fully populated to four megabytes before it can work with DMA devices such as the AST VisionPlus video digitizer. Actually, the amount of memory installed has no bearing on its performance. As indicated in the article. RamPak 4Gs works perfectly when you're digitizing images in black and white. It does not work with AST's color-digitizing software, however.

he Apple line plays host to more than 45 word-processing programs. They come in near-tropical variety, and culling the best of the best is not simple. Three in particular are so effective and accommodating, however, that no list of A + All-Stars would be complete without them. They are WordPerfect, Perfect Writer, and Multiscribe GS.

These programs are all very different. The first is a command-oriented program, the third a Maclike one, and the second an interesting hybrid of the two. Together, they cover the spectrum of Apple word processing today.

Despite their differences, all excel in major criteria for this category: power, ease of use, and ease of learning.

Power is the most important measure. A powerful word-processing program is like a Hindu god with 15 hands instead of 2. It bestows possibilities. The program may perform such desirable services as footnoting, indexing, and table-of-contents generation, and it may even carry out exotic tasks such as print spooling. It may also come with spelling-checker, thesaurus, and other software, further extending its range.

Ease of use is the personality of the software. An easy-to-use wordprocessing program is ingratiating, anticipating your needs and making its powers accessible. It provides shortcuts and macros. It offers direct ways to execute common

tasks, such as moving the cursor. It displays your work accurately and gives you other useful feedback. Finally, it has a satisfying "feel" to it. It confers a sense of mastery.

Ease of learning is the least important criterion, since it applies only to a temporary state, but it still matters. An easy-to-learn program has clear and complete documentation, including a tutorial, and does not require extensive memorization of commands. It may have further aids, such as a keyboard template to fit above function keys.

In these regards, WordPerfect, Perfect Writer, and Multiscribe GS



The command-oriented Word-Perfect is the most traditional of the three, yet it is also a highly responsive item with an array of pleasing faculties. You cannot go wrong with it, and you may find it to be exactly what you want.

The software overflows with fine features. For instance, it offers print spooling, a rare capacity. It allows soft hyphenation. It does automatic footnotes, renumbering them when you add or delete them. It inserts the date automatically at the cursor. It boxes paragraphs, although you must type the boxes in, key by key. It capitalizes selections instantly and likewise generates all-lowercase letters. It performs hanging and double indents, for paragraph-size quotes. It allows proportional spacing, creates subscripts and superscripts, and handles fonts if your printer permits.


WordPerfect has extras as well. It comes with a 50,000-word spelling checker that alerts you to identical words in sequence, such as "the the." In addition, the program has a mail-merge feature, so you can create form letters.

For all its breadth, WordPerfect is a treat to operate. It has many features that gladden a writer's eye, such as word count. It moves the cursor in myriad ways, such as to a line located a specified number of lines down the page or to a selected block of text. Among its delete functions are Delete to the End of a Line, and Delete to the End of the Page. For phrases and formats, it offers macros that you can chain together.

The trade-off for all this sophistication is a marked lack of speed. WordPerfect also abounds in instructions and thus is not the easiest program to learn. It comes with a template that fits above the keyboard and indicates the function keys, however. Its documentation is excellent, and it offers on-line help for the stranded. WordPerfect comes from WordPerfect Corporation, 288 West Center Street, Orem, UT 84057; (801) 227-4000. It runs on an Apple IIe or IIc with 128K of RAM and costs \$179.

Perfect Writer 2.0

At first sight, Perfect Writer seems to be a program in transition, part command-oriented, part Mac-like. Yet unlike many compromises, which sacrifice the essences



on both sides, Perfect Writer has managed to retain them. The program melds power with a graceful interface.

The Mac influence is clear. The software offers a WYSIWYG display, unless you specify otherwise, and a ruler across the top. It also has pop-up menus, very similar to the Mac's, which you negotiate by pressing the arrow keys or typing the first letter of the command.

Perfect Writer is an impressive formatter. It does indexing, tables of contents, and footnotes, and can print footnotes either in the text or at the end. It offers hanging and double indents and permits three kinds of bullets: dashes, asterisks, or filled circles. It automatically numbers paragraphs, for outlines. Its headers and footers can alter-



nate for odd and even pages and contain not only the number of the page but of the current chapter and subchapter as well. It turns selected prose into all caps or all lowercase, and it can automatically transpose two adjacent characters, for swift typo correction. It lets you split the screen into two windows, for multiple-document editing, and even comes with a format for verse.

Perfect Writer offers a 50,000-word spelling checker and an equally ample thesaurus. In addition, it is compatible with spreadsheet, database, and telecommunications programs from its manufacturer.

Perfect Writer is easy both to learn and to use. Its documentation is clear and easy to understand. Moreover, the pop-up menus serve as convenient training tools. You can start writing soon after you first boot up the program, and once you assimilate the commands, you can move on to the mnemonic shortcuts at your own speed.

Multiscribe GS 2.0


Multiscribe GS is the first IIGS word-processing program to attain real stature. It has the floating-on-air feel of a true Macintosh program, and if it lacks such features as automatic footnoting, it compensates elsewhere.

Multiscribe GS employs the mouse and has an eye-pleasing Macintosh-type display: pull-down menus, scroll bar, ruler (in color), WYSIWYG, fonts, styles (including subscript and superscript), and sizes.

The program takes after Mac-Write in many ways. For instance, it lets you select a word by double-clicking on it and allows you to scroll window by window by clicking above or below the scroll box. It offers numerous shortcuts, reports the space left on the disk, and displays the current page number. But that's just the beginning.

Multiscribe GS 2.0 exceeds MacWrite in many other ways. It lets you select a whole line by triple-clicking it. It has Select All. It can display as many as eight windows for multidocument editing, and it lets you zoom them in and out. Its automatic Stack Windows function arranges up to three windows on the screen, one atop another, like playing cards.

Moreover, MultiScribe allows you to work in any font size from 6 to 48 point, through its Larger and Smaller commands, which increase or decrease selected text by one point. In addition, its Style menu lets you deselect styles one at a time, so that, for instance, you can



go directly from bold italic shadow to bold italic, rather than dropping down to Plain Text and then rebuilding.

Multiscribe GS prints with either a vertical or horizontal orientation, in color or black and white, in multiple quality levels. It also reads AppleWorks files directly.

The software has two features the average writer may not need but that are still a pleasure: color and graphics. The Color menu can contain two pure colors and up to 15 dithered ones, and the Edit Colors command lets you choose from among 4096 colors in which to work.

Multiscribe GS 2.0 also has an impressive graphics capacity. It lets you paste in bit-mapped pictures, whose size is limited only by available memory. You can manipulate these pictures easily: resize, reshape, and move them, as well as place them behind or in front of text. Most intriguingly, you can draw right on MultiScribe GS documents. You can pull out filled and hollow rectangles, curved rectan-

gles, and ovals, in six different pen sizes and any color.

We've divided our preferences into categories of graphics applications: paint programs, print utilities, animation programs, and so on. Our only criterion, besides excellence, was that the program currently be available for purchase. We've made a special effort to mention not only the programs and their publishers but, whenever possible, the authors and programmers as well-they are the unsung heroes of the computer world. Here goes.

res paint program is Blazing Paddles, written by Michael Darooge




McCullough and David Walker. This program offers a variety of options, is incredibly easy to use, and works with an assortment of input devices. Blazing Paddles deserves a salute for being one of the few graphics programs that lets you see your entire graphic as you work. An iconic menu frames the screen. Select a color and a tool, and the menu disappears. Once you have started working, a click of a mouse or a similar action with a graphicstablet pen, paddle, or other input device brings back the menu frame. While you are selecting your next tool and/or color, you can see most of your picture inside



this frame—extremely helpful when you are deciding which colors to use.

Blazing Paddles lets you load and manipulate standard Applesoft shapes and add them to your graphic (a precursor to clip art?), and it has a wonderful magnifying, or zoom, mode that scrolls as you work. With text, cut and paste, color mixing, and an undo function, Blazing Paddles outfeatures the competition.

Dazzle Draw

For best double-hi-res paint program, it's David Snider's Dazzle Draw, all the way. Judging from your submissions to "A + Graphics Gallery," we're sure most of you agree. It was one of the first Apple II programs to emulate the Macintosh interface and use pull-down menus. Click on the menus, and they pull down like window shades, offering just about any tool you could wish for. It's all there: adjustable line widths, circles, squares, brushes of different sizes and shapes, text, fill, spray paint, zoom, patterns, pattern edit, cut, copy, paste, flip, invert, exchange colors, replace colors, mirrors, grid.

Dazzle Draw would be better if the program let you see the full screen while you were working. Unfortunately, the menu bar and tool windows obstruct your view, so you have to scroll as you work. Aside from that one serious flaw, we find that the program lives up to its name—it's dazzling.

Dazzle Draw is a product of Brø-


DeluxePaint II

DeluxePaint II, by Dan Silva, has our vote as the best super-hi-res paint program. This program is the newest kid on the block, and it's a winner. We reviewed this program last month, so we won't go into detail about the program here. Suffice it to say that, with every possible feature you could wish for—and a few you may not have thought possible on an Apple II—DeluxePaint II belongs in the software library of every Apple IIGS user.

DeluxePaint II is from Electronic Arts, 1820 Gateway Drive, San Mateo, CA 94404; (415) 571-7171. It runs on an Apple IIGS with 768K of RAM and costs \$99.95.

Take 1

Baudville did it again with Take 1, our pick as the best standard-hi-



res animation program. This dynamic animation program was written by Maurizio Barbatano and Michael Darooge. Edward McCullough and David Walker were the programmers. Here, too, outstanding features coupled with ease of use make a winner.

Using keystroke commands, you cut out objects from any hi-res picture to make "actors." You then move the actors around the screen, combine them with text and sound, add pauses, and "shoot a scene." One or more scenes put together with backgrounds make a movie. Thanks to Take 1's editing capabilities, you can back up and easily change any part of your movies.

In Take 1, text can be animated just like an actor. Scenes can have fade-ins and fade-outs. You can use pauses to stop action at a given frame and wait for a selected time delay or until the viewer presses a key or joystick button. Pauses can include sound effects such as footsteps, beeps, and crashes. Actors can be block shapes or sprites. (Sprites contain transparent holes that allow the background to show through. If the snapshot is a car, for example, the background will show through the windows of the car.) You create backgrounds with a full-screen hi-res picture editor that uses shape tables, text, actors, color fill, and a zoom pixel editor. Cut and paste options let you clip out any part of the screen, move it, flip it, and/or duplicate it. The program automatically compresses your finished background so that it takes up less disk space. With the Take 1 Tool Kit, you can convert your movies into professionalquality interactive presentations.


Animate

Our choice for best double-hi-res animation is Animate, a superb program by Steven Ohmert. Animate consists of Graphic Designer and Scene Designer. Graphic Designer is where you develop your characters and backgrounds, using a full complement of drawing and editing features. You start by draw-

ing your character shapes (man with arms down, man with arms out, man with arms up) and enclosing them in frames. Next, you put your frames in order, which defines a character. Once you've saved your characters to disk, you go to Scene Designer.

Here you load all the characters you want in a scene. You can also load a background you've created with Dazzle Draw. Next you define your characters' movements by setting paths. Finally, you add text and sound, and your animation is complete.

Animate has features similar to




Take 1's, but it uses the same graphic interface as its sister program, Dazzle Draw. Pull-down menus combined with your choice of graphic-input device make the program as easy to use as an animation program can be.

Other All-Stars: The Classics


Some programs serve a need for a while, and then, as newer, similar utilities arrive, they are relegated to a closet shelf and gather dust. Other programs, however, stand the test of time. They do something uniquely or so well that you find yourself using them time after time. We consider these programs classics. They are the real All-Stars. The Graphics Magician. This program, by Mark Pelczarski, David Lubar, Chris Jochumson, and Steven Meuse, is probably the most enduring graphics program. This standard- and double-hi-res animation program offers both a gamestyle small-object animation mod-





ule and a paint-oriented sequential-picture module. Without the Graphics Magician, many commercial games and educational programs wouldn't exist. This program, although four years old, is still being used by professional developers. A special professional version is available.

The Graphics Magician is from Polarware, P.O. Box 311, Geneva, IL 60134; (312) 232-1984. It requires an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 48K of RAM and costs \$39.95. Fontrix. Fontrix, by Steve Boker, was the first Apple II program to



let you combine text with graphics and print it on a full page. Fontrix's innovative use of an "extended" screen (it lets you scroll horizontally and vertically to see multiple hires-graphics screens), combined with its excellent printing module (it reduces the screen graphics so that multiple screens of text and graphics fit on one page), gave us desktop publishing on the Apple II

well before we got it on the Mac.

Fontrix lets you create newsletters and other printed materials; it has a powerful print utility that works with more printers than we knew existed; and you can use it with supplemental FontPaks of the most astonishing array of highquality fonts in the Apple II world.

Fontrix comes from Data Transforms, 616 Washington Street, Denver, CO 80203; (303) 832-1501. It runs on an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 48K of RAM, and its list price is \$75.

Shape Mechanic and Font Mechanic. Shape Mechanic and Font



Mechanic by Bert Kersey and Mark Simonsen are a matched pair that evolved from the older Apple Mechanic program. Apple Mechanic gave artists and programmers an easy alternative to creating shapes from scratch and provided a simple way to put text onto the Apple II hi-res screen by letting you use font shapes. Today, Shape Mechanic lets you capture any piece of a standard hi-res graphic and convert it into a shape. If you've tried to piece together a shape table from scratch or use a standard shape editor, you'll breathe a sigh of relief when you see the Shape Capture module. Terrific!

hoosing educational-software All-Stars is a nearly impossible task. There are too many outstanding educational software packages and too few editorial pages. To make things more manageable, I am relying on the distinction between software developed for home use and software meant for classroom use. In this All-Star issue, I'll concentrate on classroom software and refer you back to A + 's October Computer Learning Month issue (page 38), where the article "A Sampler of Tried and True Titles" lists programs that qualify as All-Star products for educational use at home.

The programs I've selected here as A + All-Stars are a mixture of classics and newer, innovative products; a few titles are new releases. Most of the All-Stars are for classrooms only and supplement a distinct curricular area.

The education All-Stars fall into the following curricular areas: mathematics, science, problem solving, language arts, social studies, and early learning. A separate category for productivity software lists the best tool products. You'll notice two glaring omissions from these categories: music and art. Don't worry, though—we haven't left them out; see the Music and Graphics All-Stars sections in this issue for information on both of these categories.

MATHEMATICS


Number Munchers. Number Munchers from MECC is a delightful mathematics game that takes place on a grid populated by Number Munchers (Munchus Digitus) and Troggles with names such as Trogglus Normalus, Trogglus Assistus, Trogglus Laborus, Trogglus Timidus, and Trogglus Smarticus. Number Munchers are under student control, driven to meals of multiples, factors, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, prime numbers, equalities, and inequalities. Troggles randomly jump in to complicate matters—they eat numbers and expressions, leave others as distractors, eat number munchers whole, and generally make things difficult. As the level of difficulty increases, extreme concentration is necessary to avoid all the Troggles and unexpected target values that pop up. Students



do get relief from the stress of high-level play, however. The program rewards success with graphic interludes showing great moments in Number Muncher history.

Number Munchers is available from MECC, 3490 Lexington Avenue North, St. Paul, MN 55126; (612) 481-3500. The program is appropriate for grades 3 and above and requires any Apple II series computer with 64K of RAM. The list price is \$49 for a 51/4-inch diskette and \$55 for a 3.5-inch diskette.

Math Blaster Plus. It's here! The new and enhanced version of the Davidson & Associates classic Math Blaster is even better than the original. The program covers the same subject area, basic math, but has had a face-lift. New graphics and pull-down menus give it a classy new look. Yet, knowing beauty is only skin deep, Math Blaster Plus does not rely on looks for success. A test maker, a retake option for difficult problems, student recordkeeping and report capabilities, printed-graphics capabilities, and problem-solving activities are a few of the new features that make Math Blaster Plus a valuable teach-






ing tool. For the kids, the Blasternaut game is tons of fun and lets them improve problem-response speed and accuracy.

Math Blaster Plus is available from Davidson & Associates, Inc., 3135 Kashiwa Street, Torrance, CA 90505; (213) 534-4070. The program is appropriate for use in grades 1-6 and requires an Apple IIe (with an extended 80-column card), IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM. The list price for the singleuser version is \$49.95; the five-disk lab pack is \$129.95.

Green Globs and Graphing Equations. I still have trouble comprehending that (2x - 3)(y + 8) = 12is a conic section. I'd do better with Green Globs and Graphing Equations, which provides mathematical settings in which students can



explore the relationship between just such equations and their graphs. The program has an enormous problem range that is appropriate for beginning algebra students working with graphs of straight lines, all the way to mathanalysis students exploring trigonometric and discontinuous algebraic functions. Two tool programs let students graph equations and explore the effects of altering them. The package includes two games, Green Globs and Tracker. In Green Globs, students earn points for writing equations that pass through as many green globs as possible. Tracker is a game in which graphs are hidden on a grid. Students gather clues to figure out the equation of the hidden graphs.

Green Globs and Graphing Equations is available from Sunburst Communications, 39 Washington Avenue, Pleasantville, NY 10570; (800) 431-1934 or (914) 769-5030. The program is appropriate for grades 9-12 and requires any Apple II computer with 64K of RAM. The list price for the singleuser version is \$65; the ten-disk Lab Pack is \$195.

SCIENCE

Operation: Frog. If intestinal tracts, glands, and major blood vessels aren't your cup of tea but you need to know amphibian physiology, Operation: Frog is for you. The three segments of the program cover dissection and two levels of "reconstruction": beginner and expert. The program demands that the frog be dissected or reconstructed in logical order of position—you can't insert or remove the small intestine if you're working on the respiratory system, for example. A feature worth noting is the magnifying glass. Using the magnifying glass to inspect an organ calls up either an animated graphic of the organ's function or a diagram illustrating how an organ fits into one of the frog's systems.

Home and school versions of Operation: Frog are available. The school version comes with a complete reference guide, background materials on the high points in the history of frogs and toads, and a variety of student-activity suggestions. Operation: Frog is available from Scholastic, Inc., 730 Broadway, New York, NY 10003; (212) 505-3000. The program is appropriate for grades 4-10 and requires an Apple II Plus, IIc, or IIe with 64K of RAM. The list price for the singleuser version is \$74.95; the five-disk Lab Pack is \$112.45.

Telecommunications

hat distinguishes telecommunications All-Stars from the pack are features that represent advances in technology, most notably the ability to take advantage of the mouse interface and the incorporation of the Binary II standard.


Binary II is a file format, developed by A + Senior Technical Editor Gary Little, that enables users to easily upload ProDOS files to and download them from information services without loss of file-attribute information such as file type, size, name, and the like. You need this information unless you're just transferring standard readable text files.

The products I single out here aren't the only ones that include these features, nor do all of them handle both the mouse and Binary II. These telecommunications programs are the best all-around players available, however, and have shown good stuff this past year.

I have four choices for the bests in telecommunications for 1987: Point-to-Point, MouseTalk, Talk is Cheap, and FreeTermGS. I've also picked three runners-up. The best programs for working on-line with your Apple II

Point-to-Point

Point-to-Point, a commercial program for the Apple IIe, IIc, and IIGS, is my telecommunications program of choice. It uses the AppleWorks file-card display and is one of the easiest programs to use and understand. Many of the program's major commands are dis-



played on the top line of the screen, so you don't need to memorize the commands for turning on the capture buffer, beginning Xmodem upload or download, or sending a text file or capture buffer to a remote computer.

Whenever you're using the capture buffer, Point-to-Point displays the amount of remaining space. When the buffer is full, the program automatically saves it to disk, in a file you've specified. If the file already exists, the program adds the new data to the end of the file.

Some people criticize the relatively small capacity of the Point-to-Point capture buffer—about 18,000 characters—but I consider the size, in conjunction with the automatic-save feature, an advantage. The combination ensures I will not lose much data if I experience a power loss.

Other features of the program are obviously designed to make your life easier. A review buffer contains the last 255 lines that have scrolled off the top of your screen. You can review them at any time and even copy them to the capture buffer. Many of the commands are

based on mnemonics, such as open-apple/D (for Disk menu) and open-apple/S (to save the capture buffer).

The one criticism of Point-to-Point with which I agree is that it has a relatively weak text editor. It is a line editor, not a full-screen editor. Since I do most of my text editing off-line, usually using AppleWorks or another Apple II word-processing program, I find this weakness an insignificant flaw.


Point-to-Point comes from Pinpoint, 5865 Doyle Street, Emeryville, CA 94608; (415) 654-3050. It works with an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM and costs \$129.

MouseTalk

My second-favorite telecommunications program featuring the use of a mouse is MouseTalk. This program operates with Mousetext characters and thus requires an enhanced Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS. Because it uses Mousetext and other text characters on the text screen, rather than using graphics, it performs well and keeps up with the flow of data.



MouseTalk is easy to operate and contains many convenient features. It was the first Apple II telecommunications program I know of to have a review buffer. It provides a simple method of moving between the various ProDOS directory levels. My only real complaint about the file operation is that it doesn't follow the standard meth-



od built into the GS toolbox. As a result, I sometimes find myself inappropriately using GS-type operations while attempting to navigate through subdirectories to my file. One of the best features of Mouse-Talk is its full-screen editor. You scroll or select text with the mouse and cut, copy, and paste as you do with Apple IIGS and Macintosh word-processing programs. You also have apple-key equivalents of menu commands.

The major defect in MouseTalk is the lack of built-in Binary II file-transfer translation. Since Binary II is rapidly becoming the standard for downloading Apple II files, this omission is puzzling. The program's publisher does not promise to include Binary II in future releases of the program but states only that it is considering incorporation of this feature.

Talk is Cheap

Talk is Cheap, one of the real bargains in telecommunications software, is yours for only a \$30 shareware fee. Despite its low price, many "professional" telecommunicators use this program.

The shareware concept lets you try a program before you buy it. You can usually find it on a bulletin board or national telecommunications service and download it to your computer. If you like the program and use it, you are supposed to send payment to the program's author. The amount of the payment and the author's address typically appear in the documentation.

Talk is Cheap contains most of the features you expect in a commercial telecommunications program, including Xmodem upload and download with automatic Binary II conversion, and a copy buffer (but no review buffer). Two special features of the program are an extended macro-command language, which allows for extensive automation of functions, and Turbo Xmodem downloading.

Turbo Xmodem is a feature that, given certain conditions, can in-



crease your downloading speed by up to 100%. Turbo Xmodem requires that all downloading be to a RAMdisk. Since it cannot recover from a data-transfer error, you need quiet telephone lines to use it.

Don Elton, author of Talk is Cheap, provides frequent upgrades to the program and makes them available not only on the networks but on many Apple bulletin boards as well.

Talk is Cheap is available from information services and bulletin boards or directly from Don Elton, Carolina System Software, 3207 Berkeley Forest Drive, Columbia, SC 29209-4111 for \$30 as shareware. It works with an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS.

FreeTermGS


The fourth program on my list of bests in telecommunications is a freeware program, FreeTermGS. Freeware means just that; you can get a copy of it for free or, if you download it from a network, for the cost of your connect time.

My August 1987 "Telecommunications" column in A + contained a first look at FreeTermGS that is still accurate. The program is a true IIGS desktop-style program, proving that programmers can write a telecommunications program by using IIGS toolbox routines. The program's upper transmission-rate limit is 2400 bps, but, even at 1200 bps, display updating is somewhat sluggish. Future commercial, mouse-operated, menu-driven telecommunications programs are likely to follow MouseTalk's path and use the text screen and Mousetext instead of the super-hi-res

Freeterm can display control characters as the remote computer sends them. If you encounter errors in performing an Xmodem file transfer, a dialog box shows the type of error. You can find more information about each type of error in the program's documentation.

You can download FreeTermGS from most of the information services and also from some bulletin boards. It requires an Apple IIGS with 512K of RAM.



The Second Stringers

Three other programs also merit consideration for the best in telecommunications.

CommWorks. CommWorks, together with Point-to-Point and MouseTalk, was one of the early GS-compatible telecommunications programs. It resembles Point-to-Point in many respects, including use of the AppleWorks file-card system for command selection and use of open-apple-key combinations to perform many functions.

CommWorks has not kept pace with other telecommunications programs, however. For example,






MouseTalk and Point-to-Point now both have review buffers, but CommWorks has not added this feature. I use my review buffer more than any other single feature; whenever I use a program without a review buffer, I find myself automatically reaching for it anyway. CommWorks also has not added Binary II download translation.

A significant feature of Comm-Works is that it has full VT-100 terminal emulation.

CommWorks is a product of PBI Software, 1163 Triton Drive, Foster City, CA 94404; (415) 349-8765. It works with an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM and costs

ProTERM. The other major commercial telecommunications program that merits serious consideration is ProTERM, a program that first appeared in 1987. Many experienced telecommunicators currently use ProTERM.

ProTERM has both a review buffer and a copy buffer and automatically allocates the space between the two buffers according to how much memory it finds in your system. It uses any expanded memory it finds in the IIe auxiliary slot and a Checkmate Technology or Applied Engineering memory-expansion card for the Apple IIc. But the program can use other expanded memory (such as Apple's memory-expansion cards for the IIc or IIGS) only as a RAMdisk. One of the interesting features of Pro-TERM, AutoLearn, lets you create auto-log-on macros automatically.

You can use either internal or external modems with ProTERM. The program works with Hayes Smartmodem-compatibles as well as the Hayes Micromodem II, Hayes Micromodem IIe, Novation AppleCat, and Zoom Modem IIe.

Maug Message Manager. The final product on my list is neither a telecommunications program nor a commercial or shareware program. It is useful only if you are a member of the MAUG forum on CompuServe. But Maug Message Manager can save you hundreds of dollars a year, depending on how much you read and reply to messages on the MAUG message board.

Only a finite number of messages can be on the MAUG message board at any time. Whenever you add a new message, you push the oldest message off. You must call and read messages every two or three days to keep current.



Of course, reading, reviewing, and replying to messages while connected to CompuServe can be very expensive. (CompuServe charges \$6 per hour at 300 bps and \$12.50 per hour at 1200 or 2400 bps, plus network access fees ranging from \$.25 to \$2 per hour in the United States.)

Maug Message Manager processes the text file of messages that your telecommunications program has downloaded from MAUG. While you are off-line, you read messages as they are presented to you and write replies off-line. You then call back and, in one automated action, upload all your replies at once


As you are reading a message, you can also place it in one of several disk text files or print it out. The program, written by a MAUG member, John R. Tierney, is of nearly commercial quality and costs only the price of the MAUG


connect time you need to download it. It requires an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 64K of RAM.

One feature that is common to many of the programs I've discussed in this article is the presence of the author, the publisher, or both on one or more of the national telecommunications services. You can send questions to them and receive answers back.

The two national services with the most representation appear to be CompuServe (MAUG) and GEnie (AART). Bill Blue (developer of MouseTalk), Don Elton (author of Talk is Cheap), and Gary Little (author of Point-to-Point and the Binary II standard) frequently check into both services. In addition, Pinpoint (publisher of Point-to-Point) maintains a support service on AART, and John Tierney (author of Maug Message Manager) can often be found on MAUG.



ny Apple II owner who's running a business needs to track income and expenses, and a business accounting program is usually the way to go. Many small-business owners actually buy an Apple specifically to set up an accounting system, whereas others who begin businesses at home migrate to accounting from other applications. If your business is very small, you may be able to manage it with a personal accounting system such as one of those described in the personal-finance All-Stars article in this issue. These programs (called one-write systems) work like checkbook registers, in which you enter all transactions only once.


The accepted method of maintaining books for any serious business, from a corner store to a Fortune 500 firm, is called doubleentry accounting. This kind of accounting balances assets (such as cash receipts or the value of equipment) and liabilities (such as out-

standing loans or stock) against one another on each side of a ledger. The concept of double-entry accounting is that the two sides of the ledger are always in balance, so that the company always has assets equal to its liabilities. The standard measure of a company's financial position is a balance sheet that lists its assets and liabilities.

Bankers and accountants use balance sheets and income statements to evaluate a company's finances, so you must be able to prepare and understand these tools. That's why most accountants recommend double-entry accounting systems for their clients. Unfortunately, many Apple II owners haven't had accounting courses to prepare themselves for implementing a doubleentry accounting system.

In searching for the All-Stars of business accounting in the Apple II world, I looked for programs that offered the standard features and functions of an accounting system while providing good introductions to the principles of doubleentry accounting. I have found that most Apple II users need some kind of explanation of the doubleentry method before they can successfully set up such a system.

Another criterion I used was ease of use. Even if you understand the basics of accounting, you shouldn't have to spend weeks getting a system running. And once the system is running, it shouldn't require a user with total recall to run it effectively. Beyond using these essential criteria, I sought the programs that were widely supported by local



dealers or that offered abundant technical support.

The three outstanding business accounting programs I located were Peachtree's Back To Basics, Manzanita Software's Business-Works, and BPI's Entry Series.

Back To Basics

This program was originally sold as three separate modules that you could buy individually or at a discount in an all-in-one package. Peachtree now sells all the modules in one package only. Peachtree is one of the oldest companies in the personal-computer accountingsoftware business, dating back to 1975. The company makes a more complete accounting system with extra modules, but not for the Apple II line. Back To Basics is a professional accounting system that handles receivables, payables, and general-ledger bookkeeping for small to medium-sized businesses.

Winner of the 1986 and 1987 A + Reader's Choice Awards, Back To Basics is popular for its ease of use and flexibility. You can run any of the modules as a stand-alone program, or you can integrate the payables and receivables into the general ledger. The general ledger can handle annual revenues up to \$10 million, but it is limited to 254 accounts and 1700 entries per month. The receivables module can handle 300 customers, and the



payables module tops out at 115 vendors. Payroll and inventory modules are not available for Back To Basics. Because of these limits, this package appeals mainly to smaller businesses.

The main virtue of Back To Basics is its ease of use. The package is designed to get a business running within a day. All three modules have a well-designed interface that uses menus and prompts for selecting and confirming options. You can press Escape to back out of a menu, an entry, or a set of entries. It is difficult or impossible to make unwitting errors with this program, as it always asks you to confirm the choices and entries you make. Once you're up to speed on the program, you can select the Advanced mode, which disables some of the prompts that ask you to double-check your entries.

Another convenient feature is a predefined chart of accounts in the general-ledger package. The program comes with a few dozen account names and numbers already entered and divided into logical groups for proper accounting. You can choose to create a completely different chart of accounts from scratch or customize the predefined one.

The program has no on-line help, but the Back To Basics manual is excellent in describing principles of double-entry accounting as well as the installation and use of the program. Its 38-page introduction to accounting principles was written by a Harvard Business School professor.

The bulk of the manual contains walk-through tutorials and reference guides for each software module. The extremely useful last section of the manual shows how to use the programs in various accounting situations. Written by a CPA and an accounting professor, the section covers 39 specific accounting situations, including retirement of plant assets and issuance of stock.


Back To Basics is available on many different computers, so its manual is generic. A separate hardware booklet describes specific commands, program capacities, and installation procedures on the Apple II. Back To Basics can't use a hard-disk drive, and it requires you to use a new data disk for each module every month.

Peachtree offers a toll-free technical-support line; it charges by the minute for support calls. Back To Basics is widely distributed, and since the same program runs on a variety of computers, many dealers should be able to offer good local support. The program carries a 30-day money-back guarantee.

Back to Basics comes from Peachtree Software, 4355 Shackleford Road, Norcross, GA 30093; (800) 247-3224. It runs on an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 64K of RAM and costs \$195.

BusinessWorks

BusinessWorks is a complete, full-featured accounting system that offers general-ledger, payables, receivables, inventory, and payroll modules. With a required System Manager module, you can use any of the accounting modules alone, or you can integrate them all into a complete system. Responding to encouragement from Apple, Manzanita Software designed BusinessWorks so it works with either two UniDisk 3.5-inch disk drives



or one UniDisk or 5¼-inch drive and a hard disk.

One nice feature of Business-Works is its ability to save data in the AppleWorks spreadsheet or database format, so you can analyze your accounting data in Apple-Works. In fact, Manzanita says the biggest single reason people buy the system is its ability to integrate with AppleWorks.

In contrast to Back To Basics, whose users are primarily individ-

uals with small businesses, half of BusinessWorks' users are companies with more than \$1 million in annual revenues. The program can handle companies with up to \$20 million in annual sales. It can maintain records on an unlimited number of separate companies (if you use a high-capacity disk to store the data), and it can handle up to 1000 accounts and 20,000 entries per month.

BusinessWorks has many advanced features. You can specify



and print a series of reports at once with a single command and take advantage of a full-year budgeting feature for both revenue and expense accounts. You can also produce instant reports on the current status of your books at any time. The payables module lets you

make partial payments and can do automatic check reconciliation, and the payroll module can print government reports such as W-2 forms.

Although it is powerful and fullfeatured, BusinessWorks manages to be very easy to use. It has a filecard interface like the one in AppleWorks and uses similar menus, prompts, and selection features, so AppleWorks users will be comfortable with it quickly. In addition, it has context-sensitive online help. If you don't understand what kind of entry the program needs at a certain point, you can type open-apple/? and get a help screen that describes the particular response for which the computer is waiting. You can also get moregeneral help about specific functional areas of the program. Help screens usually include page-number references for the module's users' manual. Excellent error messages help with incorrect entries.

One common problem with accounting systems is the variety of accounts they define and the difficulty of remembering account codes. BusinessWorks has a unique feature called Show Windows, which displays all the accounts in its chart of accounts. If you can't remember an account code, you can pop up a window and then select the account you want by highlighting it and pressing the Return key.

BusinessWorks has an excellent set of manuals that thoroughly describe the program's operation. They include tutorial and reference sections, and each module's manual begins with a section explaining the accounting principles you must understand before using the module.

BusinessWorks is priced about the same as other accounting systems with a full set of modules, but it is far easier to set up and use than its competition. The company offers free technical support via a toll-free number for the first 90 days you own any module; unlimited technical support is \$150 per year after that.







\$445, and the other modules are \$395 each.

BPI Entry Series

A longtime favorite of Apple IIusing accountants, the BPI Entry Series is marketed by Computer Associates of San Jose, California. The Entry Series includes separate modules for general ledger, payables, receivables, payroll, and inventory. You can run the modules individually or integrate them into a complete system. As with BusinessWorks, you can transfer data from the BPI Entry series to the AppleWorks spreadsheet for further analysis.

This set of modules is relatively easy to use, although not quite as easy as BusinessWorks. The Entry Series doesn't provide on-line help, nor does its documentation provide an orientation about principles of double-entry accounting, so you're pretty much on your own in this respect.



Like BusinessWorks, this program lets you maintain the books on several different businesses at a time, simply by using a separate data disk for each client. The program does not maintain a historical record of each month's ledger, so, unlike BusinessWorks, it can't produce a full-year budget.

On the other hand, the Entry Series is the most widely distributed of the full-featured accounting programs for the Apple II, so local support should be easy to find. If not, Computer Associates International offers 60 days of free telephone support for each module (although it has no toll-free number for this service), and you can buy a year's worth of support at a toll-free number for \$95.

The BPI Entry Series is marketed by Computer Associates International, 2195 Fortune Drive, San Jose, CA 95131; (408) 432-1727. It runs on an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM and costs \$295 per module.

AppleWorks Templates

Templates provide a less expensive accounting alternative for AppleWorks owners. Many larger users' groups offer general-ledger templates for AppleWorks, but these often have little or no docu-

mentation. The Q-Mar Group of San Diego, which produces an AppleWorks newsletter and a series of AppleWorks templates, sells a well-documented general-ledger template. The template's 80-page manual includes an introduction to accounting principles. Q-Mar will soon be releasing accounts-payable and accounts-receivable modules, which are expected to sell for \$69.95 each.







or Apple II computer-music stalwarts, the arrival of the Apple IIGS was just as sweet and spirit-lifting as Roy Hobbs' final home run in the movie *The Natural*. Yes, we had suffered a string of drubbings from the Amiga and ST teams—and even our Macintosh pals were beginning to laugh at us behind our backs. You could almost hear them jeering, "The Apple II Tunesmiths? Those has-beens are about as musically relevant as Perry Como and Tennessee Ernie Ford . . ."

Then, with one towering home run, the Apple IIGS turned the game completely around.

Thanks to the IIGS's amazing Ensoniq digital oscillator chip and the vivid hues of the RGB monitor, the Apple II family has leapfrogged from also-ran status back up to a contender's position in the Micro Music League. Although we IIGS owners have achieved only parity with Commodore and Atari (and the Mac) in terms of sequencing and other professional applications, we're really widening our lead in the educational market. The extraordinary sound and color of

the IIGs are breathing new life into venerable Apple II music-software packages—especially in the realm of K-12 educational courseware.

This All-Stars segment focuses on music-education packages and didactic compositional packages (the primary purpose of which is to instruct and entertain, rather than do studio-caliber sequencing). Frankly, most of the serious sequencing software has moved over to the Mac, Amiga, and ST, never to return. It's in the role of teacher/ entertainer that the Apple II family continues to reign supreme. Software for the II now brilliantly handles the job once reserved for the likes of Victor Borge and Leonard Bernstein: multifaceted musical

So without further whole rests, let's take a look at the All-Stars, beginning with an inspired line-up of GS packages.

The Music Studio

The only thing about The Music



Studio that isn't top drawer is its lackluster intro song. Once you've weathered that, however, you're in for a treat. It's the most comprehensive GS compositional package around. Its easy-to-use pull-down/pop-up menus let you drag color-





coded notes to a grand staff (both treble and bass clefs). The Music Studio takes full advantage of the GS's 15-voice capabilities—voice, in this context, is synonymous with timbre rather than human speech.

For example, you can use the mouse to drag down a color-coded C note in the tenor-sax voice, followed by a color-coded E in the vibes voice, and then by a G in the string-bass voice. If you stack this triad of notes vertically, you'll get a rich C-major chord in three voices. (You can stack up to 15 voices in complementary bass and treble chords, but the result sounds a bit crowded and experimental, à la John Cage!)

The program furnishes three sets of voices (classical, rock, and jazz), plus a set of vocal phonemes that let you create simulated voicevoices. (Confusing, eh?) That just means that you can add a layer of simulated a cappella singing—anything from Gregorian chant to doowop.

The Music Studio lets you transpose entire compositions from one key to another with just one mouse click on a pop-up menu. Its screen icons certainly make sense to musicians around the globe: a human ear for playback, a trash can for getting rid of stinko compositions. The Options menu allows you to rearrange musical blocks (Move Block, Copy Block, and so on) just as easily as most word-processing programs shift paragraphs.

Sometimes The Music Studio's elegance can be too much of a good thing. For instance, the mouse does a full run (or glissando) as you search the staff for a place to plunk your note. It sounds classy but sometimes makes note-placing confusing. Considering all its amenities, the software does have one surprising omission: It lacks automatic measure breaks.

These minor quibbles are like mere oboe squeaks in a masterpiece, though. The Music Studio is one of the few Apple II software packages with across-the-board appeal—to serious home composers and students alike.



Instant Music

Seldom has a piece of music software offered so much unabashed fun as Instant Music, a IIGS package from Electronic Arts. The program lets even musical neophytes cut loose with what its creators call mousejamming-wild improvisations that never stray from a recognizable melody and beat, thanks to the program's nifty artificial-intelligence-type programming.

Here's a for instance:

When you call up a song called



"Fun 1962," the IIGS starts throbbing to a beat and melody reminiscent of vintage Jan & Dean. You simply click on the Mousejam icon and then start sliding the mouse around to create a surprisingly tuneful "jam." You can slide the mouse slowly (to add occasional nuance) or feverishly (to enhance every twist and turn along this playful dead man's curve).

Instant Music uses a nonstandard form of music notation rather than notes on a grand staff. Therefore, it's easier to jam just with existing tunes than to create your own sonic masterpiece. Whether you're jamming or composing, however, Instant Music serves up plenty of interesting sound clusters: four different digitized instruments at a time, each able to play three notes simultaneously.

The canned songs on Instant Music are fabulous. Most of them can best be described as "Herbie Hancock Meets the Night Court Theme Song." Weird, campy, and a lot of fun to jam with. Some folk and classical selections are also available for highbrows who prefer to jam along with a famous opus such as "The Sabre Dance."

If you tire of Instant Music's basic repertoire, you can also obtain two disks entitled It's Only Rock & Roll and Hot & Cool Jazz. The former contains 40 mousejam-ready songs chronicling the history of rock 'n' roll. The latter has dozens of jazz tunes, from turn-of-the-century Jellyroll Morton-type ditties right up to the present.


Instant Music is the only music package I've ever found that makes me immediately feel like Miles Davis, Eric Clapton, and Itzhak Perlman all rolled into one whenever I move my mouse.

KidsTime II

KidsTime II, a IIGS educational program for ages 3 through 10, might unfairly get lost in the shuffle. Although its ABKey section is a fairly routine, if colorful, learnyour-ABCs program, the real jewel here is KidsNotes, an imaginative music-education program that uses a grand staff and a simulated piano keyboard to assist young students.

Unlike most other Apple II com-



positional packages, KidsTime II doesn't require you to drag notes down to the staff. You just select the note duration you want, point to the appropriate piano key, and then click. It's actually faster than note-dragging. On playback, students see both a scrolling grand staff (with automatic measures) and piano keys that are highlighted in red as the melody moves

KidsTime II isn't as sophisticated as some of its musical GS brethren.



of course. For example, you have only three key signatures to choose from. But its parallel piano/grandstaff graphics make it very accessible for young children.

For kids who'd rather listen than compose, the program contains several familiar childhood refrains:

"Jack & Jill (Went Up The Hill)," "Here We Go Round (The Mulberry Bush)" and "Mom's Asleep (Let's Play Some Van Halen)." (Just kidding about that last selection!)

The documentation even has a section for harried parents entitled "Notes to the Musically Unsure." If you don't know a dotted quarter note from a quarter horse, this section is an oasis of reassurance.

The KidsNotes section of Kids-Time II is a surprisingly full-featured GS music program. Most parents will find it just as fascinating as their young ones do.

Music Construction Set (GS)


Reviewers who give thumbs down to Music Construction Set are like film critics who knock Star Wars a decade after its release. Star Wars was an original that spawned



dozens of imitations. Likewise, Music Construction Set was the first Apple II program to popularize note dragging and Cut & Paste—features that many competitive products quickly latched onto.

Granted, the GS incarnation of Music Construction Set isn't as graphically imaginative as some of its competitors, and some of its voice selections now seem a bit dated (especially "Laser Gun"). It was the first kid on the block, however, to offer things like a chest-thumping opening song and one-click control over things like time and key signatures.

So let's give a pioneer an even break. Music Construction Set for the GS is still a standout product. It



The simplicity and innovation that made Music Construction Set a winner on the IIe are still alive and kickin' on the GS.

A Quintet with Class

Now let's take a look at the exemplary music programs that don't require an Apple IIGS to bring music to your ears.

The Music Class. The Music Class is a five-part, ten-disk music-instruction series for second graders on up to collegians. It's better to move through the series sequentially rather than skip around. (Like a wise guy, I tried to jump right into Part 3 and got rather confused!) The proper sequence is Fundamentals, Rhythm, Ear Training, Music Symbols, and Note Reading.

Although The Music Class was written by distinguished music professors of the University of Akron, the series is never lofty or dry. Matter of fact, it features clever onscreen characters such as Mr. Metro Gnome (whose tapping foot teaches vou the difference between 4/4 and 3/4 time) and an animated cat that teaches basic intervals.

Teachers will appreciate the many on-disk tutorials and the automatic record-keeping feature of The Music Class. Because each student has a separate password, teachers can track the performance of as many as 125 budding talents.

Although Mr. Metro Gnome was a tough taskmaster for me (3/4 time had me stymied for a while), I can vouch that The Music Class is both a whimsical and a comprehensive training series.

rest all-star team needs quality utility players, players capable of substituting for injured or slumping first-stringers so that the team can continue to win. It's just not possible to assemble a perfect lineup that does it all, day to day and year to year, without fail. This verity holds whether your team is the Los Angeles Lakers, New York Yankees, Chicago Bears, or that prized collection of software that makes your Apple II so valuable to you.

Disk utilities are particularly important to Apple II users, especially users with high-capacity 3.5-inch drives or hard-disk drives that are littered with dozens, perhaps hundreds, of files. Such utilities perform a variety of useful chores that major application programs usually don't handle adequately: general disk and file maintenance (cataloging, copying, deleting, renaming, locking, verifying, and so on), disaster recovery (fixing damaged disk blocks and scrambled catalogs, restoring deleted files), and other miscellaneous activities (searching for files and editing disk blocks).

In this article, I describe the very best disk utilities available for the Apple II today. Interestingly, none The best programs for disk management

of Apple's standard programs (Filer, System Utilities, DeskTop, and Convert) are good enough for inclusion. I suspect, however, that many A+ readers are still using them, simply because they come free with the ProDOS operating system. Believe me, you'll become much more productive if you switch to the best third-party disk utilities, so read on.

ProSel

ProSel is a startlingly comprehensive software system that includes more than a dozen disk-utility programs, as well as a popular program-selector utility, from which it derives its name.

The module you'll use most often is called Cat Doctor. Similar to Apple's Filer program, it is much more powerful and convenient. It performs a variety of operations on groups of files or on entire subdirectories. The basic operations are Catalog, Copy, Lock, Unlock, De-

lete, Verify, Rename, Wipe (it zeros all disk blocks the file uses), Sort Directory, Change File Date, Create Directory, and Show Volume Names.

One of Cat Doctor's strong features is that it can display a tree diagram that shows how the various subdirectories on a disk are interconnected; you can then move to a subdirectory of interest by positioning the cursor over its name and pressing Return.

The Copy module is for making copies of entire disk volumes. A unique feature of Copy is that it copies between disk volumes of different sizes, provided the destination volume is the larger one. This ability is useful for quickly copying all the files on a disk to a RAMdisk, for example.

ProSel also sports a deluxe diskzap program called Block Warden for reading, writing, and editing individual blocks on a disk volume. Block Warden understands many advanced commands, including one for disassembling the contents of a block and another for directing it to display, in order, the contents of the blocks a particular file uses.

Another ProSel utility I find par-



ticularly useful, now that my tenmegabyte hard disk is almost full, is Find File. It scans a disk volume, looking for a file whose name you've provided. When it finds a match, you can either display the file in hexadecimal form or as lines of text (if it's a text file), run it (if it's a system file or an Applesoft program), or continue searching for another file with the same name in another directory.

And there's more-much, much more. Mr. Fixit is a disaster-recovery tool for fixing damaged directories. Even if you manage to destroy your entire volume directory, Mr. Fixit can usually rebuild it, at least enough to let you use all files stored in subdirectories. Beach Comber effectively speeds up disk activity by restructuring the disk so that directories are packed together and files occupy contiguous blocks. Backup is for quickly making archival backup copies of disk volumes, and Restore is for transferring backups back to the original volumes.

At \$40, ProSel is truly a bargain, but don't rush down to your software store to buy it. It is available only by mail from Glen Bredon, the Rutgers mathematics professor who wrote it (521 State Road, Princeton, NJ 08540; [609] 924-5976). It runs on an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 64K of RAM. For technical support, you leave messages for Bredon on the CompuServe information service. Copy II Plus

tected software. It continues to provide that function, but it additionally offers a more traditional set of disk utilities.

Longtime users of Apple II software will think they've been transported back to 1979 when they boot up Copy II Plus, because screen messages and menus appear in all uppercase text on the 40-column screen. But fear not, the program is far better than its ancient user interface implies.

The major commands in Copy II Plus are Copy (files or volume), Catalog, Delete, Lock/Unlock, Rename, Alphabetize Catalog, Format, Verify, View Files, Disk Map (shows block usage on a 51/4-inch disk), Undelete Files, and Create Subdirectory. Like ProSel's Cat Doctor, it shows a directory tree diagram when you select a file operation; it lets you move to any directory without typing a complete pathname.

Three features of Copy II Plus distinguish it from similar programs. One is that it works with both ProDOS- and DOS 3.3-formatted disks. In fact, you can even copy files from one type of disk to



another-Copy II Plus automatically takes care of making all necessary conversions.

Another unique feature of Copy II Plus is that it lets you specify the order in which files are to be copied. This provision is especially convenient if you're attempting to arrange files in logical groups in a directory. Most file-copying programs copy files only in the order in which they appear in the source directory.

Yet another special feature is the ability to copy a smaller disk to an image file on a larger disk. After making this copy, you can make multiple copies of the smaller disk by repeatedly copying the image file to blank disks.

Diversi-COPY

Diversi-COPY has one goal in life: to make copies of entire disks as quickly as possible. Much to the delight of single-drive users (especially 800K-drive users), it has achieved this goal.

The problem with most diskcopying programs is that they require multiple passes to make a copy because they can't get at enough RAM memory to hold an entire disk, meaning that you must insert and eject disks several times during the copying process. Diversi-COPY is able to use all memory in the computer, even expansion memory that other programs ignore (such as extended memory in the IIGS or multiple auxiliary memory banks and memory in I/O slots in the IIe). So if you have a IIe with a RamWorks card with plenty of memory, or a GS with a one-megabyte OctoRAM, for example, you can copy an entire 800K disk in just

memory once and then keep copying the memory image to blank disks until you are done—a wonderful alternative to buying a multithousand-dollar disk-duplicating machine.

MouseFiler

MouseFiler is unique to the group of utilities I'm presenting here, in that it uses a Macintoshstyle pull-down-menu and window interface. This interface uses the 80-column text screen for maximum speed. If you're a mouse user who delights in pointing and clicking, then MouseFiler will be your favorite disk utility.

MouseFiler performs the standard functions you might expect: renaming, deleting, and copying files; formatting, copying, and renaming disk volumes. It can also compare two files or disks to see if they are the same, a useful feature if you need to verify that you've updated a certain file or disk.



An attractive feature of Mouse-Filer is the ease with which it lets you move through the directories on a disk volume. To catalog a disk, you simply double-click on the volume name. To see what's in lower-level subdirectories, you keep double-clicking on the subdirectory names in the path. At any time, you can move back up to the previous subdirectory level by clicking in the close box of the window in which the directory appears.

MouseFiler uses a Clipboard to facilitate the copying of files. To copy a group of files, you first highlight their names by dragging the mouse across them and then select the Copy item from the File menu. Finally, you highlight the name of the destination subdirectory or disk and select the Paste item from the File menu. Very slick. As with the other file-copying utilities mentioned above, you can copy entire directories at once.



inch at the lowest level and displays sector overhead data as well as the actual file data. This overhead data encapsulates each data block on disk and serves to frame and identify the block properly. TRAX automatically flags unusual patterns, enabling you to isolate problems easily.

The INIT module can format individual tracks on a 5¼-inch disk, which is useful if your disk drive can't read a particular sector in a track. By using INIT, you can reformat the track (usually enabling access to the bad block) and restore the data in the other blocks of the track. You can then try to reconstruct the bad block by using the ZAP module. This module is a general utility for reading, writing, and editing individual blocks on a disk.

The fourth module, and probably the most useful, is Fixcat. It is for recovering DOS 3.3 catalogs or ProDOS directories that you may have totally or partially lost on your medium. It is powerful and can often recover a directory without any user intervention.


Bag of Tricks comes with a comprehensive 158-page book that explains how to use each module. It also includes a useful tutorial on how to approach a typical disk-recovery session.

Honorable Mentions

Universal File Conversion. With this program you can transfer files from one Apple operating system to another. The operating systems with which it works are ProDOS, DOS 3.3, Apple Pascal, and Apple CP/M. If you're just using ProDOS and DOS 3.3, you can simply use Copy II Plus instead, but if Pascal or CP/M disks frequent your drives, by all means consider Universal File Conversion.

Universal File Conversion is a product of Quality Software, 21610 Lassen Street, #7, Chatsworth, CA 91311; (818) 709-1721. It works



with an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 64K of RAM and costs \$34.95.

Diversi-CACHE. This program doesn't perform disk- or file-maintenance operations, but it deserves recognition nevertheless. Diversi-CACHE is a caching program for the Apple IIGS with an Apple 3.5 Drive. It speeds up 3.5-inch disk operations by copying disk data blocks to RAM when the operating system first reads them. The second time the operating system requests the block, it bypasses disk access and takes the data directly (and more quickly) from where it was cached in memory. The advantage of using a cache over utilizing a RAMdisk is that you don't have to transfer your files to RAM at the beginning of a session or save changed files back to disk at the end of a session.

Diversi-CACHE installs itself as a Classic Desk Accessory, and the cache size is changeable. One of Diversi-CACHE's wonderful features is that it survives a hard reset (Control/open-apple/Reset), which most RAM-based CDAs do not.

Diversi-CACHE comes from Diversified Software Research, Inc., 34880 Bunker Hill, Farmington, MI 48018-2728; (313) 553-9460. It runs on an Apple IIGS with 512K of RAM and costs \$35.



n the early 1980s, DB Master dominated the database category of the Apple II best-seller charts. This product eventually died because of lack of marketing and technical support and because of competition from a new generation of database products such as PFS:File; Quick File; and, preeminently, AppleWorks.

The new database products were optimized for personal productivity rather than hard-core data processing. Purists, who found AppleWorks disgustingly easy to use, complained that it wasn't a database program at all, but simply a

"file manager."

If so, the market for file managers turned out to be pretty brisk.

Actually, you hear less of this sort of talk than you used to, primarily because cheap memory and enhancements by Applied Engineering and Apple Computer have made the AppleWorks database module much more powerful than it was when first introduced. The influential and reliable technical newsletter Open-Apple wrote last March that AppleWorks "sorts and retrieves data fast enough to make mainframes blush."

So why use anything else? Well, despite its very high performance, AppleWorks is missing, by design, many of the features a mainframe data-processing manager would expect to find, such as indexing, multiple field attributes, merge/ purge, and essentially unlimited

reporting options.

Nevertheless, many Apple II owners use the AppleWorks database module as a stand-alone program to manage large and complex bodies of information, finding that its speed, power, and convenience allow them to work around missing features. But the fact remains that AppleWorks is better used as a personal productivity tool—a file manager, if you will—than as a professional data-processing tool for such things as payroll, invoicing, and inventory control.


With this frame of reference in mind, here are my picks for the database All-Stars.

DB Master

The original developer of DB Master has obtained the marketing rights to the product and has substantially revised it. The new Pro-DOS-based product is called DB

Master Version Five.

In a refreshing display of candor, Stone Edge Technologies (the successor company to StoneWare) shipped a version of DB Master for several months that was admittedly unfinished and labeled "pre-release." (The final version became



available shortly after this article went to press.) DB Master is most suitable for previous owners of DB Master or others who are experienced in the ways of complex database programs (such as Ashton-Tate's dBase).

Even the prerelease version has some significant advantages over AppleWorks. DB Master allows up to 200 fields per record, compared to 30 in AppleWorks, and permits up to 250 characters per field, compared to about 70 characters in AppleWorks. To handle all of these fields and characters, DB Master allows up to 30 screens per record. In addition, a single DB Master file can be as much as ten megabytes in size on a hard disk, whereas AppleWorks runs out of steam at about 6 megabytes.

The DB Master report generator is better than AppleWorks for creating, or filling in, forms. Unlike the AppleWorks labels-style report format, DB Master is not limited to 15 lines (2½ inches) and can print out invoices, bills of lading, and similar forms up to four pages in length when you have 60 lines to a page.

In AppleWorks, you have to worry about only three different types of fields: date, time, and everything else—and you worry about them only to the extent that you type date or time in the appropriate field names and omit those words from all other field, or "category," names.



DB Master, by contrast, has 13 field types. Depending on your attitude, this variety is either a curse or a blessing. You need to specify which of these types you want, as you name the categories in your database file. The program has three kinds of date fields alone, including two that the computer automatically fills in.

You can have DB Master date and time fields calculate days and hours elapsed between two events. This important function is not easily available in AppleWorks. In addition, all of DB Master's math functions are present in the database as well as in the report generator, so you can enter a formula into a field that automatically calculates a value

I have to say, however, that if you are used to AppleWorks and want to switch over to DB Master, you'll find the experience like going to the garage to start your car in the morning and finding instead a small plane parked there with an instruction manual in the cockpit. To be sure, the Piper can fly over buildings, which your car cannot, but even after you learn how to do it, you will find that the plane is hard to park and that it's simply not suitable for most routine trips.

The standard version of DB Master costs \$179, and the prerelease of DB Master Version Five Professional (with relational capabilities) sells for \$295. Far greater than its retail cost will be the time cost of learning and using it, however, so you should be positive that you need its advanced features before abandoning AppleWorks.

In the prerelease version I reviewed, DB Master offers only partial file-transfer capabilities. You can convert only old DB Master files to Version Five, print Version Five files to disk, and then read them into AppleWorks. The publisher says, however, that the final version lets you import AppleWorks database files as well as export DIF and ASCII files.



ProFILER 3.0

An alternative database program that combines some of the best of both AppleWorks and DB Master is ProFILER 3.0 from Pinpoint Publishing. Like all of Pinpoint's programs, this one has an exceptionally good user interface. It is very Mac-like in appearance, but, in recognition of the small mouse population in the Apple II world, it is also convenient to use with just the keyboard.

ProFILER reads from and writes to AppleWorks files, albeit a little clumsily. This feature could be available without the necessity of pathname typing, but at least it's present.

ProFILER is able to handle 65,000 records, Pinpoint Publishing claims, each record with up to 250 fields. In this respect, the product is in the DB Master class. On the other hand, you can modify ProFILER databases at will, adding or deleting new categories without risking data loss, an AppleWorks feature that ProFILER's manufacturer wisely imitated.



ProFILER has a useful searchand-replace command, something you'll find in the AppleWorks word-processing module but not in the database module. One Apple-Works feature missing from Pro-FILER is multiple record layout. In ProFILER, you can view only one record at a time. Mail merge, a vitally necessary business function, is available now in both Apple-Works and DB Master but missing from ProFILER. You use Apple-Writer II to produce form letters with ProFILER.

The AppleWorks database module handles about 5000 records,

provided you have enough RAM. With Applied Engineering's software patch, you can have about 15,000 records, again provided you have enough RAM. If size is the only AppleWorks limitation that concerns you, ProFILER may be an excellent alternative for you, since it can import your already overgrown files and let you make them even bigger. ProFILER does not give you the sheer control over your data that you get from DB Master, however. The trade-off here is between number of features and simplicity of use. ProFILER is attractively priced at \$129.

To integrate some additional features with ProFILER, you can add Pinpoint's popular desk accessories, providing pop-up access to a calculator, notepad, and other handy tools.

ProFILER is from Pinpoint Publishing, 5865 Doyle Street #112, Emeryville, CA 94608; (800) 633-2252; in CA (415) 654-3050. It runs on an Apple IIe (enhanced), IIc, or IIGs with 128K of RAM.

Integrated Programs

Two programs that compete not only with the AppleWorks data-



base module but also with its wordprocessing and spreadsheet modules are DoReMe and Foundation. Of the two, I find DoReMe easier to use, but the program is, unfortunately, DOS 3.3-based. This factor disqualifies it, in my view, from consideration as a high-powered database. A ProDOS version is supposed to be under development, and it may emerge as a major AppleWorks competitor, as Do-ReMe seems to contain an excellent blend of power and ease of use.

Two other DOS 3.3 database programs that should be revised to run under ProDOS are Bank Street Filer, a well-designed, easy-to-use file manager, and 9 to 5, a more ambitious program that includes most AppleWorks features as well as some things missing from AppleWorks, such as the ability to do date math.

Foundation. Foundation is a powerful integrated program that runs under a proprietary operating system, GigaDOS. Despite this peculiarity, Foundation can read AppleWorks directly and print ProDOS text files to disk. One of the first things you notice about Foundation is its rapid disk-access time, a consequence of its unique operating system.

The next thing you realize is that Foundation is difficult to learn how to use and, I suspect, difficult to remember how to use. In appearance, it is something like Lotus' Symphony, which most people find bewildering if they don't use it constantly.

The Foundation database is relational, however-something that no other Apple II program can claim. DB Master Professional, when finished, is supposed to have relational capability, but whenever the final version is ready, all the other programs mentioned in this article may well also have additional enhancements. As it exists at this writing, Foundation is more powerful than DB Master. A Foundation database file can poll other database files and automatically load data from them. You can also "re-

late" or link data in a Foundation spreadsheet document to a Foundation database.

Foundation is impressive. The only major AppleWorks feature that it is obviously missing is the ability to view multiple records on the screen. Like most database programs, Foundation prints a report



to screen instead. A Foundation database is harder to modify than one you've created in AppleWorks or ProFILER, although you can create a new database with fields you forgot to include the first time and then move the old data into it.

You can use the Foundation database to construct a full-scale accounting, general-ledger, and payroll program. You can link your checkbook file to an accounts-payable database so that when you enter a check, the accounts-payable file is automatically posted. In fact, you can use Foundation for almost any data-processing application you are clever enough to know how to do.

Foundation is a product of Foundation Corporation, 506 West Armitage, Chicago, IL 60614; (312) 880-5761. It runs on an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM and costs \$300.

AppleWorks

Foundation will not replace AppleWorks as the most popular personal productivity tool for the Apple II. AppleWorks has more features than most people use, and Foundation has more features than AppleWorks, with a corresponding price tag in complexity. The installed base of AppleWorks users is many times greater than that of all the other programs I've mentioned here combined. Many people are pushing its database module to its limits and beyond, and it is a good idea to talk to some AppleWorks experts—every users' group has dozens—before concluding that the program won't do what you want it to. In addition to soliciting lots of free advice, you might also consider paying somebody to set up an AppleWorks system for you.

AppleWorks comes from Apple Computer, Inc., 20525 Mariani Avenue, Cupertino, CA 95014; (408) 996-1010. It requires an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGs with 128K of RAM and costs \$249.

Honorable Mention

Notes•n•Files. An honorable mention of interest to GS users is Notes •n•Files from DataPak Software. With it you can create simple fixed-form mailing-list databases to which you can attach short notes or messages. Although you can't refer to is as a full-featured database manager, Notes•n•Files satisifes a common database need—keeping track of names and addresses—very well. It uses the standard desktop interface and clever icons (a photocopy machine to represent



printing and a filing cabinet to represent a database, for example), meaning it is easy—and even fun—to operate.

Notes•n•Files comes from Data-Pak Software, 14011 Ventura Blvd. #507, Sherman Oaks, CA 91423; (818) 905-2201. It runs on an Apple IIGS with 512K of RAM and costs \$129.95.



he best of the best home financial software packages help you balance your checkbook, budget family expenses, and prepare your records for tax time. They require almost no knowledge of, or aptitude for, accounting. This approach is good, because if you have such knowledge or aptitude, you can balance your checkbook on the back of your bank statement, and you probably even keep a running balance after you write checks or mug the automatic-teller machine in the small hours of the night.

A good home financial package, in my view, is one that helps people who would otherwise be calling the bank all the time to find out how much money they had and, what is worse, taking the bank's word for it.

I don't know about your bank, but mine has been making so many multimillion-dollar loans to governments in Latin America that I make tellers show me two pieces of identification before they cash a

check. Dealing with banks is never a day at the beach, and your Apple, used correctly, is a potent self-defense weapon.

Since you can handle the basics of home finance rather easily with AppleWorks, with its unrivaled speed, why look elsewhere? Well, personally, I don't. But I spend four or five hours daily working with AppleWorks, so I'd rather use it for almost everything else than learn new software.

Building the database and spreadsheet files that turn Apple-Works into a home finance machine requires more than a beginner's knowledge of the program, however. Also, the data-entry job, which tends to involve the least computer-literate members of the family, is less intuitive with AppleWorks than in either Quicken or On Balance, my choices for the best products in the personal-finance category.

Checkbook-balancing programs sell well because people seek relief from a nasty job. Paradoxically, however, the first thing you have to do after buying one is a lot of work. Since all computerized home-finance solutions require heavy-duty data entry, you might want to think that aspect over before you buy one. And since the chances are excellent—I would say overwhelming-that you'll someday want that hard-won data available for use in another computer program, think long and hard before you buy a program that has no data pathway out of it. Both On Balance and Quicken offer just such an exit, as does Dollars and Sense, my choice for runner-up.

Almost all home accounting programs use checks that you can order specially for printing on your computer, but many more people buy home accounting packages than actually go to the next step of ordering checks. It's sort of like memberships in a physical-fitness club: If everybody who paid to join actually exercised, you'd have human gridlock in the showers, but that doesn't seem to happen. Inci-

dentally, you can also print checks from the AppleWorks database by using a labels-style report, if you're so inclined, but if you want to print out the check amount twice, the way banks seem to like, you'll have to type it in twice, in two separate categories. Both Quicken and On Balance automatically use your single amount entry to fill out both blanks on the check.

The real advantage to printing out checks with your computer is that it guarantees that you'll get the same information in your computer that appears on your check. Granted, it's hard to do in a bar or a grocery checkout line, but it's a pretty groovy way to pay bills at the end of the month.

Quicken

In Quicken, you enter a check by filling in a blank that looks just like a check, and, to fill out the check register, you type into a blank that looks just like a check register.

Quicken provides helpful prompts and data-entry shortcuts



that are simply missing from the general-purpose AppleWorks. For example, after you enter check number 1001, these programs automatically supply check number 1002 in the next record, on the reasonable assumption that check 1002 is what comes next. Now, that's not always the way things work at our house, since my wife and I don't always agree on whether to add new checks from the top or the bottom of the stack, but it's a reasonable and helpful guess from the computer just the same.

Quicken also keeps a running balance for you every time you enter a check and it has a feature called Memorize and Recall that works sort of like AppleWorks




standard values, only more so. You can use it, for example, to automatically code all checks to Alpha-Beta as Food. Used thoughtfully, Memorize and Recall can simplify data entry.

Of the best programs, Quicken may be the easiest to use. It follows the AppleWorks file-folder interface closely, and, if you know how to fill out a check, you pretty well know how to use Quicken. Quicken saves to disk after each entry, which I found a bit overprotective, notwithstanding the megabytes I've lost in my time through forgetting to save. If you insist on being a Real Man, the manual tells you how to set up an auto-load utility with a short BASIC program that cons Quicken into saving to your RAMdisk, where you can lose your data all at once.

Quicken is a product of Intuit, 540 University Avenue, Palo Alto, CA 94301; (800) 624-8742; in CA (800) 468-8481. It runs on an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS; requires 128K of RAM; and retails for \$49.

On Balance

On Balance, like Quicken, has automatic check numbering. Another helpful feature in On Balance that Quicken lacks is in the Account category. If you enter food in the account memo, the next time you type in an F, the program automatically fills out food. On the other hand, if you make out a check to Disneyland and put fun in the memo, the program will look for Fo or Fu before completing the word. Quicken's Memorize and Recall feature can do the same thing, but



it is not automatic.

Both On Balance and Quicken offer a utility for exporting data to AppleWorks. You need to create an AppleWorks spreadsheet, as directed, and then run the utility.


On balance, I like On Balance better than Quicken. It has a mouse-based interface but also works intuitively with the arrow and Return keys if you don't have a mouse, and it reports information in both statistical and bar-graph form, a happy feature you won't find in Quicken.

Both Quicken and On Balance have only a limited ability to classify records for taxes or expense statements. You can look at only a single classification at a time. If simplicity is what you're looking for, however, a simple "taxable" non-taxable" code on each check entry might be all you need.

On Balance is from Brøderbund Software, 17 Paul Drive, San Rafael, CA 94903; (415) 492-3200 or (415) 492-3500. The \$99.95 product runs on an Apple IIe with an Extended 80-Column Card, IIc, or IIGS and requires 128K of RAM.

Dollars and Sense

If you really think you need more features than you can find in On Balance or Quicken, or Apple-



Works, you should probably look at Dollars and Sense, the runner-up in this category. It comes from Monogram, 367 Van Ness Way, Torrance, CA 90501; (213) 533-5120; sells for \$119.95; and requires an Apple II Plus with 48K of RAM or an Apple IIe, IIc, or IIGS with 128K of RAM.

Although not really Apple-Works-like, Dollars and Sense is internally consistent with concise on-screen documentation. Enter-

ing data is reasonably easy, and the program automates data entry of check numbers and dates. On the other hand, if you want to put something other than a check number in the Check # category, (such as "other"), you won't be able to. More restrictive than this limitation is the requirement to modify the preexisting chart of accounts, or use it as is, before you can categorize your checks. In AppleWorks, you can put down any old thing and then standardize



later with the open-apple/Ditto

Like a real CPA, Dollars and Sense doesn't stand for any of that

Dollars and Sense doesn't have a direct AppleWorks export utility, but it does permit saving data to a

DIF file. This method is actually better, in many ways, than the approach of the Quicken and On Balance utilities because it allows immediate access to the AppleWorks database module, as well as to the AppleWorks spreadsheet module, VisiCalc, SuperCalc3a, or anywhere DIF is spoken.

If you accidentally use the wrong data disk in Dollars and Sense, you can kiss your old data good-bye, because Dollars and Sense will format it out of existence. In this respect, Dollars and Sense is true to its MS-DOS antecedents. Apart from that bit of gratuitous violence, Dollars and Sense seems to have made a more successful adaptation to the world of Apples and ProDOS than most of its competitors have.

But Quicken and On Balance are far more convenient and more forgiving about errors.

What these programs are superbly good at is balancing your checkbook. This allegedly trivial function is occasionally ridiculed, but it seems to me that any program worth its salt should be able to do it easily and without complaint before graduating to more exotic functions. Don't forget that the same MBAs who sneer at using a computer to balance your checkbook are the ones who worked for my bank when it was making dumb loans to failing farmers, useless supertankers, and third-world gangster governments.

On Balance has an inspired tag line-"for the money side of life"—which suggests, correctly, that it is the perfect program for users who don't want to make a career out of waiting for programs to load, learning to use alien commands, and agonizing over a quarter of a point of lost T-Bill interest. Quicken is a close second. If you need more horsepower, Dollars and Sense is a decent bet, and you should also look at honest-to-goodness accounting programs, discussed elsewhere in this issue, such as Manzanita Software's Business Works.

Finally, when all else fails, AppleWorks.





ome with me on a walk down Random Access Memory lane.

A decade of spreadsheets and databases and word-processing programs has taken Apple personal computers from one garage in Silicon Valley to millions of homes around the world. In those ten years, Apple computer owners have recalculated millions of cells, searched countless fields and spell-checked innumerable text files.

And they've booted up lots of games.

Although VisiCalc is recognized widely as the business application that put Apples on desks, application software didn't do it alone. More than a few Apples were picked because their owners were transfixed by Bill Budge's Raster Blaster (BudgeCo), intrigued by Scott Adams' Adventureland (Adventure International), or taken to joystick-driven distraction by Olaf Lubeck's Apple Panic (Brøderbund).

Almost as soon as there was an Apple computer, there were Apple-computer games.
Breakout, Hammurabi, Hunt the Wumpus—as much fun as those first titles happened to be, they became primitive relics compared.

to Microsoft Decathlon or Space Eggs (Sirius).

Perpetually on the razor's edge of programming virtuosity, the creators of Apple II games have shown that you can teach an old computer new tricks. If the catchphrase "Apple II Forever" remains one of the few constants in the randomized universe of microcomputer technology, it is partly because game programmers have been among those pioneers always uncovering new capabilities in the Apple hardware.


Choosing a handful of All-Star games from the thousands that have been published was no easy task. To narrow the field, I disqualified games that were no longer in print. They unfortunately included many arcade classics, such as the unsurpassed line of Sirius Software games such as Nasir Gebelli's Gorgon and Mark Turmell's Beer Run.

Then I faced the hard work of narrowing the field. Traveling through those software shelves from floppy disk to floppy disk became a sentimental journey. Replaying a familiar game recalled the excitement I'd experienced when the program was released and provided a reminder of the astonishment I felt when I realized an Apple II computer could do that!

After several hours of sniffling, wistful smiles, renewed acquaintances, and uncontrolled swearing (some games are killers no matter how much you have played them), this list emerged. It's subjective and opinionated and doubtless omits some programs that I really intended to include. But no matter—here they are: the A + All-Stars of Entertainment.

ADVENTURE GAMES

Zork I-III. Text adventuring began underground with Crowther and Woods' Adventure (also known as Colossal Cave), but it was the Great Underground Empire of Marc Blank and Dave Lebling that pointed the genre toward the future. Cleverly conceived and written, the Zork adventures are as timeless



as Grimm's fairy tales, and solving them is like winning the Triple Crown of adventure.

The Zork Trilogy comes from Infocom, 125 Cambridge Park Road, Cambridge, MA 02140; (617) 492-6000 or (800) 262-6868 (mail-order department). The games run on an Apple II Plus, IIe, IIc, or IIGs with 48K of RAM and cost \$69.95 each. **Suspended.** The conceit of text adventuring is that the player can control his universe from a keyboard. Most games just take it for granted. Michael Berlyn's Suspended was one of the first text ad-




ventures to offer an explanation. You are an intelligence directing the life-support system of a planet, but something has gone seriously wrong, and people are dying on the surface. Only you can guide a group of robots toward the solu-



tion. Since you are pure mindstuff, the robots act as your eyes and hands and report back to you through a computer system. Neat, huh? Suspended sets up a dramatic situation so potent that you become completely, believably involved in the plot.

Then Roberta Williams decided to do something about it. She added pictures of each location and in-



vented the graphic adventure. Although her later projects (such as the monumental Time Zone) were larger and more complex, The Wizard and the Princess is the most delightful (and manageable) of Williams' early creations.

The Wizard and the Princess is from ShareData, 7400 West Detroit Street, Suite 170, Chandler, AZ 85226; (602) 961-7519. It runs on an Apple II Plus, IIe, or IIc with 64K of RAM and costs \$7.99.

King's Quest I-III. After adding graphics to adventures, Williams decided to add animation. The result was King's Quest, the first fully animated, joystick-controlled graphic adventure. Two sequels followed. Although moving a Little Man through numerous loca-



tions is more time-consuming than typing GO DOOR, the result is charming and challenging.

King's Quest I and II (III scheduled first quarter 1988) are products of Sierra On-Line, Inc., P.O. Box 485, Coarsegold, CA 93614; (209) 683-6858. FANTASY/ROLE PLAYING

Ultima I-IV. Richard Garriott, aka Lord British, was an Apple-game trailblazer with Akalabeth, a hit in the days when software hung in plastic bags on computer-store walls. The basic design concepts of that program-tile graphics, monster combat, point-of-view dungeon exploration—grew into Ultima, one of the longest-running series in computer-game history. Epic in scope and fascinating in detail, the Ultimas games are essen-



tial to any software library.

Ultima I, III, and IV come from Origin Systems, 340 Harvey Road, Manchester, NH 03103; (603) 644-3360. Wizardry I-III. Robert Woodhead and Andrew Greenberg stole sleep from Apple-computer owners with Wizardry: Proving Grounds of the Mad Overlord. Somehow, Woodhead and Greenberg had given their computerized characters the illusion of life. Players stayed up nights getting to know and love their party members. And as two sequels followed, they took their best characters with them. No other role-playing game has



matched the personality or the deliciously devilish wit of the Wizardry series.

Wizardry I-III come from Sir-Tech Software, P.O. Box 245, Ogdensburg, NY 13669; (315) 393-6633. They run on an Apple II Plus,



IIe, IIc, or IIGs with 48K of RAM. Wizardry I costs \$49.95, II is \$34.95, and III is \$39.95.

The Bard's Tale I and II. Hackand-slash role playing meets graphic grandeur in Michael Cranford and Brian Fargo's Bard's Tale games. Although not as epic as Ultima or as inventive as Wizardry, BT I and II hypnotize the senses with stunning animated visuals. Just roaming down the scrolling streets of Skara Brae is a thrilling experience. Add the stunning graphics and sound of Bard's Tale I




on the Apple IIGs and encountering a party of monsters becomes melee madness.


LASER 128EX Plenty of Power for the Price

pple II-compatible computers are easy enough to build, but difficult to clone legally. In addition to the copyrighted firmware embedded in ROM, certain features of the color video circuitry and disk drive controller are protected by patent. Along with endless rounds of litigation, Apple II clones have also been plagued by software incompatibility and consumer resistance. (Apple owners may gripe about the company, but they're a loyal bunch.)

The greatest market advantage for the clones has been low price. The original Laser 128—built by Video Technology and sold primarily by Central Point Software—cost about half the price of a comparably equipped IIc or IIe. The redesigned Laser 128EX adds important features, for only a small price increase.

The Box

The most visible difference in the 128EX is the plastic case. The original 128 was a utilitarian box molded in battleship gray. Some would call it ugly, compared to the sleek, stylish lines of the IIc. The new Laser has rounded edges and a bold diagonal treatment of the ventilation slots. Approximately 15 inches wide, 13 inches deep, and three inches thick, the case is noticeably bigger than an Apple IIc, and at 11.7 pounds, the Laser is no laptop. A "carrying handle" is really a tilt support, letting cooling air circulate under the case and positioning the keyboard at a pleasant angle. Like the IIc, the Laser has a separate DC power supply—a heavy little brick on the end of a long cable. It puts out 17 volts at 1.8 amps.

The feel of the Laser's keyboard has been improved with this new model. In addition to a full numeric keypad, there is a row of ten function keys that act as common control-character commands. Since the Open- and Solid-Apple symbols are proprietary to Apple Computer, the Laser has open and solid Triangle keys in the same positions.

Any Port in a Storm

On the back panel are a mouse/joystick port, a parallel "Centronics" printer port, a switch that toggles between standard and Dvorak keyboard layouts, an RGB video port, a composite video output ("phono jack"), an external disk drive port, a modem port, a serial printer port, a power socket and the on/off switch. (See photo on previous page.)

n the left side of case there is a 50-pin slot, just like one of the slots on the motherboard of an Apple II Plus or IIe. The system treats it as Slot 7, and most Apple II series cards—for example a Z-80 card (Microsoft CP/M version 2.23 or higher required), a Sider hard disk, or a memory card such as the AST Sprint Disk or the Applied Engineering Ram-Factor—can be plugged right into it. (The Apple Memory Expansion card reportedly has not worked reliably on the Laser 128.) A snap-on dust cover protects this slot if you are not using it.

Since a card plugged into the side slot sticks out rather precariously, there is some danger of damage—especially if the card is jarred loose while the power is on. For an additional \$50 you can get a Laser Expansion Box, which is a sheet-metal casket that provides two slots (5 and 7) with a separate power supply and a safety interlock switch.

ROM Wasn't Built in a Day

Specifications may be interesting to techies, but what a user wants to know is: "Will it run my software?" With the Laser 128EX, the answer is almost certainly yes. Our evaluation unit had version 4.1 of the Laser ROM, which incorporates all-new boot code (thanks to a legal settlement with Franklin Computer, which claimed ownership of the old one).

The latest ROM is more compatible with software written in compiled BASIC—such as many MECC educational programs—that caused problems on earlier versions. I could not find anything in an extensive software library that would not run on the 128EX, whether DOS 3.3, ProDOS, or funny-DOS. The only exception was the rather quirky VIP Professional spreadsheet, which did not recognize the Laser's expanded memory. The manufacturer has a list of over 700 programs that have been tested for compatibility with the Laser.

Under The Hood

The 128EX offers three new features that greatly enhance its value, compared to a plain Apple IIe, IIc, or the earlier Laser 128.

First, there is a built-in memory expansion card. The standard 128EX will be sold with 128K of RAM, so you will have to add your own chips. (A spokesman for Central Point said the company is currently evaluating the possibility of having machines equipped with 256K, 512K, or 1 Megabyte of dynamic RAM.) The expansion memory (1 mb) can be used for a RAM disk only. There are 32 sockets, in four banks of eight, for type 41256 DRAM chips. The price of these chips



varies from day to day, and from one side of town to the other, but at this writing they were widely advertised for under \$3 each in small quantities. At such prices, it should be possible to add a full megabyte for about \$90. You can open the case by removing nine screws and detaching the keyboard connector cable. On production model 128EX's the metal shield over the RAM board will have a hinged cover to make chip installation a bit easier.

he expanded memory is recognized by Apple-Works version 2.0, which loads everything but the printer drivers into a RAM-disk and uses the rest of the space to extend the desktop.

Central Point's Universal Disk Controller is also built into the 128EX. This makes it possible to plug a low-cost 800K, 3.5-inch drive directly into the external disk drive port. "Low cost" here means about \$175 less than an Apple UniDisk 3.5, which costs close to \$400. Single-sided 400K Mac drives will also work, and you can find them for very low prices as well, since Apple has abandoned them for 800K drives.

Faster than a IIGS

The 128EX has also a built-in accelerator. A roughly equivalent accelerator for the Apple IIe would cost more than \$200 extra. You can select the built-in accelerator either on power-up, or by pressing control-reset or open-Triangle-control-reset while holding down the 2 key (for 2.3 MHz) or the 3 key (for 3.6 MHz). The default option is the normal 1 MHz speed of the 65C02 microprocessor. You can return to subsonic speed by holding down the 1 key during a reset. By comparison, the Apple IIGS runs at 2.8 MHz.

Options, Options

By pressing Control-P-Reset you enter a Port Configuration program that allows you to set the parameters of the serial ports, and also to select fine or coarse scaling for the mouse.

Toggle switches under the ROM trapdoor control the way the computer treats Slots 5 and 7. When Slot 5 is set to "internal," the RAM card is enabled. When Slot 5 is "external," the second slot of the expansion box is enabled instead. When Slot 7 is "internal" the Universal Drive Controller is enabled, and you can plug in a 3.5-inch drive. When Slot 7 is "external" the Laser's side slot is active. Users with an extensive collection of cards and peripherals may be inconvenienced by the need to open the trap door and flip switches from time to time, but most new owners can simply leave the factory settings untouched.

Central Point offers an extensive collection of cables and peripherals for the Laser, including a mouse (\$79), an external 5¼-inch drive (\$150), a 3.5-inch drive (\$225), and a monitor (\$125). At \$25, the RGB cable is a particularly good deal, since it lets you use the computer with IBM-type digital RGB monitors. This gives you crisp 80-column text and sharp, reasonably good color (with occasional glitches in some programs).

By the Book

One thick softcover manual covers both the Laser 128 and the 128EX. The illustrations are small and lacking in detail, but there is a complete set of pin-outs for all the ports and connectors, and a detailed reference section for Microsoft BASIC (which is essentially identical to Applesoft.) The documentation would be improved by addition of an index. Video Technology

entral Point bundles its superb utility program, Copy II Plus, with every Laser it sells. Copy II Plus is overdue for a friendlier, more up-to-date user interface, but it is still indispensable for quickly formatting disks (DOS 3.3 or ProDOS), cataloging volumes, copying files, and backing up protected software. Purchased separately, Copy II Plus lists for \$39.95. (See a more detailed description of Copy II Plus in the disk utilities All-Stars section of this issue.)

The Critic's Wish List

Considering the feast of features offered by the Laser 128EX, it may seem ungenerous to want even more, but it certainly would have been nice to have a built-in clock/calendar. However, both the No-Slot Clock from SMT and the IIc System Clock from Creative Peripherals are compatible with the Laser. Also missing is a 16-pin motherboard game-port connector required by some electronic interface devices. The keyboard feel could still be improved; it isn't nearly as good as the IIe's or the Franklin's. And, finally, it would be reassuring to have a national Laser User Group, well supported by both Video Technology and Central Point. Owners of clones need a lot of technical support to cope with the inevitable compatibility problems, and "official" Apple users groups tend to treat clone owners as second-class citizens (at best).

The Bottom Line

At Central Point's price of \$499, the Laser 128EX is a steal. At the suggested list price of \$579 it is still a remarkable value. It has all the features most school and home users are ever likely to need. Although the sheer number of features may be rather intimidating to a beginner, this is an ideal starter system. I would recommend it for someone who wants to explore the world of Apple II computing but cannot afford the high cost of a fully-equipped IIe. For users who do not yet require the advanced features of a IIGS, the Laser 128EX may be the most cost-effective solution.







RADS

n early 1986 the controller for James A. Cummings, Inc., a Florida construction company, was working on a spreadsheet model for a bid on a \$3 million office complex when he discovered he'd forgotten to include \$254,000 in overhead costs. He had placed the amount into a column of figures, not realizing he'd put it into a cell outside the range specified by his formula. Consequently, the project was underbid by \$254,000, and although the company sued the spreadsheet publisher, arguing that a "latent defect" caused the underbid, the general consensus was that the controller had made a common spreadsheet error. (The suit was eventually dropped.)

Hopefully you'll never make an error of that magnitude, but research has shown that one out of every three business spreadsheets has some kind of error in it, and the sad fact is that all of these errors are preventable. Most happen either because users don't allot time for verification and error checking when creating a spreadsheet, or they simply don't know how to do proper error checking. Let's look at the common errors spreadsheet users make, and how to find and prevent them. Although the examples will all deal with AppleWorks, the

Some simple suggestions for preventing those spreadsheet errors that can shoot your business calculations full of holes

information is valid regardless of what spreadsheet you use.

Keystroke Errors

This has to be the most common type of spreadsheet error there is. Keystroke errors in a word processing document are normally only a minor annoyance; after all, a missing or misspelled word rarely leads to disaster. But a misplaced decimal, mistyped cell reference, or extra zeros can easily cost a business a

lot of money, and the larger the spreadsheet, the more likely it is that keystroke errors will occur.

One way to help prevent this type of error is to use the AppleWorks pointing feature when entering formulas that cover a range of cells. This technique minimizes errors because it provides an alternative to manually keying in formulas. For example, suppose you're totalling a column of figures beginning with cell J5, and ending with cell J14, with the result going in cell J16. With the cursor in J16, enter @SUM(and then move the cursor to cell J5. Next, enter a period (.) to start the range of cells to be summed, then move the cursor down to cell J14 so that the range covers all the cells you want totalled. Finally, press RETURN, enter a) (the closing parenthesis), and press RETURN.

nother way is to add macro capability with a macro addon program such as Super ▲ MacroWorks from Beagle Bros or Key Player from Pinpoint. You can then place your most used formulas in macros and simply use the macro. This saves you keystrokes, and in doing so reduces the chance of making keystroke errors.

Be consistent when building your spreadsheet; go from left to

right, and top to bottom. Many mistakes occur when you get lost or have to move around a lot in the spreadsheet.

Formatting

The way AppleWorks handles values when the layout (open-apple/L) or standard values (openapple/V) commands are used is another source of spreadsheet errors. Using either of these commands, you can set a fixed format for values entered so that from 0 to 7 decimals places are displayed, regardless of how many decimal places are in the numbers entered. What many people forget is that if you enter a number with more decimal places than you have formatted for, AppleWorks will round off and display the number to the number of decimal places specified in the formatting command, but will store and calculate the actual number entered.

et's assume you have a column formatted as a value format, fixed, with the number of decimal places set to zero. If you enter 19.49 in the first cell and 321.77 in the second cell. what is displayed is 19 and 322.

SPREADSHEET STYLE

Whether or not you're using AppleWorks, you'll need to consider the fundamentals of spreadsheet creation when building your own spreadsheets. For further information, here's a book that convers those basics: The Elements of Spreadsheet Style, by John M. Nevison. The book is published by Brady Books/Prentice Hall and costs \$12.95.

When you add them, the actual result will be 19.49 plus 321.77, or 341.26, but what will be displayed is 341. In this instance the difference may seem too small to worry about, and it is. But in a large spreadsheet these small errors between what's actually calculated and what's displayed can quickly mount. Make sure you're aware of how your formatting affects your figures, and that you're getting the results you want.

Standard Order of Operation

When you first learned how to do math problems with more than one type of operation in it (problems that have some combination of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division), you were taught the standard order of operation. This states that, when calculating an equation, exponents are to be calculated first, then multiplication and division, then finally addition and subtraction, with operations of equal precedence peformed in order from left to right. This is the way Applesoft and most other computer languages, as well as most spreadsheets, calculate formulas. For some reason, however, AppleWorks doesn't. Instead, it performs the operations in the order they're entered from left to right, with operations in parentheses being calculated first. This is a source of much confusion to many AppleWorks users.

Suppose you wanted to calculate the formula 20 + 17*4. If you enter this into a cell just as it is, AppleWorks will return an answer of 148. If you add parentheses to make the formula 20+(17*4), the answer changes to 88, the way the rules of arithmetic state it should have been calculated in the first place. Because of this, you need to make sure that any formulas you

enter are calculated in the correct order. If you're unsure, use parentheses to specify the order.

Order of Recalculation

An area that can be confusing to users and create numerous problems is the order of recalculation. The order of recalculation determines whether calculations are done down rows first, then across columns, or across columns and then down rows. The default for AppleWorks is down columns, and then across rows. When setting up your spreadsheet, you must make sure that when cells are dependent on other cells, the cells with the source material are calculated first. For example, if you have formulas in row 1 that are dependent on values in row 5, your order of calculation must be rows first, then col-

You also have to be consistent in creating your spreadsheet. Don't have some sections that require columns to be calculated first, while other sections require rows to be calculated first.

Simultaneous Equations

Simultaneous equations are a real problem for AppleWorks, because it won't calculate them correctly without some help from the user. A good example of a simultaneous equation is a commission policy that dictates that the salesman's commission is a percentage of the net profit of a sale, when the net profit is defined as the gross profit minus the salesman's commission. This is a simultaneous equation because the net profit is dependent on the commission, which in turn is dependent on the net profit. This is quite common in a business where the salesmen are paid straight commission.

he problem with Apple-Works is that it does not properly calculate simultaneous equations automatically. You must manually calculate (open-apple/K) simultaneous equations until the figures no longer change. If you don't, you'll have incorrect answers.

Let's use the commission example to see just how much of a difference this can make. Assume your salesman has monthly sales with a gross profit of \$40,000, and that the commission is ten percent of the net profit. Assuming you enter your formulas first and that you

have the recalculation set to automatic, the first time you enter the gross profit into the spreadsheet you'll get the following result:

Obviously this is incorrect. If you recalculate once using open-apple/K, results will change as follows:

Still incorrect. If you continue to recalculate until the results in cells C4 and C6 no longer change, you will have manually recalculated six times, and finally get the following result:

The only way to prevent errors with simultaneous equations is to either avoid them, which often is just not feasible, or to recognize them and manually recalculate until your figures no longer change. Circular Errors

Circular errors occur when a formula refers to itself either directly or indirectly. For example, if you had the formula +A1+B1*2 in cell A1, you would have a circular error, since the formula in the cell refers to the cell itself. Circular errors cause the results of the formulas to be artificially high, since it increases itself every time you recalculate, which if you have the automatic calculation feature on is every time you enter a number or formula. To see how quickly a mistake of this type can cause you trouble, if you enter the formula above into cell A1, and the number 2 into cell B1, A1 will be 4. If you enter seven additional formulas or numbers into the spreadsheet, the value of cell A1 will have increased to 1020!

Some spreadsheets will warn you if you make a circular error, but AppleWorks will continue on, blissfully unaware that anything unusual has happened. You must be careful and check each formula as it's entered to be sure you've entered it correctly. If you're working and suddenly find a figure that seems to be extremely high, suspect a circular error and check the formula in the cell. Check all the cells referred to in the formula if the formula does not refer to the cell that it's in, since you could have an indirect circular error rather than a direct error. An example of this would be where you have the formula B1*2 in cell A1, and A1+A4 in cell B1. While the formula in cell A1 doesn't refer directly to the cell itself, it does so indirectly because the formula in cell B1 refers to cell A1.

You can't prevent every error, so you need to take steps to catch those that slip by you. The best way is to check your spreadsheet as you go along, not just after it's complete. Check each formula as it's entered, and then as each section of the spreadsheet is finished use the zoom command (open-apple/Z) to view your formulas on the screen. Test your formulas using data for which you either already know the answer (such as historical data) or with data you can easily verify using a calculator or pencil and paper. Alternatively, enter a one (1) for every data entry: This makes checking your calculations relatively easy. You need to do the same thing to the entire spreadsheet once you've finished.

If you're converting from a manual system to a spreadsheet, run the manual system and the spreadsheet concurrently for a few months. All too often a business begins doing its bookkeeping on a spreadsheet without any method of double checking the figures. This is asking for trouble. Using both a manual system and a spreadsheet may create extra work for a while, but it allows you to fine tune your spreadsheet and work out any bugs while you still have a




ou can set column widths and cell formats to catch errors. For example, Apple-Works places pound signs (#) in cells with numeric values that exceed the cell width. You can use this feature to catch numbers that are too large. If you know that no result should be larger than 999, and you have the format set to display numbers to two decimal places, then set the column width at six characters. Any number in that column that exceeds 999.99 will cause the cell to display ######, and alert you to a possi-

Another way to visually catch mistakes is to use a graphics program to graph the results of your spreadsheet, such as Visualizer IIe and IIGS from PBI Software, Inc. or Graphic Edge from Pinpoint. Mistakes can be difficult to find when you're staring at 20 or 30 columns of figures. Graphing helps you to view the overall pattern, making it easier to spot errors. It won't locate the source of any error that may exist; you have to do that yourself. But it does make finding bad data, model flaws, and formula flaws a lot easier.

Finally, make sure that the models your spreadsheet is based on are correct. You can have all the formulas typed in correctly and all the data keyed in correctly, yet if the underlying assumptions are wrong it's all for nothing.

A spreadsheet is a powerful tool, but like any tool, it's only as good as the person who uses it. Make sure when you're designing a spreadsheet, you allot time for error-checking and verification. Don't be someone who doesn't have the time to do it right the first time, but does have time to do it over.

Ten questions to ask about

INSURANCE

For most computer users, the following incident is only a nightmare. You're working on your Apple, figuring the month's budget, when suddenly a power surge hits and, in an instant, everything is destroyed. The printer, the disk drives, the computer itself-all are seriously damaged. Worse, your homeowners' insurance policy doesn't cover damage resulting from power surges.

This nightmare may never happen to you, but the truth is that most standard homeowners' and renters' insurance policies are woefully inadequate. The majority of policies cover losses due to theft, fire, and vandalism but don't cover damage caused by power surges-electrical fluctuations usually caused by brownouts or lightningor accidental damagelosses caused by someone tripping over the power cord, for example. They also generally fail to cover either commercial or user-written software. All that's insured are the disks on which the software is stored.

Whether you're examining your current policy

or searching for a new one, you can't make an informed choice without knowing what questions to ask. Following are ten questions whose answers can help you choose your coverage wisely.

Are Peripherals Covered?

You may be required to supply a list of peripherals—printers, additional disk drives, add-on cards—and their serial numbers if you want them covered. If you don't supply such a list, the policy may cover only the basic unit.

2. Is Commercial Software Covered?

This point is especially crucial if you use your computer for moonlighting or as a supplement to one at work. If you want more than just new, blank media if your programs are destroyed, make sure the policy

states that the programs themselves will be replaced if damaged or destroyed.

3. Is User-Developed Software Covered?

This type of coverage may be difficult to find. For example, both State Farm and Allstate exclude user-developed software in their coverage. Nationwide, however, provides up to \$3000 coverage that includes programs you create. Find out how the company determines what a user-created program is worth. Reimbursement will probably be based on the cost of a similar commercially available program, but settlement may take into account your time and skill in writing the program.

4 Does Coverage Include HomeBased Business Use?

Whether you work

full-time out of a home office or simply moonlight, many companies, such as American Family and Covenant, will not cover a home computer used primarily for business. You need to check the wording of the policy carefully, however, since not every insurance company defines business use in the same manner. American Family doesn't consider that a home computer is being used for business as long as the business is located outside the home. For example, if you're a teacher using your home computer to keep track of students' grades, your computer will be covered. But if you're a free-lance writer working from an office in your home, it won't be covered.

5. What Type of Policy Do I Need?

Some insurance companies, such as Nationwide, include computer coverage in their standard homeowners' policy, but most require a special endorsement. These are specially written and added to your policy, much as are traditional endorsements for additional coverage on items



such as jewelry and furs.

If you use your computer for business and your insurance company is one that doesn't cover a home-based business, one option is to get an inland marine floater. This is a category of insurance originally developed to cover dockside equipment and that later grew to cover such items as goods in transit, construction equipment, and valuable papers. These policies, often referred to as data-processing policies, generally cover all computer hardware; software; the media the software is stored on; and the data, or "valuable papers," stored on your hard or floppy disks. They let you protect against accidental erasure, damage caused by unauthorized access to your system, and employee theft and damage-such coverage does come cheaply, not though. Still, the cost of the insurance is small compared to the cost of losing your system when it's your sole source of income.

You can get endorsements on inland marine policies just as you can on your homeowners' policy. One common endorsement is the 10% endorsement, which pays up to 10% of the value of the policy for software and extra expenses, such as the cost of renting equipment until yours is repaired or replaced. Also covered is the cost of hiring someone to reenter lost data.

You might also want to check out Safeware, an insurance company that handles only computer-related coverage. It offers policies that insure home computers used as either personal or business computers. It doesn't normally cover user-created soft-

ware, but otherwise it offers complete hardware and software coverage.

6. What Type of Coverage Is Available?

Coverage is almost always one of two types: all risk or named peril. Allrisk coverage means that the policy covers damage by any cause except causes specified in the policy. Causes normally not covered include normal wear and tear, illegal acts committed by the policyholder, acts of God, and nuclear war. Named peril is just the opposite. Such a policy doesn't cover damage by any cause unless that cause has been specified in the policy. All risk is the more common of the two, but make sure to ask, and then read your policy after you get it to avoid any unpleasant surprises.

What Is the Annual Premium?

The cost of covering your computer can vary greatly from company to company. For example, Transamerica charges \$1.25 per \$100 worth of coverage, whereas Kemper charges \$1.50 per \$100, and American Family charges \$0.60 per \$100. This type of price comparison isn't as clearcut as it seems, however.

The method insurance companies use in determining the cost of coverage can vary, making it difficult to compare one company's prices with another's. Some companies may charge for every \$1000 or \$3000 worth of coverage, instead of for every \$100. Others don't charge if coverage is under a certain figure. State Farm, for example, does not charge for the first \$3000 worth of coverage. Rates can also vary according to where you live, the type of home you own or rent, the type

of coverage, and the deductible per loss. You'll have to shop carefully to make sure you're getting a good price for the coverage you need.

8 How Much Coverage Can I Get?

As you add cards and peripherals, the value of your system can rapidly increase. You need to be sure that your policy not only covers your needs today but can also cover your needs a year or two from now. State Farm offers a maximum of only \$8000 worth of coverage, whereas American Familv has no maximum coverage. But again, read your policy carefully. American Family's "unlimited" coverage actually does have limits—a maximum of \$500 for any one piece of software, and a maximum of \$1000 on all software. It's the hardware that has no limit on maximum coverage.

9. What Is the Deductible per Loss?

Since the deductible is what you must pay before the insurance company pays, you want the lowest deductible you can get. In general, your deductible is determined by your homeowners' policy. If you have a \$250 deductible on your policy, then you'll have to pay for the first \$250 worth of damage to your computer or software. Some companies have a separate deductible just for their computer endorsement, though. American Family's deductible, for example, is only \$50 per loss, and Kemper has no deductible at all.

10. Is Replacement-Value Coverage Available?

Get insurance that provides full replacement value for the entire system rather than the depreciated value. With a

depreciated-value policy, the insurance company has to pay you only the depreciated value of your system: its book value (what it's actually worth now), less any deductible. With a system that's two or three years old, that can be less than one-third of what it would cost you to replace it. Under a fullreplacement-value policy, the insurance company must pay you the cost of replacing your system with an identical or similar system, less your deductible. Replacementcost coverage is more expensive but worth it.

Once you've chosen the coverage that best fits your needs, you'll need to make an inventory of all your equipment (including add-on cards and peripherals such as a mouse, joysticks, and the like) and software, both commercial and any you've written yourself. Keep all your receipts, since you'll be required to supply proof of ownership, should you ever need to file a claim. Also keep a record of all serial numbers, and pictures of your equipment, if that's possible.

The table accompanying this article describes the coverage eight insurance companies offer. Rates may vary, depending on where you live and what kind of home you rent or own, and are subject to change. Remember, when taking out any insurance policy, to make sure you read and understand it. Insurance can't prevent damage to your computer, but it can make it a lot less painful than it would be otherwise.





MANAGING SPREADSHEET COMPLEXITY

Spreadsheets often begin as simple tables containing a few rows and columns and then grow increasingly complicated as time goes by. I call this phenomenon "spreadsheet creep." A household budget starts off with basic line items for food, rent, utilities, and so forth, and then swells as you realize you'd like to track individual utilities separately or break down your sources of income further.

The situation is even worse with a company budget, where you buy new pieces of equipment, add employees, retire debts, or develop new sources of sales. Somehow, each change in income or expenses—or each change in the way you think about income or expenses-is reflected in the spreadsheet until its rows and columns march across several screens. Scrolling to find specific cells becomes more difficult, and the possibilities for error multiply as the original row and column titles become increasingly distant from your data-entry areas.

AppleWorks spreadsheets are likely to become more complex as

you discover new ways to use them, but complex spreadsheets don't necessarily have to be unwieldy ones. Several strategies can help you keep them under control. **Divide and Conquer**

The best way to prevent or eliminate spreadsheet creep is to break your model down into logical components. Rather than having one huge model for a whole budget, create a series of subordinate models for discrete portions of the budget and then consolidate the bottom line from each subordinate model into a summary model. This strategy has numerous advantages. Small, subordinate models are easier to work with, because you don't have to scroll around as much to view the data they contain. Models that deal with specific aspects of a budget allow you to focus more closely on that particular budget area: You might include line items in a subordinate model that you'd leave out of one big model because of space or complexity considerations, and you'll be more likely to modify subordinate models as your needs change.

In a more powerful spreadsheet program such as Multiplan or SuperCalc 3a, you can consolidate information between models by putting each model into a separate file and then using linking or consolidation commands to transfer the information between files. The AppleWorks spreadsheet module doesn't allow you to link formulas between separate files, but you can use a single spreadsheet file to store all the models you'll need for a particular project. Since all the models will be in the same file. vou'll be able to use cell references to transfer data from the bottom line of each subordinate model to a summary model. And, with some judicious formatting, you'll be able to add to or change any of the models in the file at will without affecting the formatting or calculations of the other models.

As an example, let's look at an annual expense/income report for Acme Manufacturing. The summary budget provides summaries of expenses and income in broad categories such as Rent, Utilities, Salaries, Sales, and so on, as shown in

the summary model in figure 1.

For each of the line items in the summary area, the values have been transferred from subordinate models elsewhere in the file. The row for Rent shows totals from a subordinate spreadsheet that tracks rents for several different Acme locations: the Utilities row shows the totals from a model that shows expenses for electricity, water, gas, garbage, and other services. A summary area like this lets you have a complex financial tracking system without having to work around the complexity each time you want some quick answers. If you want just an overview of total expenses and income, you can find it in one small, convenient area, but if you want to look closely at expenses or income in any particular area, you can view the model that shows those details.

Here are the basic steps for building a spreadsheet that contains a summary area and several subordinates:

Beginning at the upper left corner of a new spreadsheet file, enter the row and column labels for each summarized item in the budget. The area may look like the one in figure 1. You don't need to enter any values into this matrix, because you'll transfer them via cell references from the totals rows of the subordinate areas you'll create later.

Let's assume the summary area occupies a rectangle from cells A1 through P22. Your first instinct in creating subordinate areas might be to place them directly below or directly to the right of the summary area, but doing so will cause problems later. If you place the subordinate areas directly below the summary area, they will occupy the same columns as material in the spreadsheet. If you ever want to add, delete, widen, or narrow a column in any of the subordinate areas or the summary area, that same column will be affected in all the areas below or above it. You would have the same problem if you placed subordinate areas to the right of the summary area, except that the difficulty would arise if you added or deleted rows in any of the areas.

To eliminate this problem, create each subordinate area on a diagonal to the consolidation area. Using this layout (see figure 2), you will be able to insert or delete rows or columns in any of the areas without affecting rows or columns in any other area.

Since you know that the bottom right corner of the summary area is cell P22, you know you can make the next cell on the diagonal, cell O23, the top left corner of the first subordinate area. In this first cell, enter a title for the area that is slightly different from its row label in the summary area. If the first area is for rental expenses, name it "Rental Fees," instead of just "Rent," as it was in the summary area. By using a unique name, you'll be able to use the Find command later to jump quickly to this area.


Enter the row and column labels you need for the first subordinate area; then determine its lower right corner and continue creating subordinate areas on the diagonal until you are finished. Be sure to include a row for totals in each area, as it will be the row whose values you transfer to the summary area

at the top of the file. You can copy some repetitive labels, such as the monthly column labels, from the summary area and place them in the subordinate areas to avoid retyping. (Use the Within Worksheet option after typing the Copy command to highlight the specific cells containing the month labels.)

Once you've entered all the labels for the subordinate areas, you can go through each area and enter the necessary values, after which you can easily transfer the totals from each subordinate area to the summary area. Just note the cell locations of the totals rows in each subordinate area and enter the locations that correspond to the appropriate line item in the summary area. If the Rental Fees totals are in cells S30 through AD30, for example, enter these cell references in cells B4 through M4 (the Rentals expense line) in the summary area.

When you're done entering the cell references to transfer the totals to the summary area, all that remains is to enter Sum formulas to produce the grand totals of expenses and income for the entire budget. When the entire worksheet is done, you'll be able to add, de-


lete, or change figures in any subordinate area and have the changes automatically reflected in the summary. When new expenses within categories crop up, you can add them, or you can add whole new subordinate areas and add extra rows in the summary area to accommodate them.

The AppleWorks spreadsheet contains 127 columns, so you should have room to create about 8 subordinate areas (showing 12 months of data each, plus columns for labels and totals), using the diagonal formatting system. If you run out of columns, you can always double up subordinates beneath each other, since you're far more likely to add or delete rows (containing new expenses or income sources) than columns (which contain expenses by month).

Keeping Your Bearings

Even if you use the consolidation feature above or if your spreadsheets are much less complex, your spreadsheet is still likely to be too large to be appear on the screen all at once. Therefore, as you scroll down or to the right to view offscreen data, you'll lose sight of the row and column titles at the top and left of the model. Without titles to guide you, you'll have a hard time knowing if you're entering data in the proper cell. The simple way around this problem is to use the Fixed Titles command (openapple/T), which lets you fix row and column titles at the edges of the screen no matter how far down or to the right you scroll.

To use the Fixed Titles command, position the cursor in the row below or the column to the right of the titles you want to lock onto the screen, and then type the Fixed Titles command. (If you want to fix both top and left titles, treat them as an L-shaped area and place the cursor at the first cell inside the corner of the *L*.) A prompt will ask whether you want to fix titles at the top, the left side, or both locations on the screen. Choose the option you want and press Return, and the titles will be fixed. When you scroll down the screen, the titles at the top of the screen will remain there; if you scroll to the right, the titles at the left of the



screen will remain there. Although this option is called Fixed Titles, it fixes any group of cells on the screen, whether they contain values or labels.

Fast Moves

Even if you cut down the size of individual models by using the consolidation method, you'll still have to scroll around quite a bit to locate individual cells in different areas. If you know the exact coordinates of the cell to which you want to move, using AppleWorks's Find command is a fast way to get there. Just type open-apple/F, choose the Coordinates option, type the cell's coordinates, and type Return. The cursor will move to that cell. If the Find command's entry line contains text from a previous search, you can use the Control-Y or openapple/Y command to delete it.

If you don't know the coordinates, you probably remember a key word from the title of each subordinate area, and you can use it as the search key when you use the Find command. Even if you use a word such as Rent, and Apple-Works finds the word in the summary area first, you can tell it to find the next occurrence until it locates the label on the area where you want to be.

Finally, you can always use the Ruler command (open apple and a number key from 1 to 9) to move vertically through the spreadsheet. The Ruler moves only through the areas of the spreadsheet where you have entered labels or numbers (so typing open-apple/9 won't move you to row 999, unless you have data in row 999), but it also moves the cursor only up or down in its current column.

If your cursor is in column A, it will move up or down in that column as you use the Ruler command, which may not be too helpful if you use the diagonal format I've described.

Good luck in using these tips and strategies to manage the increasing size and complexity of your AppleWorks spreadsheets.

EASY (SUPER) MACROS

While all you Super MacroWorks users wait for your upgrade to the latest Beagle Bros macro utility, Timeout UltraMacros, here's a set of related word-processing macros to keep you busy.

Three basic macros are included here: one resets tabs, one provides an inside return address and date for a letter, and the other prints an address on an envelope and deletes the file containing the address from the disk. Two other macros call these macros to perform even more complex routines. Once you've mastered these macros, we'll look at how you can further automate things by adding only eight "words" to the beginning of one of them.

You will want to use the recorda-macro feature (open-apple/X) for these experiments. Once you have perfected the macros, you can compile them by using Super Macro-Works' built-in compiler. You'll be using the forced-print macro (solid-apple/P), so if you haven't compiled the macros that came with the program, you will need to enter this macro along with the ones listed here.

Let's begin by creating a macro to change the tab settings to suit them to regular correspondence. When you bring up a fresh screen for a word-processing file, Apple-Works gives you tabs at every fifth position, starting at 6 (11, 16, 21 . . .). To change these settings in a "live" process, first type open-apple/T. You then have the option of setting, clearing, or removing tabs.

To clear all the tab stops, type R for Remove. Then move to column 4 with the right-arrow key, type S, move to column 30 with the right-arrow key, and type S again. Press Escape to go back to the REVIEW/ADD/CHANGE screen. (I know these aren't the settings *The Complete Secretary's Handbook* recommends, but you're using them just for the sake of example.)

Macro T (see figure 1), which you activate by typing solid-apple/

T, achieves the same result as the procedure just described but uses a slightly different method. You can write a macro that mimics the above actions precisely, but keeping track of the exact number of spaces as you move toward column 30 is difficult. Instead, the macro "presses" the Tab key six times to carry the cursor to column 31 and then "types" the left-arrow key to take it back to column 30.

Open-apple/T, R, S, and the Escape "token" (more Beagle Bros jargon—don't let it scare you) in macro T perform just as they would "live." Open-apple/left takes the cursor to column 1, because nothing else is on this line.

The (right) token is for convenience only. In practice, you can replace the three right tokens with three (spc) (space) tokens, or simply three spaces. Open-apple/T, S, and the Escape token set the tab in column 4. Open-apple/left completes the steps for resetting the tabs, and the! lets Super Macro-Works know the macro is finished. The text after the! is a comment.

You can use macro N, after you've used macro T, to set the two special tab positions. The second tab marks the starting column for the return address. All my formal letters start with the return address and date indented to column 30, followed by the inside address and salutation.

Let's take the process further. Macro B calls macros T and N, in that order. The inside address and vertical spacing in a letter usually vary, so attempting to program them in is pointless. You can nevertheless add part of the salutation:

Simply add three (rtn) (Return) tokens, an optional open-apple/Z to keep track of carriage returns, Dear (and a space). Now when you type solid-apple/B, AppleWorks automatically begins your letter. You still need to add the inside address and determine the vertical spacing, though.

The Next Envelope, Please

Printing envelopes is simple with macros such as Ctrl-A and E (see figure 1).

In Super MacroWorks, solid-apple/P prints the current file to the current printer without your having to answer any questions. Macro Ctrl-A calls macro P, which is defined by Super MacroWorks, and then goes through the steps necessary to delete the file it just printed.

Macro E builds on macro Ctrl-A. It automates several steps that occur just after you've typed a letter, printed it, placed an envelope in the printer, and copied the inside address to the Clipboard. First, it types Escape to exit to the main menu and presses Return to take you to the Add Files menu. It then types 3 and Return to select a new word-processing file. AppleWorks then asks for a name, and the macro responds with env, short for en-

velope. Another Return takes you into the new screen.

Next, the macros sets the left and right margins to zero, types the return address, and moves the cursor down nine lines. Finally, it sets the left margin to 4.5 inches, copies in the address on the Clipboard, and invokes macro Ctrl-A to print the envelope.

Load macro E and test it; remember to put the envelope into the printer before you run the macro.

In Your Own Write

Here is something to experiment with after you have macro E working perfectly. Immediately after (awp), insert the following informa-

(OA-C)(right)(rtn)(up)(up) (up)(up)(rtn).

Now load a letter file. Put an envelope into your printer and put the cursor onto the last letter of the last line of the inside address. Type closed-apple/E and watch as AppleWorks copies the address information to the Clipboard and prints the envelope in one step. This method works with addresses of only four lines because the macro has only four (up)s.

If you want to save these macros, you have to compile them. Use the AppleWorks word-processing module to substitute these macros for the ones that came with Super MacroWorks. (See your manual for details on the procedure.) If you want, you can change the identifying character command-just remember to change references to it in other macros.

The Learning **E**Curve

THE COLOR OF COMPUTING

The educational implications of multihued software

The first personal computer I ever bought was a Commodore PET with 8K of RAM. I had some friends who had just gotten original Apple II machines and who thought I had made the wrong

choice because their computer could display color and mine couldn't. In fact, the only features I wanted that the PET didn't have were high-resolution graphics and a decent keyboard. Color didn't matter to me that much, and the quality of the PET's built-in display put the Apple II to shame.

Before getting my PET, I had access to another personal computer, the Alto. This computer was a research machine created at the Xerox Palo Alto Research Center, where I was working at the time. The Alto (which I started using in the mid-70s) was similar in

many respects to the Macintosh Plus, except that it had a larger display. As with the original Macintosh, the Alto also had a monochrome display.

Because I had been so used to working with computers that had no color capability, I didn't get excited about color on personal computers until I saw the color capabilities of the Atari 800 computer.

The Apple II colors didn't impress me at the time, and prior to the release of the Apple IIGS, I never recommended Apple products to people who thought color was important.

Anyone who has used high-resolution color on the Apple II and then worked with computers such as the Apple IIGS or some of the

older "good" color computers (such as the Atari 800) realizes that the Apple II color capabilities leave a lot to be desired. First, the choices are quite limited. Second, if you put one color next to another one, the boundary between the two "bleeds" produces another color altogether, in a phenomenon called dithering.

The poor quality of the original Apple II color can be traced to a trick that allowed Steve Wozniak to provide color capability on a computer with a very small amount of RAM. The high-resolution display of the Apple II accommodates 280 columns of 192 dots, or 53760 dots overall. Each dot corresponds to a bit of data in RAM, and each dot is either on or off.

Suppose that you were a computer designer in the mid-70s and wanted to allow users to make each dot any of four colors. This capability would require two bits of information per pixel or, for the display resolution of the Apple II, 16K of RAM for the display alone. Since RAM was expensive at that time, Wozniak devised a technique that allowed color to appear on this display with only 8K of RAM.

The original Apple II has colors because each adjacent dot lands on a different-colored phosphor on the display screen. For example, even-numbered dots

might appear purple (assuming they appeared in isolation), and odd-numbered dots might appear green. If two adjacent dots are on at the same time, the apparent color will be white.

This method of creating color by using artifacts in the display technology allows the creation of colored images with a fraction of the memory that would be necessary if each pixel were allowed to have several colors. It also produces side effects such as color bleeding and other problems that we have come to associate with the original Apple II. Given the year the II was designed, however, the trade-off turned out to be worth it.

Computers in Education

Some educators and many educational-software developers think that color is quite important. Because of the dominance of Apple II computers in the classroom, software developers have learned to live with the limited color palette of the Apple II and have done the best job they could to bring color to their programs.

Although I agree that color has the power to increase the impact of visual communication, I seriously question the long-term value of color in most educational software. First, you'd never want to teach color discrimination and identification with an Apple IIe. The choice of colors is too limited, and each color monitor displays a given color differently. It is better to explore color topics with printed materials that let all students see the same colors.

I admit that color can make a display more attractive, but in many programs the indiscriminate use of color only ends up detracting from the image. (The exception is when color serves as an attribute in a pattern-recognition or pattern-matching task.) Despite these limitations, most educational-software developers insist on using as much color as they can, as though it were necessary to capture and maintain interest in their programs.

Color as a Gimmick

From my point of view, color is a gimmick that covers up a real defect, the lack of good display resolution. Given the narrow gap between the price of a Macintosh and that of an Apple II, I have to assume that using color in this way is a conscious choice on the designers' part and not the result of any technological limitation.

A child sitting in front of a computer for extended periods of time has to read materials whose resolution is far inferior to that of the printed page. Even the Macintosh screen pales in comparison to the quality of most handouts that teachers run off on mimeo machines. If we believe that student computer use is going to increase over the next few years, we need to start paying more attention to display quality.

Color and the IIGS

The Apple IIGS was Apple's first offering that promised a reasonably priced solution to the display-quality issue. The commercial focus on this computer has not been on resolution, however; it has been on color. The rich palette of the IIGS more than atones for Apple's past sins in this area, but, from the standpoint of educational computing, I'd rather have seen the development energy devoted to the creation of an equally spectacular monochrome display mode.

I keep both a monochrome and a color display connected to my IIGS and find that the monochrome display is far easier on my eyes.



gone wild with the color capabilities of the IIGS rather than focus on the creation of easy-to-read displays. The rationale probably has to do with the high visual impact of a color display in store demonstrations. Color sells, and monochrome is boring. The fact that a display filled with riotous color can tire the eyes over time doesn't occur to purchasers; the dazzle of the display makes the sale.

The Misuse of Color

As an extreme example of this problem, consider the word-processing programs now available for the Apple IIGS. Almost every IIGS word-processing program I have seen lets you create documents in color. Never mind that most people don't have color printers or that our culture has not validated the communicative power of colored text—the software developers have created color word-processing programs because doing so is feasible, not because it is desirable.

This use of color reminds me of many people's first response to word processing on the Macintosh. Because the Mac can handle many different typefaces, many neophyte Mac users feel compelled to use as many different typefaces in a document as they can. The result is so cluttered that the information value of the text is diminished rather than enhanced. Fortunately, most Mac users quickly learn that a document should be limited to a few typefaces and typestyles and that these faces and styles should clarify the communication, not confuse it.

Suppose we all had color printers on our desks. Would the IIGS color word-processing programs help us present clearer messages than their monochrome counterparts? I don't think so. Remember that the communicative value of different typefaces is the result of many centuries of development and refinement. The same cannot be said for color. Typeface quality depends on screen resolution, which adds to my argument that resolution is more important than color.

The Reality of Schools

Here is one last reason for suggesting that color may be oversold as a tool for educational computing. It is a reason that has nothing to do with intrinsic value, with at-



tractiveness, with students' color blindness, or any of the issues I've explored above.

It has to do with money.

In my travels around the country, I get to see hundreds of classrooms. With few exceptions, the computers in these rooms have monochrome displays. Monochrome displays are much less expensive than color monitors, and the reality of school equipment budgets dictates that costs be kept as low as possible.

Therefore, even if computer color were as wonderful an educational tool as some developers think it is, any developers who ignore the reality of today's classroom do so at their own risk. Software that asks students to look at the green triangle is useless on a black-and-white

A Partial Solution

Developers who want to ensure effective use of their software in classrooms should consider the following solution: Programs can ask if you're using a color or a monochrome monitor. Based on the answer, the program's messages can change, and the color-dependent aspects can use a fill pattern or shade as an attribute instead.

I've seen good use of such a technique in some programs. One that comes to mind is Commodore 64 Logo. If you are using a monochrome monitor, the language can operate in a monochrome mode in which the resolution of the graphics effectively doubles. This type of trade-off between resolution and color (which is admittedly easier for computers with dedicated display processors) provides the best of both worlds.

Developers must ask themselves whether they are creating software to show off their talents or to meet the needs of their customers. Sometimes these goals are in conflict. +

THE ANSWER TO SEPTEMBER'S CHALLENGE

Fast execution determines two winners.

This is my last "Computer Calisthenics" column in A + I. It has been an enjoyable two years. I'd like to thank A + I for giving me this space, all of you who read the column and tried the puzzles, and the literally thousands of you who entered the contests. I'm sorry I couldn't award every one of you prizes.

The September challenge asked for a multiple of 7 whose square had eight digits of the form ababbbcc, where a, b, and c were different digits. This puzzle generated more entries than for any other contest since I started this series long ago in *Dr. Dobb's Journal*. I got letters from all over the U.S., Canada, Europe, and the Far East. The ages of entrants ranged from 13 to something in the 80s claimed by one fellow.

Many readers had trouble getting their programs to recognize the correct answer when they made the assumption that the SQR function would provide an integer. A comparison such as IF SQR(A/ 7) = A/7 THEN ... might not work, whereas IF ABS(SQR(A/7) -A/7) > .00001 THEN . . ; does. The problem is that the Apple stores floating-point numbers in binary format, which produces round-off errors. You need either a version of BASIC that uses binary coded decimals (BCD) or a modified comparison such as the preceding.

Of the hundreds of entrants, all but two or three found the correct answer. Most of their programs execute in anywhere from 15 to 60 seconds. A smaller group added a



bit of insight that sped up their programs considerably—theirs run in 8 to 12 seconds. Two very clever programmers made quantum leaps in their algorithms, so I declare two winners this time. George Sandor, of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, submitted an Applesoft BASIC program that runs in less than three seconds.

The only program that came even close to this time was the Applesoft BASIC program of John Everett, of Waynesboro, Virginia. Everett's program is beautiful in its simplicity, shorter, and easier to understand. It runs in less than five seconds.

Where people fell down in trying to solve this puzzle was in trying to generate all the eight-digit numbers and then extracting their digits and comparing. Or else they generated the digits but produced too many. Or they converted to strings to compare digits and then converted back again.

Let's look at Everett's program first. One clever thing he did was notice that a square, any square, whose last two digits were the same, could end in only 00 or 44. Thus, where many entrants generated C from 0 to 9 in their three nested loops, he generated only 0 and 4, reducing the number of loops from 10 to 2. Also, instead of trying to produce the candidate for square by converting to strings and building a new number, he saw that if you have three digits, A, B, and C, the new number is formed by

A * 10100000 + B *1011100 + C * 11

Not only is the SQR operation

inaccurate, but it is also slow on an Apple II. Everett's program calls it only three times. It checks for whether the candidate is a perfect square by taking the square root of the number and seeing if that is an integer. It does so not by an equality, which might fail the comparison, but by checking whether the difference between the actual square root and the INT of that number is less than some tiny number (.00001 in this case).

Here's where the numbers come from in statement 150: 22 is 10100000 MOD 49 (the remainder when the number is divided by 49), 34 is 1011100 MOD 49, and 11 is 11 MOD 49. Statement 160 then checks for whether the number to be generated is evenly divisible by 49—if it is the square of a multiple of 7, that is.

For Sandor's program, I print a listing that traces what it's doing,

together with embedded documentation. Running this program even with that "tracing" in place takes less than five seconds, faster than with any other entry save Everett's. In order to achieve the less-than-3-second run—and print out only the solution—remove statements 180, 190, and 1065. The program requires this additional explanation:

Lines 110–170 find all possible last two digits cc of a square ababbbcc. You need only look for squares of 0 to 25, since all other squares repeat the sequence of last two digits. That is, for any given x, the last two digits in x^2 , $(50 - x)^2$, $(50 + x)^2$, and $(100 - x)^2$ are the same. Here is the proof:

$$(50 - x)^2 = 2500 - 100x^2 + x = 100^2 (25 - x) + x$$

$$(50 + x)^2 = 2500 + 100x^2 + x = 100^2 (25 + x) + x$$

Hence, the last two digits of these squares are the same as the last two digits of x.

In line 1050, because B (= 1011100) leaves a remainder of 6 on division by 7, adding it to any number x reduces the remainder on division by 7 by 1 each time you add B. So, if you add RM * B, you get a remainder of 0 on division by 7. The key to the program is to make one test at a time:

- 1. Divisibility by 7 (statement 1050)
- 2. Divisibility by 49 (statement 1070)
- 3. Being a perfect square (statement 2030)
- 4. Digits *A*, *B*, and *C* being unique (statement 2060)

The "full" program shows each criterion applied in turn.





CATALOG TIPS

One feature of BASIC.SYSTEM/ProDOS that I find quite useful, especially when I have a lot of files in a directory, is the ability to CATALOG the directory by file type. That is, you can tell the system to display only the names of files with a specified type. To do this, add the suffix ,Txxx to the normal CATALOG command, where xxx represents the standard 3-character mnemonic for the file type (BAS, DIR, AWP, TXT, etc.), or the hexadecimal version of the file-type code number itself.

For example, to list all Applesoft programs in the current directory, use the command CATALOG, TBAS. CATALOG can also be followed by a pathname or partial pathname, so you can catalog by file type in any directory without having to change the current prefix first.

APPLEWORKS SHORTCUT

I'll bet most people don't know that you can return to the Apple-Works main menu from anywhere in the program in just two keystrokes: open-apple/Q followed by Esc. (Open-apple/Q is usually for switching between open files.) You can take advantage of this hint to simplify macro commands—no more multiple Esc tokens to guarantee a return to the main menu.

On a related point, if you're just

about to print a document but you want to make a last-minute change, you can quickly return to the document with open-apple/Q followed by Return (the proper filename is always highlighted).

APPLEWORKS IN COLOR

If you have an ImageWriter II and AppleWorks, you can easily print text in color. The key is to add a custom printer to your printer list and replace the Boldface Begin and End codes with ones that enable and disable color printing. You use the standard codes for the other printing features.

Here is the one-time procedure for setting up the color-printer driver:

- 1. Choose Other Activities from the main menu and then choose Specify information about your printer(s).
- 2. Choose Add a printer (maximum of 3) and then Custom printer, name the printer ImageColor (or whatever you like), and access it from slot 1.

When preparing your document, identify a passage to be printed in color just as you would for bold-facing it: Press Control-B (a ^ will appear) and then type a one-digit color code: 1=yellow, 2=red, 3= blue, 4=orange, 5=green, 6=purple. At the end of the colored text, type Control-B once again. When you print the document, specify that you want to print the file to the ImageColor printer.

ABOUT SHORTCUTS

The "About..." option (used to display program version and copyright information), conventionally the first item in the Apple menu of a GS super hi-res desktop application, can be selected without using

the mouse. Simply press open-apple/Control-2 from the keyboard—Control-2 is a keyboard equivalent for the first item in the Apple menu whether or not the programmer designated as such. This shortcut also works for non-GS-specific programs such as MouseTalk that use Apple's text-screen-based Mousetext tookit for implementing pull-down menus.

FLUSH THAT BUFFER

When you're running a program on the GS with the Keyboard Buffering option on and you wish to use Control-C to stop a listing or Control-S to pause video output, make sure you clear the keyboard input buffer first. Copy protection is stupid. It not only harms customers, in the long run it harms authors and publishers. It's a bad marketing strategy. With the Ilgs in particular I advise you to stay away from copy-protected software. It's dangerous stuff. It can mess up your system and mess up your disks. It multiplies your incompatibility problems. Each dollar you spend on unprotected software is a vote for less copy protection in the future. Support unprotected software! For more, see "How about a boycott?" in the August 1987 Open-Apple, page 3.50.



RESCUE SQUAD UPDATE

In the May 1987 "Rescue Squad," I answered a reader's question about TDD (telephone devices for the deaf) equipment for the hearingimpaired. Two readers have suggested other products that might be useful. Norman Williams, technical director of Hearing Impaired Technology, 3311 Riviera Drive, San Diego, CA 92109-6614, reports that he has developed AppleTDD (\$38) for use with the Novation Apple-Cat II modem. It is an interactive communications program, available via mail order only. On the hardware front, Stanley Sikorski of Krown Research, Inc., 10371 West Jefferson Blvd., Culver City, CA, 90232; (213) 839-0181 advises that Krown makes a TDD modem called the SM85 SMARTmodem. It is an external modem that connects to any computer through an RS-232 serial interface and can handle 45.5-bps Baudot TDD transfers as well as more traditional 300-bps ASCII transfers.

AVIATION EDUCATION


Q. Do you know of any software that is suitable for teaching students about aviation?

A. The Federal Aviation Administration has a free set of programs for the IIe you might find useful. It is called Aviation Science Instruction Program (ASIP) and is an interactive, question-and-answer teaching program. To order the software, send seven 5¼-inch diskettes to:

PERFECT SQUARES

Q. I'm trying to write a program to determine whether or not a given number is a perfect square of a whole number. The program statement I've tried to use is

IF INT(SQR(X)) = SQR(X) THEN PRINT
''Perfect''

but it does not work for certain obvious solutions, such as 9 and 25. What's going on?

MARY LAYTON St. Louis, MO

A. When Applesoft performs computations, it first converts all numeric operands to a special binary floating-point format. If the number cannot be represented exactly in this binary format, rounding errors will occur, resulting in a loss of precision. This situation leads to the strange results you've observed. The work-around solution to your problem is to test not for equality, but for "closeness." If you change your program statement to

IF ABS(INT(SQR(X))-SQR(X)) < 0.001 THEN
PRINT ''Perfect''</pre>

your program will work just fine.

RETURNING TO THE DESKTOP

Q. It seems that after going to Applesoft BASIC from the GS DeskTop program, I have to reboot to return to the DeskTop. Is there an easier way?

A. A portion of the DeskTop program installs itself as the ProDOS "quit code." As a result, you can return to it by typing BYE while you're in the Applesoft command mode. The same technique works if you're using the Finder program, which Apple now includes on the Apple IIGS system disk instead of DeskTop.

READING THE GS CLOCK

Q. How can I read the date and time from the GS clock and place the information in a variable so that I can use it in an Applesoft program?

DAVID POST WOOSTER, OH

A. The program in Listing 1 will do the trick for you. It uses the Read-AsciiTime function in the Miscellaneous tool set to obtain a standard 20-byte time string, then assigns it to an Applesoft string variable. After entering the program at location \$300, call it by placing two statements in your program: CALL

768,TM\$ and TM\$=MID\$(TM\$,1).

The format of the time string returned by ReadAsciiTime depends on the Month/Day/Year and

Hour/Minute/Second formats you've selected under the Clock option in the Control Panel. The default is a string of the form MM/

C COMPILER FOR THE II

Q. Is there a C compiler for the Apple II series? MARK EDGAR

GEORGETOWN, TX

A. For one reason or another, C has never seemed to catch on with developers of Apple II software. Almost all commercial software for the IIe and IIc computers is written in assembly language, Applesoft, or Pascal.

This situation may change, at least for GS software developers, since Apple has published an "official" version of C that works with the Apple Programmer's Workshop. This version was developed by Megamax, Inc., and it runs on the GS only. It is available from APDA, 290 S.W. 43rd Street, Renton, WA, 98055; (206) 251-5222. It costs \$75, and you must be an APDA member to order it.

If you need a C compiler for pre-GS Apple II models, the only real choice is Aztec from Manx Software Systems, 1 Industrial Way, Eatontown, NI, 07724; (201) 542-2121. It also works on the GS but does not take advantage of expanded memory or other unique GS features. Manx's top-of-the-line version is Aztec C65-c, which runs under ProDOS but is also capable of creating programs that run under DOS 3.3. It includes an assembler, a linkage editor, a text editor, a programming shell, and library utilities. The price is \$299.

Lower-priced versions are Aztec C65-d (DOS 3.3 only) for \$199 and C'Prime (a subset of C65-d) for \$75.

A spokeswoman for Aztec promises that a GS-specific version of Aztec is in the works and should be available in early 1988.


